

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY-SWOC ANALYSIS

Prem Chand Markanda S.D. College for Women, a premier institution accredited with 'A' Grade by NAAC was founded on 3rd August, 1973. It has steadily evolved into a multifaculty Post Graduate institution. Devi Sahai S.D. Education Board steered by the great philanthropists and educationists Pandit Prem Chand Markanda, Pandit Dharam Pal Dada, Seth Rup Chand Budhia and Sh. Shiv Nath Khanna laid the foundation of this college which made rapid progress and developed into a big educational centre of higher learning in a short span of time. We salute these stalwarts and stand committed to uphold the noble traditions laid down by the founders. Traversing the path of quality and excellence, learning from experience and in accordance with the motto of the institution 'Do Your Job Well', we have endeavoured to create and disseminate an atmosphere of learning and research in a wide range of disciplines- humanities, commerce, science and technology and have been scaling heights step by step, keeping pace with the challenges of globalization of education and advanced information technology. The institution stands committed to materialize its vision of empowerment and enlightenment of women through quality and value based education aimed at fostering informed global minds. The blueprint of the initiatives taken by the institution along with the inputs and performance appraisal in different aspects categorized by NAAC are summarized below:

CRITERION – I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The college envisions the empowerment and enlightenment of women through quality and value based education aimed at fostering global minds. Embodying a macro vision on a micro base, the institution is constantly marching forward on the path of progress and development in its pursuit of actualizing its mission and objectives.

The college is a grant-in-aid college affiliated to Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar. It follows the academic curriculum and scheme of examination as designed and prescribed by the University for all Programs. The college offers **15 UG and 5 PG programmes.** The curriculum is further strengthened by the addition of **3 PG Diploma Courses**, **2 UG Diploma Courses**, **11 Vocational Add on Courses** (Certificate, Diploma and Advanced Diploma) and one foundation course in Human Rights. **17 Courses** among these available Courses are self- financed. Two UGC sponsored Research Centres Guru Nanak Studies Centre and Vivekananda Studies Centre have been established under Epoch Making Social Thinkers of India Scheme to promote teachings of these great thinkers by promoting research activities.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The curriculum is constantly updated by the University and new academic programmes are strategically planned. As per the recommendations of the Peer Team and feedback of stakeholders **14 new courses** have been added in the post accreditation period. Faculty members as nominated members of university bodies like Academic Council, Board of Studies, Faculty of Languages and Faculty of Sciences make constructive contribution to curriculum updation. Recently the college has started an innovative multi-faculty Post Graduate Course MBEIT (Masters in Business Economics and Information Technology). Apart from this **13 interdisciplinary courses** are included in the list of programmes where faculty of different streams participates in curriculum transaction.

For bringing dynamism in curriculum designing and restructuring, **ICT** based teaching learning and development programmes are initiated. Well equipped laboratories and a well stocked library with e-learning resources bring quality enhancement in curriculum transaction and delivery. Arranging seminars, workshops, hands on training, internships, guest lectures, exhibitions and inter-class competitions further helps the stakeholders in realization of the quality statement of the institution. Eminent resource persons in various disciplines have visited the institution. Regular upgradation of infrastructure and existing laboratories is ensured. All these initiatives have resulted in enhancing the employability quotient of the learners. The institution regularly maintains networking and interactions with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and university for effective operationalisation of curriculum.

Academic flexibility available at various levels includes both vertical and horizontal flexibility as per the norms and guidelines issued by the University regarding choice of subjects and time frame mobility.

Curriculum enrichment is provided by introducing several skill oriented Add on Courses. The extracurricular activities including sports and cultural activities are planned and included in the academic calender. Efforts are made to sensitize the young learners about cross cutting issues and to inculcate a value based system by organising various activities and programmes for community orientation. Go Green Club, Red Cross Units, NCC and NSS Units and Subject Societies regularly organize such events and activities.

CRITERION – II: TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The college has adopted a well institutionalized system of students' admission with due emphasis on publicity mechanism and maintaining transparency. The admission process ensures compliance with all the norms of the concerned regulatory/ governing agencies including Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar, State Government and UGC. The system also ensures access to students from different geographical areas

and from different socio-cultural and economic backgrounds, differently abled students and sports personnel. Scholarships, freeships, financial aid, book bank facility and other incentives are offered to the needy and deserving students. Admission process and student profiles are reviewed annually and changing trends in students profile are analyzed before taking effective steps for improving the college profile. New and innovative courses are introduced as per the demand of the changing dynamic employment market and feedback is collected from all stakeholders. **14 new courses** have been added in the post accreditation period. Pre-admission coaching classes, counselling sessions, canvassing campaign and hobby classes are held to assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programmes. Effective steps are also taken to bridge their knowledge gap. Learning needs of both advanced learners and slow learners are met suitably with personal care.

The college has adopted an adequate inbuilt mechanism for teaching learning process to achieve its goal of academic excellence. Steps for making an effective teaching plan include preparing the workload, allocation of classes, preparing timetable, unitized syllabus and extra classes to complete the syllabus in time. Initiatives are taken for adopting ICT based teaching aids, using e-learning resources, group discussions, brain storming sessions, holding seminars and workshops, practical sessions, hands on training, internships, use of INFLIBNET facility for accessing e-journals, giving assignments and encouraging students to use powerpoint presentations and transparencies and adopting other innovative methods of teaching. The faculty makes use of 5 smart classrooms, 34 hi -tech and well equipped laboratories and required softwares for enrichment of teaching learning process. Academic support services, professional counselling, mentoring and guidance services are provided. Optimal use of library resources and browsing centre helps them exploit the knowledge reservoir. Regular monitoring and evaluation of the quality of teaching learning is done in regular meetings of IQAC, Planning Forum, Advisory Committee and Departmental Meetings.

For excellence in teaching, well qualified teachers are appointed by the institution as per UGC norms. At present the college has a faculty strength of 81 teachers including 22 permanent teachers(aided) against 35 full time sanctioned and 3 part time sanctioned,11 permanent teachers(unaided),8 teachers(contractual) and 40 teachers on adhoc basis. 13 teachers have cleared the UGC test.Teacher quality is assured by recharging the faculty in their own discipline and on general professional competence through training programmes and faculty development programmes. The Faculty takes initiatives to learn and keep abreast of the latest developments, to innovate continuously, to seek improvement and strive for individual and institutional

excellence. Effective steps are taken for initiating and implementing reforms in evaluation system both on university level and college level. Monitoring and communication of the progress and performance of the students and analysis of the result is made well in time. Five core values specified by NAAC are adopted as graduating attributes for learners.

CRITERION – III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

The institution acknowledges the role of research in catering to the needs of the growing economy and dynamic educational scenario. The faculty members are actively engaged in research activities. At present among the faculty members **11 are Ph.D and 20 are M.Phil**. During service 14 faculty members completed their M.Phil and 7 faculty members including the Principal completed their Ph.D. The Faculty members are motivated to take up research projects and they are given full support by granting study leave, duty leave for data collection, flexibility in timetable, ICT support and INFLIBNET facility. At present 2 minor research projects are ongoing while 5 have been completed. Nine faculty members have applied to UGC for Minor Research Projects while 6 faculty members have applied for Major Research Projects. 46 faculty members are attended refresher courses/workshops/summer schools in the last 4 years. Three faculty members are pursuing their Ph.D.

Organizing UGC Sponsored National Seminars and Workshops is a regular activity. Post accreditation, **23 National seminars** have been organised while others have been organised at the college level. Research articles are contributed by the faculty for the seminars conducted in the college and by other research bodies. **405 research papers** have been contributed by the faculty to various research Journals.

The college has published **20 research journals** and is planning to publish three peer review journals also. Students of post graduate departments also make their contributions to research journals. 46 books in different fields have also been written by the faculty members and these books are published by reputed publishers.

Two UGC sponsored Research bodies-Guru Nanak Studies Centre and Vivekanand Studies Centre are actively engaged in research pursuits. These centres have been sanctioned under the Epoch Making Social Thinkers of India Scheme. A host of eminent scholars and researchers are invited as resource persons for seminars and workshops. Both the faculty and students involved in research pursuit can make optimal use of ICT facilities including latest software and e-learning resources and INFLIBNET facilities in various

laboratories and departments. We are indeed thankful to UGC for giving liberal grants for setting up of laboratories and funding of research projects including seminars and workshops.

The college has **a wide range of extension programmes** conducted by NSS, NCC, Youth Club, Youth Red Cross, Go Green Club and the Subject Societies. These outreach programmes focus on sensitization of learners for Cross cutting issues and environment protection. Seminars, Workshops, Poster Making Contests and Awareness Campaigns are regularly organised to initiate community orientation and to ensure contribution to national development. NSS units working under the banner 'Not Me but You' extend scope for further utilization of student potential for extension services. NCC cadets have participated in Republic Day Parades at New Delhi and take part in various camps. Volunteers of Youth Red Cross organise Blood Donation Camps and participate in celebration of International Literacy Day and World Peace Day. To instill love and concern for environment, Go Green Club organizes various activities. Linkages with Industry, Research Bodies and NGOs are established to conduct on job training sessions, research activities, and placement services and on campus interviews.

CRITERION – IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCE

PCM S.D. College for Women, Jalandhar made its entry in the arena of education in August 1973 with a very humble building of 8 rooms. Now after 41 years of its successful and eventful journey it stands tall with a campus having four blocks- Main Block, IT Block, Collegiate School Block and Brahamkund play ground. To carry out its academic, curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular pursuits the college possesses a well equipped and well maintained infrastructure. Constant efforts are made for the augmentation of its infrastructure to enhance the effectiveness of teaching learning process and to ensure the holistic development of students' personality.

For conducting effective curriculum and its delivery the college has **67 spacious classrooms** spread in separate blocks- Arts, Commerce and IT. There is a provision of **two seminar halls and an auditorium** with State of Art facilities, well stocked **libraries** in all three blocks, a browsing centre and one computer centre. Among technology enabled learning facilities, the college has **5 smart class rooms** and **34 laboratories** including 7 Computer laboratories, one Computer Centre, 8 Fashion Designing labs, 3 Home Science labs, 1 lab for MBEIT,2 Fine Arts Studios, T.V. and Video Production Studio, Dance Studio, 2 Music Rooms, One Language Lab and separate laboratories for all other practical subjects. All these labs have specialized facilities and required equipments for teaching, learning and research.

Department of Physical Education provides the facility of a **gymnasium**, a health centre, a **multi purpose yoga hall** for yoga seminars, aerobics, table tennis and gymnastics, a centre for indoor games and **Brahmkund playground** for outdoor games.

There are well marked and self contained spaces for NSS, NCC, Youth Club and Central Association. For Health and Hygiene, there is provision of medical room, safe drinking water and neat washrooms. Optimal utilization of these resources is ensured. The college infrastructure is provided for conducting bank exams, competitive exams, election activities including setting up of voting booths and centres for making voting cards.

Common facilities include spaces for Grievance Redressal Cell, Placement Cell, Personality Development Cell, 3 Canteens, CCTV Cameras, Fire Extinguishers, Basement for Parking two wheelers and 2 book shops, Electricity Panel and three generators. Residential quarters are also provided to class IV employees.

The college has **separate libraries for all three blocks**. It has a collection of **36741 books** and has subscribed to **90 Journals** and magazines and 23 newspapers. The browsing centre gives access to e-learning resources. The library remains open from 9am to 4pm on working days and provides a number of services including Opac, INFLIBNET, Book Bank Facility, Reprography, Downloading, Printing, user orientation and awareness assistance in searching database and facility of bar coding.

IT infrastructure is augmented regularly to promote the use of technology. The college believes in marching forward with use of ICT. 162 computers with internet facility are provided in laboratories and teaching departments and 15 computers are installed in administrative offices. Latest softwares, 8 printers, 2 scanners, 12 projectors, 5 smart class rooms with interactive boards, interactive panels, visualizers, Projectors, Mimeopads, Stylus and mimeo pad pen, 7 laptops, 131 UPS, 44 CCTV Cameras and 5 LCDs are being used effectively in the campus. Internet facility is made available via 2 towers of Dreamtel, a high speed leased line connection of 3 Mbps, 1 Airtel Connection (1 Mbps), 1 BSNL connection (512 Kbps) and 2 data cards for off campus internet connectivity. The system also uses 8 static IP address and MRTG Graphs. College website, college email-id, email ids of various departments, 3 photostat machines, 1 biometric machine, 1 server with latest configuration and bulk SMS service are also very useful for smooth and effective functioning of the college. Augmentation and upgradation of the existing infrastructure is an ongoing activity. The maintenance of the infrastructure is done with the active participation of the teaching and non-teaching staff. Many committees have been

constituted for this purpose. Annual stock checking is conducted at the departmental level. Service providers are undertaking repair of sensitive gadgets and equipment.

CRITERION – V: STUDENT MENTORING AND SUPPORT

The diverse programmes in curricular, co-curricular, extra curricular and sports activities are synchronized and reinforced within an effective support system to facilitate students' progression to higher levels of study and towards gainful employment. The prospectus of the college is published every year and it gives information about vision and mission statement, courses offered along with eligibility criteria and fee structure. Information regarding admission is also available on the college website. Liberal concessions, freeships and financial aid are offered on the need cum merit basis. Concessions and incentives are also available for distinguished artists and sports persons. Medical assistance, coaching for competitive exams, hobby classes, skill development programmes and special care for both advanced and slow learners and students with disabilities are provided as student support services.

To facilitate development of entrepreneurship skills among students, the college offers **11 Add on Courses in vocational subjects**. Placement cell and Personality Development Cell conduct personality grooming programmes, soft skill development programmes, lectures, workshops, hands on training sessions and on campus interviews in collaboration with industry linkages. A good number of students are placed every year in reputed companies and banks.

The institution makes policies and strategies for **promoting participation of students** in creative, cultural and sports activities. Special incentive, coaching and proper exposure is provided to hone their talents. Dean Youth Club takes care of all the student support activities. Central Association representing the voice of student community acts as a link between the Principal and students. College magazine 'Govind', Newsletter- Sunshine SD, Wall magazine, poster making drives, powerpoiont presentation and graffiti making provide a platform to ensure students participation in activities displaying their creativity. Additional academic support and flexibility in examination is provided to students taking part in these activities. It is worth mentioning that our players have got laudable achievements in international, national and state level competitions. Our students also win many prizes in Youth Festivals and Inter College competitions every year.

Welfare Schemes available to the students include placement services, health services, bank account facility, subsidized canteens, library, book bank facility, grievance redressal cell, and transport facility,

enrolment in Red Cross, NCC, NSS, Safety insurance schemes and educational trips. The college has its Alumni Association and we are proud of our alumni. Among them we find our students working in Government Offices, Judicial services, as College Principals, School Principals, Chartered Accountants, Radio and TV artists, Associate Professors, Software Engineers (in India and abroad) and as Bank Managers. Some of them are self employed while others run schools and boutiques and provide jobs to others. We are indeed proud of their achievements.

The college is renowned for its **Academic Excellence**. The college Pass percentage in all courses is much higher than that of the university. A good number of students secure top positions in University and the number of students placed in University Merit List crosses the one hundred mark, while the college pass percentage in most of the classes is 100%. Special support is provided to drop outs and the students who are at the risk of failure by helping them with extra coaching and counselling. Achievements of our students in Youth Festivals, Inter College competitions and Sports Activities are worth praising. Students participate in **community orientation programs**, celebrate special days of historical and cultural importance and campaign for cross cutting issues. Student Representatives are included in various bodies like IQAC, Central Association, Youth Club and Go Green Club, Editors in college magazine and executive posts in a host of subject societies.

Annual functions, Havan Yajna, Felicitations, Talent Hunt, College Fete, Saraswati Puja, Prize Distribution Function, Convocation, Valedictory, Farewells at Departmental level, functions of subject societies ensure students' participation and gives them exposure to inculcate values like leadership and discipline. It gives them a feeling of making their contribution to the development of their Alma Mater.

CRITERION – VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

The institution has its well defined vision and mission statement to make concerted and dedicated efforts for empowerment of women through quality and value based education with an objective to create a competitive academic environment by continuous enrichment of teaching and learning through the medium of research and technological advancements. Efforts are being made to ensure holistic development of students personality by integrating its inputs for inculcating a value based system and marching forward with the use of ICT. Efforts are put in to create informed global citizens. Care is being taken for the sensitization of young learners about cross cutting issues and ensuring their love and respect for society and nation.

The institution has adopted a mechanism for efficient organization and transparent and healthy management practices. The Governing Body extends necessary guidelines and directions for the efficient administration of the college. It also monitors the progress and prepares action plans for the future. With the Principal at the helm of affairs, there is an efficient co-ordinating and monitoring mechanism. The top management, Principal and Faculty, have a proactive role in the design and implementation of its quality policy and plans. The college has a Planning Forum headed by the Principal, Senior Members of the staff and Heads of Departments as members. The Planning Forum and Advisory Committee comprising top ten senior faculty members play an active role in the co-ordination and management of college affairs.

For efficient and smooth functioning, the college incorporates strategic governance and leadership qualities through decentralization of power, division of labour and meticulous planning. A large number of committees have been constituted which are competent enough to formulate and execute plans, and evaluate the outcome. These committees concentrate on various issues and aspects like examination, discipline, scholarship, cultural activities, extension activities, grievance redressal, innovations, placement drives, and in the compilation of timetable, prospectus, magazine and newsletter. Regular meetings of these committees are conducted to ensure quality enhancement. Despite the decentralization at departmental levels, the culture of participative management is promoted with the involvement of both students and faculty in various bodies and societies.

For strategic development and deployment of its quality policy the institution makes perspective plans for both short term and long term basis covering different aspects of functioning such as teaching and learning, research and development, industry interaction, community orientation, human resource planning and infrastructure. For execution of these perspective plans various bodies mentioned above give their input. It is ensured that timely information is available to all stakeholders via correspondence, notices, duty lists, texts and e-mails. The Principal has regular interaction with all stakeholders. Grievance redressal cell ensures the timely and speedy redressal of all complaints. The Principal is readily available and accessible to the faculty, students and even visitors.

The institution adopts Faculty Empowerment Strategies. Due emphasis is laid on strategy of careful faculty recruitment and faculty development programmes. Duty leave and all support are provided to those involved in research pursuits or other professional development activities. Performance appraisal system of the staff is adopted to ensure growth of the institution. Welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff

include medical leave, duty leave, PF loans and fee concession for their children, residential facility for peons and guards and uniform for class IV employees.

For financial management and resource mobilization the college depends on the grants received from DPI (Pb.) and UGC. Any deficit in the annual budget is met by the Management. The college also makes efforts to secure additional funds from ICSR, HRD, local bodies and politicians for developmental activities. The income and expenditure of the institution are subjected to regular internal and external audits as per norms.

In compliance with the NAAC regulations, IQAC has been functioning as a quality sustenance measure since 2007. Regular meetings of IQAC help in effective planning and implementation of institutional policies. The preparation of AQAR gives us an opportunity to evaluate and improve our performance.

CRITERION – VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

The institution is well aware of the role of innovations for growth and development. Showing its preparedness to deal with the uncertainty and challenges of the future the college continuously ventures out innovations in all spheres and at all levels by harnessing and utilizing its resources, intellectual capital and technology. **Innovations in enriching curriculum/courses and pedagogical tools** have been initiated with the introduction of 14 new courses, providing hands-on and practical training to learners, addition of e-learning resources and holding personality development programmes focusing on the holistic development of students' personality. Further **innovations for augmenting and enhancing infrastructure** are regularly introduced. 





- ICT based learning has been incorporated in all departments. Both students and teachers use computer and internet facility to procure study material. It is used to supplement the study material available in books in the library.
- Along with the traditional chalk and talk method use of smart class rooms is also encouraged. College has five smart class rooms in different departments.
- Assignments, projects and practical work are a regular part of the teaching methods adopted for all classes.
- Relevant books are also recommended by the teachers to students as per the needs and requirement of the syllabus.
- Above all, a student friendly atmosphere is ensured to produce better results.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

a) Support given by University

- Guru Nanak Dev University to which this college is affiliated is among the reputed universities. The university makes strategic and sincere efforts to prepare syllabus for various courses. In order to keep pace with the dynamic changing scenario, the necessary modifications are planned and implemented in the curriculum by the University.
- University bodies are functioning for this cause. Meetings of Syndicate, Boards of Studies are conducted at regular intervals and healthy discussions are held to formulate the syllabi for different courses. Teaching faculty from affiliated colleges is enrolled as members of University bodies. Every year a large number of our faculty members are nominated as members of various university bodies.
- Information regarding the syllabus and the notifications for change if any are notified on the university website. Suggested pattern of question paper is also provided.

CRITERION-I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

- Syllabus provided by the university also includes the list of recommended books.
- Number of study hours to be allotted for each subject is also notified and due weightage is given to both theory and practical work.
- The university forms an academic calendar that specifies the duration of each course, the examination schedule and also circulates various notifications as and when required.
- General orientation courses, refresher courses and workshops are regularly conducted by the university to facilitate the faculty to update their knowledge. The faculty members are encouraged to attend these courses which carry weightage for promotion to higher pay scale.

Support given by the Institution

- Information regarding syllabus and other notifications is downloaded by the browsing centre in the library and made available to the faculty members. Most of the departments have their own computer systems with internet facility.
- College website which provides information regarding all courses of study is accessible to all.
- Faculty members make it a point to use innovative, effective and student's friendly teaching methods. Five smart class rooms have been set up in the previous years. Many departments including Computer Science, Fashion Designing, Commerce, Mathematics and others use audio visual aids to enrich the knowledge and learning process.
- Departments also organize seminars, guest lectures, debates, group discussion, paper reading contests to enhance the knowledge of students and acquaint them with eminent scholars and dignitaries from various fields.
- The institution keeps upgrading its infrastructure especially the library and its laboratories as per the demands of the syllabi for translating the curriculum effectively. Recently T.V and Video Production lab was equipped with the latest gadgets and Computer Aided Accountancy laboratory was equipped with six computers loaded with latest softwares. Department of Fashion Designing has eight specialized laboratories including Illustration lab, Garment construction lab, Pattern Making and Draping lab, Designing lab and Textile testing and printing lab. Upgradation of all existing laboratories is a regular feature. A laboratory for the course MBEIT is under construction.
- The institution is proud of having a rich library. There are 36741 books and 90 journals and magazines in the library at present. Faculty members are asked to provide demand list for books as

per the requirement of the syllabi of various courses and additional books are procured well in time. Displaying new arrivals and circulation of the lists is ensured. Both teachers and students have an easy access to the library for their knowledge upgradation.

- E-learning facility is also available in the library. The browsing centre operating in the library has desktop computers and internet facility. INFLIBNET facility is available for faculty and students to access e-journals.
- The college incorporates UGC/GNDU/Punjab Govt. guidelines for developing and restricting the curriculum.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

Academic excellence has been the hallmark of our institution. Focusing on the multi dimensional personality development of the learners the institution takes the following initiatives for effective curriculum delivery and its transaction:

- Effective implementation and execution of the changes made in the courses and curriculum prepared by the University.
- Conducting meeting at various levels to make strategies for improving teaching methods.
- Updating the college website with the latest information and notifications.
- Preparing academic calendar and ensuring its compliance.
- Using innovative, effective and learner friendly teaching methods.
- Upgradation and modification of existing infrastructure especially laboratories.
- Upgrading library resources and e-learning facilities.
- Encouraging the learners to make optimum use of library resources and e-learning resources.
- Strengthening the teaching learning process with the use of audio-visual aids to promote better understanding and clarity of concepts.
- Supplementing the theory portion with practical sessions in practical subjects.
- Devoting adequate time for revision after the completion of syllabi.
- Well planned remedial programme to strengthen the fundamentals and concept clarity.

- Special care and extra classes for both slow learners and advanced learners.
- Organizing guest lectures by experts especially for post graduate courses.
- For optimum curriculum delivery and its transaction, field visits are organized.
- To facilitate the learning process and make it student centric, students are made to participate in group discussions and are given assignments to make Powerpoint Presentations.
- Bilingual method is used to facilitate the students and assist them in easy comprehension of important topics. Practical use of vernacular language in the lecture is really helpful for the slow learners.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

The institution regularly networks and interacts with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the University for the Effective Operationalization of the curriculum.

a) Industry:

- The Post Graduate students of Commerce, Computer Science and Fashion Designing keep visiting Industry from time to time to have practical exposure of the critical concepts taught to them as per the demand of the curriculum. The students of M.Sc. Fashion Designing are required to undergo practical training of 4 weeks and prepare a project report which is submitted to the university as a part of their syllabi. Students of Department of Home Science visited Ludhiana and JCT Phagwara to get hands on training. Students of Department of Commerce also visited Ludhiana stock exchange.
- Students of undergraduate classes are also taken for industrial visits as and when required. Students of Department of Fashion Designing regularly visit Sportking industry. In the session 2013-14 the students of the department visited Sportking Sobhagya and students were given exposure to concepts of digital printing and garment construction.
- Students of other departments also undertake projects and assignments related to industry. Department of Commerce organized a six day workshop on e-filing of IT return and wealth tax returns. Students also undertake projects and assignments related to industry. Students of B.Com (Professional), Office Management and Secretarial Practices undertake summer training of 6-8

weeks in different organizations and prepare reports every year. Students of PGDCA and BCA II take up short projects related to industry.

• The institution has linkages with IBS, Institute of Banking Services that help the students of all streams to compete in various examinations of 'B' and 'C' category of All India, Central and State Jobs. Department of Commerce also has signed MOU with NIIT, Knowledge Icon and Dream Weavers group, Jalandhar. The Department also has collaborations with some firms of Chartered Accountants to facilitate the students in getting specialized training. The detailed list of MOUs signed by the institution is included in criterion III (Research, Consultancy and Extension).

Placement Cell of the college keeps in touch with the representatives of the industry and facilitates the students in undertaking projects, assignments and training. Placement cell also invites companies for conducting on campus interviews. A large number of students are placed every year with several companies and banks.

b) Research Bodies:

- Students as well as members of faculty are motivated to take up research projects which help in creating a mindset for inquiry and inculcate an analytical attitude and scientific temperament.
- 7 faculty members have undertaken Minor Research Projects which are being funded by UGC.
- 6 faculty members have applied to UGC for sanction of Major Research Projects and 9 faculty members have applied for Minor Research Projects.
- Faculty members attend seminars and present papers in seminars organized by various academic bodies including affiliated colleges and universities. The Papers presented in seminars have been published in journals. A large number of faculty members have contributed to these research journals. Guru Nanak Studies Center has been set up under the Epoch Making Social Thinkers of India Scheme launched by UGC. The centre holds seminars based on teachings of Guru Nanak Dev Ji. A journal titled 'Sachiar' has also been published.
- Vivekanand Studies Centre sanctioned by UGC has also been set up in the college. This centre remains active in propagating the teachings of Vivekanand and promotes research.
- UGC Sponsored Seminars, Conferences and Workshops are regularly conducted in the college. In the previous years till date 23 national seminars have been organized and 20 research journals have been published. 46 books have been composed by the faculty members.

c) University

For effective operationalisation of the curriculum the institution and the faculty members maintain a network with the university.

- Syllabus for all courses is framed by the university. The syllabus can be downloaded from the university website.
- For any queries regarding syllabus the University officials and concerned departments can be contacted.
- Faculty members also attend meetings of Boards of studies and other university bodies. A large number of faculty members hold membership of university bodies like Senate, Boards of Studies, Faculty of Language, Faculty of Sciences, Modification Committee etc.
- Learned scholars from various departments of the university are also invited to deliver lectures to the students of Postgraduate departments. The learning process is further enriched by this networking.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University? (Number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc).

Syllabus for all the courses is formulated and designed by the university. Various university bodies like Senate, Syndicate Academic Council, Boards of studies, and faculty of languages contribute to this design in every possible way. A large number of faculty members of our institution hold membership of these bodies. Meetings of these bodies are held regularly. Our faculty members on the panel of these bodies do not hesitate in giving their suggestions in these meetings. While doing so they take feedback and suggestions given in the departmental meetings by other members of the department and stakeholder's feedback and suggestions given by our Alumni.

These above mentioned value added Add on Courses are being offered to the young learners to enhance their employability quotient. These courses equip them with the vocational skills that are helpful in setting up their own small units or getting work in small units and they can earn while they learn.

The college is running these courses at three levels i.e. Certificate/Diploma/Advanced Diploma.

- Add on Course in Communication Skills empowers the students by improving their communication skills and there are ample job opportunities for them to be employed as Announcers, Newsreaders, Journalists and Receptionists.
- Add on Course in Fashion Designing familiarizes the students with the latest in the world of Fashion and creates job opportunities for them in Fashion Houses and Garment Industry.
- Add on Course in Cosmetology gives them practical training in beauty culture and equips them to start their own Beauty Parlours or get employment in Beauty Industry.
- Add on Course in Office Management and Secretarial Practices provides exhaustive practical knowledge on Typewriters, Computers and Front Office Handling.
- Add on Course in Computer Applications and Add on Course in Web Designing are very useful as they give practical training in latest operating systems and web designing. Students can find job opportunities as programmers, graphic designers and website developers. They can even get jobs in MNCs or Software Development Companies.
- Add on Course in Interior Decoration helps the students get jobs as interior decorators or as consultants with architects.
- Add on Course in Computer Aided Accountancy trains the students in handling accounts on computers and opens up the opportunity of getting jobs in accounting.
- Add on Course in T.V & Video Production gives practical hands-on training in this field and helps the students find jobs in T.V and Media Houses.
- Add on Course in Leather Processing Technology is a recent addition and provides practical training to students in addition to theoretical knowledge in this field.

• Foundation Course in Human Rights is indeed useful to sensitize the students to realize their creative human potential and curb all forms of violation of Human Rights.

c) One Year Professional Diploma Courses After +2

- 1. Diploma in Stitching and Tailoring
- 2. Diploma in Computer Application (DCA)

All these courses provide vocational training and sharpen the skills of the students with an objective to provide specialized knowledge. Young learners are equipped and trained in various specialized fields. These courses hone their requisite skill sets and increase the scope of employability.

d) Skill Oriented Courses

In addition to the above stated courses there are also a number of other skill oriented courses like Personality Development Programmes, Hobby Classes being conducted in the college. Personality Development Cell signed an MOU with MIE (Make India Employable) and conducted personality development programmes to groom the students. These programmes indeed chisel the personality of students and they are ready to face the world with confidence.

1.2.2 Does the institution offer programmes that facilitate twinning /dual degree? If 'yes', give details.

- The college offers a vast array of Add on Courses in varied fields like Cosmetology, Communication Skills, Web Designing, Fashion Designing, Office Management, Interior Decoration, T.V. and Video Production, Computer Applications etc. These courses facilitate twinning/dual degree. These courses are open to students of all streams alongwith regular degree.
- Some students of Commerce are pursuing Chartered Accountancy Course and course for Company Secretary along with B.Com Course.

1.2.3 Give details on the various institutional provisions with reference to academic flexibility and how it has been helpful to students in terms of skills development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability.

Since the college is affiliated to Guru Nanak Dev University it is bound to follow the curriculum designed by the university.

- The students of Arts and Humanities have diverse options in Languages, Social Sciences, Fine Arts, Economics, Mathematics and a wide variety of practical subjects. They have the option to choose from a list of 18 subjects. Students opting for BA have to study English and Punjabi as compulsory subjects. Only students from other States can opt for Basic Punjabi/Punjab History and Culture. Subject combinations for BA are listed in the Prospectus. A student has to select three elective subjects.
- For all other courses in Commerce, Fashion Designing and Sciences the subjects listed by the University for a Particular Course are available.
- The college offers an array of Add on Courses in various skill oriented subjects. These courses add to their skills and increase their potential for employability.

Skill Development Programmes:

- While framing the syllabi for various courses due weightage is given by the University to skill development of the learners. There is ample scope of skill development as introduction to computer is included as a subject in most of the courses at UG level. Significant technological innovations have been adopted. Use of smart class rooms has been initiated. Students can use the Browsing Centre in the library and Computer laboratories for enrichment of their learning resources.
- Desktop computers and internet facility available in many departments namely Computer science, Commerce, English, Fashion Designing, Fine Arts, Cosmetology and many more facilitate the students in making use of ICT optimally.
- Personality development courses and soft skills development programmes are conducted regularly.
- The college offers 11 Add on Courses related to various skills oriented fields. The list of courses has already been included.
- Organizing workshops and seminars and exhibitions on issues related to the curriculum is a regular feature. Such skill development programmes are indeed helpful to the students for honing their skills. Details about workshops and seminars organized by the institution are included in departmental profiles.

Academic mobility

A wide range of courses is offered in the college but choice based credit system has not yet been introduced by the university. Credit transfer and accumulation facility is also not available.

Time Frame Mobility

Students unable to complete an academic programme due to various reasons, viz, financial constraints, medical emergencies or adverse family circumstances can resume their course within the stipulated period of time provided by the University in case they are able to justify this gap. This time frame mobility facilitates the student's progress to higher studies.

Horizontal Mobility

Students have the facility to change their elective subjects even after admission within a stipulated period of time with due permission of subject change committee.

Students from all streams can opt for Add on Courses being offered in the institution.

Vertical Mobility

Within and across progrmames/courses students from Arts, Science & Commerce stream can opt for Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Application (PGDCA), P.G. Diploma in Cosmetology can also be pursued by students from all streams. Students of BCA, B.Sc. (Computer Science) and B.A with Computer science as elective subject can pursue M.Sc. (IT). Students who have passed B.A with Home Science or B.Sc. Fashion Designing or P.G. Diploma in Fashion Designing can join M.Sc. Fashion Designing and Merchandising.

Enrichment Courses

The college offers 11 Add on Courses along with the regular courses offered by the university. These courses are available for students of all streams.

- Foundation course in human rights has been introduced to educate students about their rights and duties.
- For further enrichment of the learning experience of the students, they are encouraged to design some projects and presentations which help them understand the concepts and fundamentals included in the theory work in a better way.
- Guest lectures, seminars, educational tours are regularly organized to update and enrich their realm of knowledge.

- All the courses offered in the streams of Arts, Commerce, IT and Science are open ended courses and students have no problem in proceeding for higher studies.
- Personality development programmes are regularly conducted to ensure students enrichment. Department of Sports remains very active and motivates the students to take part in various games like rope skipping, aerobics, gymnastics, table tennis, judo, hulla hoop and many more.

Progression to Higher Studies

The courses offered in the institution include both Undergraduate and Postgraduate courses. At present Five Postgraduate Courses namely M.Sc. IT, M.Com, M.Sc. (Fashion Designing and Merchandising), M.Sc. (Computer Science) and MBEIT are being offered to facilitate the progression of learners to higher studies. Students of B.Sc. Fashion Designing can move to M.Sc. Fashion Designing and Merchandising. Similarly students of BCA and B.Sc. Computer Science get admission in M.Sc. (I.T). For students of B.Com., there is option of being admitted to M.Com. Five Postgraduate Diploma Courses namely PGDCA, P.G. Diploma in Office Management and Secretarial Practices, P.G. Diploma in Fashion Designing, P.G. Diploma in Cosmetology and P.G. Diploma in Dress Designing and Tailoring are also offered to the students. Students prefer to stay back and pursue post graduation in the same college after completing their graduation.

Improved potential for employability

While introducing new courses it is ensured that it leads to improvement in potential for `1employment. In the last five years 14 new courses have been introduced. The job avenues of various courses being offered are enlisted in the Prospectus to give a clear view to the learners for making a right choice of the course they wish to join.

- Skill Development programmes conducted by Placement Cell and Personality Development Cell are aimed at improving potential for employability.
- Eleven Add on Courses in vocational subjects being offered to the students further improve their potential for employability.

- U.G Diploma in Stitching and Tailoring
- Diploma in Computer Applications

Regarding admission and curriculum the guidelines given by the university are followed. Fee structure is also recommended by the university. However, the fee structure is designed in such a way that it is conducive both for the meritorious and students of economically weaker sections. They are given some concessions. Regarding teachers qualification and salary, the guidelines given by UGC are followed. Students are also given the option of making part payment incase they have any financial constraints.

1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

• The college offers several additional skill oriented programmes with an aim to impart industry oriented education and improve the learner's potential for employment. The add-on courses offered in the college focus on skill development of the learners.

- Computer has been included as a subject in many courses at UG level as per university guidelines.
- Personality Development programmes are conducted regularly by the placement cell of the college in collaboration with Personality Development Cell. It organizes workshops, mock interviews, training programmes and visits by professionals to prepare the students for the selection process. Job fairs/Campus Interviews are also organized by this cell and a good number of students are placed every year in reputed companies & industries.
- Students are motivated to prepare projects and power-point presentations. Such assignments are really useful for the learners and give them an edge in seeking regional and global employment. It no doubt boosts their confidence.
- There are societies functioning in the college on departmental level. These societies make it a point to hold guest lectures by experts and learned persons. Seminars, Workshops and educational tours are also organized. Such little steps towards skill development of the students certainly go a long way.

1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice" If 'yes', how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

The University does not provide for flexibility of combining the conventional face to face and distance mode of education for students. No courses in distance mode of education are offered in the institution.

1.3 CURRICULUM ENRICHMENT

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The college aims at providing quality and value based education that improves the potential for employability of the learners. Effective teaching and academic excellence are the unique and exclusive features of our institution. The institution has the distinction of having a sustained record of excellence in academics. Every year a good number of students bag top positions in the university exams and more than 150 students are placed in the merit lists of various courses.

• Course contents as provided by the university are good enough to lay sound theoretical foundation for the specific subjects. But to further supplement it the college takes initiatives to ensure that the academic programmes and institution's goals are integrated.

- Apart from the usual curriculum delivery the college aims at promoting the inculcation of moral values. Emphasis is laid on all rounded and healthy development of the girls by inculcating in them confidence, independence, and leadership qualities and self respect. Havan Yajna is performed in the beginning of the session. Students take part in Saraswati Pujan before filling their admission forms. Every function begins with a bhajan or shabad and ends with national anthem.
- Subject societies functioning in the college regularly organize workshops and activities to provide exposure to students. While preparing students for the challenges on the professional front, good care is taken that they never lose sight of their moral values, professional ethics and the strong roots of their cultural heritage. Various subject societies arrange lectures, workshops, seminars, industrial visits and group discussions to train the young minds.
- NSS units, NCC units, Youth Club and Central Association remain active throughout the year and involve the students in activities like blood donation camps, Pulse Polio Camps, Social Awareness against various evils, Inter College competitions, participation in Youth Festivals, Celebration of important days and festivals.
- Go Green Club, a self financing club functioning in the college keeps the go green message alive and going. To instill love and concern for environment, Go Green Club, is actively functioning in the college. Environmental studies have already been introduced by the university in all undergraduate courses.
- Morning Assembly is held every Monday. It provides a platform to students and teachers to express
 their thoughts on social and moral issues. The National song 'Vande Matram' and National Anthem
 are chanted by both students and faculty. This assembly is also a means of communication with the
 students regarding policy matters, important information and above all a time to discuss issues
 concerning meaningful matters of life and living.
- Celebration of special days like Independence Day, Republic Day, Teacher's Day, Voter's Day, Lohri, Teej, and Deepawali is a great impetus for the students to make their contribution to the cause of cultural awareness and national development.
- Some NGOs like Pahal and Red Cross are also in touch with the institution and these units actively participate in blood donation camps, tree plantation and charity programmes. Such activities are undertaken to sensitize the students about cross cutting issues.

- Efforts are made for improving the potential for employability of the learners. New courses relevant to regional and global employment markets are introduced after considering the feedback of students, alumni and need assessment.
- In the previous years, 14 new courses have been introduced. 11 Add on Courses which are vocational and Job Oriented are available to the learners. These courses certainly promote the use of ICT and are helpful in preparing the students for the booming ICT industry.
- Placement Cell of the college makes an endeavor to get students placed in reputed multinationals, government jobs, NGO's and private sector. They are given counseling for employment opportunities and even for self employment. The cell invites companies to hold on campus interviews.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

- There is little scope to modify the syllabus designed by the university. However, the suggestions for modification can be communicated to the university through the Principal and members of faculty who attend the meetings of various university bodies. Feedback obtained from students, alumni and other stakeholders is analysed and after discussions in meetings at college level, the suggestions are forwarded to the concerned departments of the university like Academic Council, Boards of Studies, Faculty of Language and Faculty of Sciences.
- For further enrichment of the curriculum and to ensure that it caters to the needs of the dynamic employment market the college takes the following initiatives:
- Adding more career oriented and skill development programmes like Add on Courses which can be pursued alongwith the regular courses.
- Alongwith theoretical knowledge due weightage is given to the practical work. Students make projects and power point presentations related to their syllabi.
- Programmes for personality development and soft skills development are regularly conducted by the Placement Cell and Department of English.

- Technological advancements and innovations in educational transactions have been adopted. The college has five Smart Classrooms which are used by various departments to enrich the learning experience of the students.
- Optimal use of ICT (Information and Communication Technology) is ensured. Many departments have been provided computers with internet facility and latest softwares.
- Provision for a rich and well equipped library with latest books and journals to enable the students to update their knowledge as per the needs of the changing market trends.
- Regular upgradation of Infrastructure and apparatus in all existing laboratories
- Making efforts for effective organization of the curriculum like preparing academic calendar and ensuring its compliance, unitized syllabus and holding mid semester exams and holding departmental meetings to review and gauge students performance.
- Ensuring that the curriculum caters to the needs of the dynamic employment market the college conducts skill development programmes at various levels.
- Continuous efforts by Placement Cell and Personality Development Cell to conduct seminars, workshops and personality development programmes.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The institution makes sincere efforts to integrate cross cutting change issues like Gender sensitization, climate change, environmental education, human rights, ICT etc. into the curriculum.

- Environmental studies have been introduced as a compulsory subject at graduation level by the university. Apart from it Go Green Club remains active and involves the students directly into its activities. This is a self financing club and gives the students awareness about their social responsibility the threat posed by pollution, global warming and role of trees in life of human beings.
- Awareness and education about human rights has always been our major concern. A step in this direction has been taken by department of political science. It has started foundation course in human rights from the session 2011-12. The department keeps organizing students activities to accelerate the awareness campaign for human rights. Celebrating Voter's Day is a regular feature. The institution was indeed instrumental in getting its young voters enrolled and put in efforts under

the guidance of the district authorities to submit registration forms and get voter cards for the new voters. Student ambassadors were given the duty to streamline the process of getting voter cards made.

• All subject societies, Youth Club, Central Association, NSS, NCC are busy throughout the year in organizing seminars, workshops, departmental activities to sensitize the students about all the cross cutting issues. Such activities focusing on cross cutting issues are conducted every year with great zeal and enthusiasm and help the students in becoming law abiding citizens and better human beings who can contribute to national development and shoulder their social responsibilities.

ICT

The importance of ICT is recognized globally and our institution also lays great emphasis on it. It has been included in curriculum and administrative procedures.

- The college offers introduction to computer as a subject at UG level as per university guidelines.
- Both students and faculty are encouraged to make use of computers and internet.
- Add on courses in Web Designing, Computer Applications (Data Care Mgt.) and Computer Aided Accountancy and many more are being offered to the students to improve their potential for employment.
- Department of Computer Science is running the Computer related courses like BCA, B.Sc. Computer Science, PGDCA and M.Sc. (Computer Science) and M.Sc. (Information Technology). There is a great demand of these courses.
- Computers with internet facility are made available in all major departments to motivate staff and students to use ICT in an effective way.
- The browsing centre in the library is also available to the faculty and students to enrich their elearning resources. INFLIBNET facility is provided to access e journals.
- Students are encouraged to make projects and power point presentations which enable them to make effective use of ICT.
- Department of TV and Video Production has been recently added. It has a well equipped laboratory that gives hands on training to the students. Students make a video recording of all functions in the college.
- The college can boast of having 5 smart classrooms and auditorium with State of the Art facilities. CCTV cameras have been installed at the key points in the college. LEDs have been installed for the students that display activities of the college. Documentaries on social issues are also displayed to ensure the participation of the young minds in cultural awareness and national development.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

- Moral and ethical values
- Employable and life skills
- Better career options
- Community orientation

Various values added/enrichment programmes are offered to ensure holistic development of students. NCC units, NSS units, Youth Red Cross, Placement Cell and Personality Development Cell organize activities all through the year to impart moral values and community orientation.

- **Central Association** is the Apex Body of the students. The main aim of the Central Association is to instill among the students values of discipline, team spirit, honesty, humanity, responsibility, duty consciousness and commitment.
- Our college **Youth Welfare Club** is affiliated to the Directorate of Youth Services, Govt. of Punjab. Youth Welfare Club of the college aims at bringing out the latent talent of the budding artists and debaters and provides exposure to the students for the all round development of their personalities. Our students of Youth club participate in various inter college competitions and youth festival organized by GNDU, Amritsar which instills confidence in them. Students are guided by the expert teachers to prepare for Quiz, Elocution, Declamation, Debate, Music, Dance, Flower Arrangement, Rangoli, Poster Making, Collage Making etc.
- Under the banner 'Not Me But You', our four **N.S.S Units** are working effeciently. NSS aims at motivating students to do selfless service towards humanity.
- In order to instill discipline and patriotic fervor in the Youth, the college has an NCC platoon which gives military training to the students. Our NCC Cadets participate in various camps, expeditions and training programmes organized by NCC (Head Quarters).
- The college publishes its **Magazine 'Govind'** annually. Students and members of the staff contribute articles to it. The Magazine has seven sections viz. English, Sanskrit, Punjabi, Hindi, Home Science, Fine Arts and Commerce & Technology and has a student editor for each section.
- **Guru Nanak Studies** Centre is functioning successfully in the college. It holds seminars and guest lectures to promote teachings of Guru Nanak Dev JI. This centre strives to provide insight into the contemporary socio-economic scenario.

- Vivekanad Studies Centre has also been established recently. This unit conducts lectures, competitions and many other activities to highlight the teachings of Vivekanand. 'Surya Namaskar' was performed on a mass level. Students participated in District Rally to celebrate youth day.
- All **important festivals** and days like Diwali, Lohri, Independence Day, Teacher's Day, and Voter's Day etc are celebrated with great enthusiasm by various departments and clubs.
- For **improving employable and life skills** and to give **better career options**, the college keeps introducing new courses based on the feedback collected from different sources and as per the demands of the dynamic market. In the last five years **14 new courses** have been introduced. Most of these courses are job oriented and give them better career options.
- Placement Cell of the college makes endeavors to get students placed in reputed multinationals, government jobs, NGO's and private sector. Personality development and grooming courses are organized for the students. The Cell assures support to the visiting companies at every stage of the placement process to facilitate them in conducting on campus interviews.

Community Orientation Programmes:

NCC, NSS, Red Cross Society and other subject's societies are actively involved in conducting community orientation progammes with an aim to inculcate the spirit of performing civic duties and to sensitize the young learners about their duties towards the society. The following activities are regularly undertaken

- Blood Donation Camps
- Visit to Pingalwaras for donation
- Spending time with elderly in old age homes
- Celebrating festivals with less fortunate ones
- Awareness drive against female foeticide, beti bachoo, save water etc by organizing lectures, poster making, slogan writing contest and awareness drive against AIDS by Red Cross Society.
- Participation in rallies against social evils.
- Donations for victims of flood, earthquake and other natural calamities.
- Arranging medical camps.
- Participation in Pulse Polio Drive.
- Tree Plantation by NSS and Go Green Club.
- Celebration of special days and events like Independence Day, Republic Day, Teacher's Day, Voter's Day, Teej, Lohri, Diwali, Basant Panchmi etc.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

- Feedback from stakeholders is of great importance to us as it propels the institution on the path of development, growth and success.
- Suggestion boxes have been installed at various points in the college.
- Feedback from the stakeholders is an important stimulus for the institution to start new courses, improving teaching methods and organizing workshops and lectures that help the learners in every possible way.
- Based on the feedback collected from stakeholders proposals were sent to the UGC for starting new courses.
- Now 11 Add on Courses are being offered in the college. Five smart classrooms have been set up for the optimal use of ICT. Upgradation of the existing infrastructure has been initiated after analyzing the feedback from stakeholders.
- Recently a proposal to start a multidisciplinary course M.A. (Business Economics and Information Technology) has been approved by UGC. The course has been started in the session 2014-15. Such innovations can only be executed with the feedback collected from stakeholders, Alumni, parents, peers and from industry and related fields.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The institution has developed a well planned system to monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes. The following steps are included in this plan:

- Ensuring the compliance of all notifications and decisions.
- Conducting review meetings of planning form, advisory committee and concerned department to discuss the effective compliance of the plans and to discuss the problems faced in execution if any.
- Motivating the faculty and the students in every possible way. The motto of the college 'Do Your Job Well' is a great motivation for all.
- Efforts are put in to create a healthy and student friendly atmosphere that facilitiates and promotes maximum output by the faculty and the learners.

The IQAC of the institution is actively involved in planning and monitoring its quality assurance programmes.

1.4 FEEDBACK SYSTEM

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

Syllabus for all the courses is formulated and designed by the university. Various university bodies like Senate, Syndicate Academic Council, Boards of Studies, and Faculty of Languages contribute in their own way. A good number of faculty members of our institution hold membership of these bodies. Meetings of these bodies are held regularly. Our faculty members on the panel of these bodies do not hesitate in giving their suggestions in these meetings. While doing so they take feedback and suggestions given in the departmental meetings by other members of the department and stakeholders' feedback and suggestions given by our Alumni.

However, in many cases the curriculum has been designed by the college faculty and approved and finalized by the University and UGC with some modifications. The college offers 11 Add on Courses and the syllabus for the same has been designed by the concerned departments. Recently a postgraduate course Masters in Business Economics and Information Technology has been introduced. This is an innovative course and the syllabus was framed jointly by Department of Economics, Commerce and Computer Science

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

• Yes, there is a well established system to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders. Student representatives are members of certain bodies like Central Association, Youth Club and Subject Societies. They convey their feedback and suggestions to their incharges which are forwarded to the authorities in the meetings of Planning Forum, Advisory Committee and other departmental meetings. These suggestions concerning the curriculum are further forwarded to the university in the meetings of Boards of Studies and Faculty of Languages who are instrumental in the design and development of curriculum.

- For curriculum enrichment programmes this feedback of stakeholders is considered while preparing a schedule of the enrichment programmes for the next session.
- For introducing changes/new programmes feedback from stakeholders is a big stimulus. It propels the institution to expand its horizons by introducing new programmes on the demand of stakeholders including students, alumni, parents, peers from industry and relevant fields.
- Feedback received from all above said sources is internally analyzed and used for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes
- A committee of senior teachers, Innovation Committee and Advisory Committee analyzes the feedback and points out if there is a need of curriculum enrichment or starting a new programme. There after it consults experts from various universities and colleges and chalks out a blue print which is sent to the college Academic Council for consideration. After framing the syllabus it is forwarded to university and UGC for consideration. After getting a nod from both university and UGC the course is initiated.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)

The institution aims at building a class of intellectually and globally competent skilled human resource to contribute to national development in every possible way. For achieving its goals and objectives the college has been continuously making efforts to expand its horizons by adding new job oriented courses to meet the demands of the dynamic environment. In the previous years **14 new courses/programmes** have been introduced. The detailed list follows:

- Besides these 14 courses, the addition of two subjects namely Cosmetology and Quantitative Techniques has been made in B.A. and B.Sc. respectively.
- Two research centres have also been established post accreditation.
- **Guru Nanak Studies Centre** has been set up under the Epoch making social thinkers of India scheme sponsored by UGC.
- Vivekanand Studies centre has also been set up under the above mentioned scheme. Both these centres arrange lectures, hold seminars and conduct activities that are instrumental in promoting teachings of the great thinkers.
- The rationale for introducing these new courses is the institution's commitment and dedication to the cause of women literacy that will certainly lead to women empowerment. For starting these new courses the feedback from stakeholders is, no doubt, a great stimulating factor. We are thankful to UGC and the University in giving support and sanction for introducing new courses and programmes.

CRITERION – II TEACHING, LEARNING & EVALUATION

2.1. STUDENT ENROLMENT AND PROFILE

2.1.1. How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The institution has been adopting planned and detailed steps for the admission since its inception. Proper emphasis is laid on publicity mechanism and maintaining transparency in the admission process.

- 1. **PUBLICITY:** The College ensures wide publicity of the admission process in an intended manner. Information about the courses being offered and admission dates is notified to the prospective students through various means.
- a) **Prospectus:** The College Prospectus contains detailed information about variety of courses available, eligibility criteria, faculty profile, student support services, fee structure etc. along with admission form. It is provided to the students aspiring for admission at the time of admission.
- b) **Institutional Website and Canvassing Campaign:** The institution has a website that provides detailed information about the various courses offered in the College. The college maintains public contacts through website and telephone numbers. The College contacts the Principals of nearby schools as well as the schools of adjoining villages. After having procured the lists from the feeder schools, a committee of members personally visits these schools to conduct canvassing.
- c) Advertisement in Print and Electronic Media: Admission notice is published in leading local, regional and national daily newspapers. The information regarding admission is also provided on the local cable network in the form of tickertape during prime time.
- d) **Pamphlets and Banners/Hoardings:** Pamphlets containing information about courses and free coaching classes during summer vacations are distributed in the vicinity in newspapers through hawkers. Banners and hoardings are also installed at prime places, college gate and buses run by the institution.
- e) **College Magazine and Newsletter:** Details about achievements of the students and campus activities are included in the College Magazine 'GOVIND' and Newsletter 'SUNSHINE SD'. It also contributes to publicity mechanism.

f) **Educational Fairs:** The College also participates in educational fairs to give career counselling to the students and attract them to this prestigious institution.

TRANSPARENCY

For ensuring transparency in the admission process a well devised mechanism is being adopted. The institute follows all the rules and regulations laid down by the University. The College prospectus includes all these rules, eligibility conditions for each course, admission dates and fee structure.

- All information regarding admission or change in admission dates or criteria notified by the university is displayed on the notice boards and students are informed well in time.
- Counselling committee facilitates the students at the time of admission. It guides them to make an appropriate choice of stream/subjects according to their aptitude, interest and aspirations. The detail about the job avenues of each course is also included in the prospectus.
- Examination section gives complete information about the eligibility of each course and caters to the queries of the students for verification of their eligibility.
- Proper record of the students is maintained during and after the admission process. This record is accessible to both the faculty and the administrative staff.
- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process at the time of admission (Ex. ADMISSION PROCESS

The College offers multiple Post Graduate, Under Graduate, UGC Granted Career Oriented Add on Courses (Under dual degree scheme) and Diploma courses in diverse streams to which a mix of students having excellent academic record as well as weak learners from disadvantaged sections of the society are admitted.

- Admissions are made strictly according to the directives and conditions laid down by the University.
- College prospectus, containing the admission form and details of admission rules, is available at the Reception/Administrative Office and queries about admission process are met on the spot by the office and Counselling Committee.

- The Counselling Committee guides the students in making the right choice of the course they wish to pursue. For this purpose, their interests and eligibility according to the conditions laid down in prospectus are given utmost consideration.
- Students seeking admission in various courses on the basis of their achievements in academics, sports and extracurricular activities are given due weightage and are offered scholarships, freeship and financial aid.
- The eligibility conditions are thoroughly verified.
- Personal interaction with Admission/Screening Committee and finally with the Principal is a part of the admission process. Admission committee checks the admission form thoroughly and the screening committee further scrutinizes the form and checks the eligibility. Finally the student is admitted after having a final nod from the Principal.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the City/District

For all the courses, the college strictly adheres to the university norms. Admissions are granted on the basis of marks in the qualifying examination. The cut-off percentage is somewhat relaxed for the students from deprived sections so as to involve them in the stream of higher education. Besides this excellence in extracurricular and sports activities is also given due weightage, as per university guidelines. Top scorers in various courses are offered freeship and concessions.

Usually all Colleges in the City /District under Guru Nanak Dev University follow the norms laid down by the university regarding eligibility and minimum percentage for admission to all the programmes offered to the learners.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and students profiles annually? If 'Yes', what is the outcome of such an effort, and how it has contributed to the improvement of the processes?

In the present dynamic and challenging scenario of education, it is very essential that one must review the admission process and student profile after the admission process is over. Meetings are conducted at various levels to analyse the student strength, their academic background and economic status from the statistical data obtained.

- After having discussed the issues at length with the concerned committees and departments, decisions are taken to make further improvements in the admission process. Directions are issued by the Principal to take extra measures to improve the student strength and student profile.
- These measures include intensifying the canvassing campaign, publicity mechanism, interaction with the students and collecting their feedback to introduce more courses.

- Departments having lesser number of students are motivated to make efforts to popularise their subjects. On the other hand the demand for additional units is made to the University for the Courses which are more in demand.
- New subjects and courses are regularly added to facilitate the students to opt for the courses of their choice. In the previous years as many as **14 new courses** have been added.
- It is ensured that the admission process is hassle free and students are given the option to change the stream/subjects within a stipulated period of time.
- The **outcome** of reviewing the admission process and student profile annually has been very encouraging. We have been successful in attracting students from all sections of the society. Top scorers in various courses are given freeship while students with outstanding achievements in sports and extra-curricular activities are also given scholarships and financial aid. There has been significant rise in student's strengths in popular courses like B.Com Professional, M.Com, M.Sc. (FD), M.Sc. IT and many more. With the addition of new and innovative courses the college profile has also been strengthened. The college now offers five postgraduate courses, fifteen undergraduate courses, three post graduate diplomas, two undergraduate diplomas, eleven skill oriented Add on Courses and also a foundation course in Human Rights.

The institution is dedicated to make contribution to its national commitment to diversity and inclusion. Concerted efforts are made to increase and improve access for all categories of students.

(a) SC/ST/OBC

- The college ensures social equity and concern for students belonging to SC and ST categories and strategies adopted by the government are implemented.
- There is a provision of Punjab Government Scholarship named Ashirwad for SC/ST students at the time of admission.
- The college provides fee concession and endowment benefits to these students.
- The College extends the facilities of Book Bank to these students.

(b) Women

We are one of the most reputed women colleges of the city, engaged tirelessly in educating females and bringing them into the economic and social mainstream and making them responsible citizens while channelizing their talents and energies in their chosen fields. There is a provision of scholarship for single girl child under the UGC scheme.

(c) Differently Abled

- The institution allows the differently abled students to have admission to the courses of their choice. These students are motivated at every stage in the institution.
- The faculty is sensitized to the needs of differently-abled students during classrooms proceedings.
- The college ensures that all their classes are held on the ground floor only.

(d) Economically Weaker Sections of the Society

- The college caters to the academic needs of students belonging to middle and economically weaker sections of the society.
- The state and central government give scholarships to the poor and deserving students to promote the enrollment of students in higher education and promote the standard of education.
- There is a provision of liberal concessions in fee structure for economically weaker sections of the society and the facility of payment in instalments is also provided to the students of this section.

(e) Minority Community

Every possible help is offered to the students belonging to the minority community. There is a provision of Punjab Government Scholarship for them at the time of admission. Besides liberal financial assistance, fee concession is also provided to these students.

(f) Sports Personnel

Due weightage is given to the students for their excellence in sports activities at state or national level. The College offers them liberal concessions at the time of admission and gives scholarship during the session. Special coaching is arranged for these students so that they can cope up with the syllabus well in time.



- The changing trends in the student profile indicate that in the present scenario the professional courses in Commerce, Fashion Designing and Computer Science are more in demand, students are inclined towards job oriented courses.
- Initiatives to expand the horizons of learning have always been taken by the institution. As per the demand of the changing dynamic employment market and the feedback gathered from all stakeholders, the college has introduced 14 new skill oriented and innovative courses. The college offers a good number of job oriented and professional courses.

2.2 CATERING TO DIVERSE NEEDS OF STUDENTS

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The college stands committed to facilitate the differently abled students. The faculty, the library staff and other allied staff, are well aware of their needs.

- Apart from granting fee concession, the college makes sure that the classes of differently abled students are held at the ground floor only for easy accessibility of services rendered.
- The students having functional and vision disability are provided with writers during examinations. They are also given extra time (half an hour) in the mid semester and final examination.
- Financial assistance is also provided to such students to motivate them.

2.2.2 Does the Institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the Commencement of the Programme? If 'Yes', give details on the process.

The College is well aware of the needs of the students and makes its assessment on the basis of their score in the previous examination.

- A team of Faculty members personally visits the schools of the adjoining areas to interact with the students to create awareness concerning courses available in the institution and motivates them to join the College.
- Students' knowledge, skills, aptitude, etc. are evaluated by the Admission and Counselling Committee during the admission process and they are guided to opt for the programme accordingly.
- The Principal also assesses the knowledge base and needs of the students through personal interview.
- Free pre-coaching classes for students are organized so that the students get information about the streams they want to opt for. Also, it bridges the knowledge gap of the students (if there is any) and helps them to cope up with the course they have chosen.
- Besides, lecturers interact with the students regularly to help them with their diverse needs and challenges.

- 2.2.3 What are strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge /Remedial) Add-On/ Enrichment Courses, etc.
- Free pre-coaching classes are held before admission for the students to bridge the knowledge gap and make them comfortable with the course they have opted for.
- Students' knowledge and skills are assessed through oral and written class tests. If a student finds that she is not able to cope up with a particular subject or combination special attention and coaching is given to the young learner.
- The teachers give a helping hand to educationally disadvantaged students to bridge their knowledge gap. Individual attention is given to them to remove their difficulties.
- The teachers provide special help to players, N.C.C. cadets and the students participating in extracurricular activities.
- Students are encouraged to study simpler books and material related to various subjects is provided to them.
- They are inspired to perform better by creating a healthy competition among them.
- Enrichment Courses like personality development programmes are also conducted to groom students' personality and to motivate them for an innovative and creative mindset.

There are many crash courses as well as Add-On courses to help the students get along comfortably with their chosen stream. The college offers eleven Add on Courses related to vocational fields. Students can opt for any one of these skill oriented Add on courses.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as Gender inclusion environment etc?

The institution is committed to make dedicated efforts to put in its share in national development. Initiatives are taken to sensitize the students on cross cutting issues so that they come out as better human beings and good citizens of the nation.

Gender Inclusion

• The Institute being a pioneer **Women's College** in the region sensitizes its staff and students on issues such as gender inclusion by organising lectures and seminars on Women Empowerment.

- Seminar on 'Role of Women in Information Technology Today and Tomorrow' was organised by Department of Computer Science.
- Women's Day is celebrated by teachers and students wherein faculty members share and deliver lectures on female foeticide, their experiences and knowledge on saving the girl child and other women related issues.
- **Co-curricular Activities** like Essay writing competitions, Debates, Declamation and Paper Presentation Competitions are organised regularly to bring up the contemporary women issues and infuse opinion-making skills in the students.
- Lectures are organised to educate students about legal rights of women, women safety and role of women in the society.
- Marches are arranged to protest against harassment of women and violence against women.
- Free Training to Rural Women regarding pickle making, skin care treatment, stitching and tailoring, tie and dye, etc is imparted during NSS Camps to make them self-employed.
- Students are prepared for **Self-Defence** by the Sports department by giving them training in Judo and Karate.
- Lecturers regularly take up burning social and women issues for thorough **Class Room Discussions** to spread awareness among pupils.
- Women Health is given due attention by organising various events like Yoga camps, Free Health Checkup camps and Lectures by expert doctors on prevention of various diseases.

Environment

- **Go Green club** has been started with a view to create awareness regarding environmental protection.
- Van Mahautsav is celebrated by the NSS and the Red Cross Units of the college by under taking sapling plantation in and off the campus.
- Various activities, such as, Poster Making Competitions, Awareness Ads, Skits, etc. on Environmental Degradation are conducted by different subject societies of the institute.
- **EVS:** College offers the subject of Environment Studies (EVS) as a compulsory subject in one level of the Undergraduate Programmes to make the students aware about environmental issues.

Besides this, programmes like blood donation camps and other community orientation programmes are conducted regularly. All these initiatives develop a sense of accountability in both the staff and students.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/ learning needs of advanced learners?

The institution has made its mark in the University for its Academic Excellence. Top scorers in the district find it their first choice. Every year we admit many students scoring above 90% marks in their previous exams. These advanced learners are given freeship by the authorities. The faculty constantly works towards recognising and polishing them and providing them the required support and rewards to keep them motivated to perform better and better.

- Such students are recognised by the concerned teachers through class interactions, tests, terminal exams, etc.
- Various departmental meetings are convened by the Principal to identify advanced learners. Personal care and attention is given to these students for removal of their difficulties.
- Advanced learners are encouraged to study extra reference books and study material to enhance their knowledge. Special tests and extra home assignments are given to these students
- Students are guided to consult university papers of previous three years to know the pattern of the question papers.
- Students who are scoring high in most of the subjects and are weak in a particular subject are identified. Individual attention is given to them to improve upon the same. Teachers keep full track of such students.
- Students bagging top ranks in the midsemester examinations are given incentives in the form of medals, shields, book prizes, certificates etc at the Annual Prize Distribution Function.
- Felicitation Function is also organized in the beginning of the session to honour students securing top positions and merit positions in the University.
- Photographs of toppers and merit holders are published in the Prospectus, Newsletter 'Sunshine SD' and the College Magazine 'Govind'. These are also put up on the notice board.
- Financial aid is provided to them through Student's Aid Fund and Scholarships. Meritorious and needy students are granted financial aid by various philanthropist bodies and individual donors.

- Books are issued to meritorious students from the library for the whole session.
- Top students are motivated to take part in Quiz Competitions, Group Discussions, Seminars and Paper Presentations. Thus they are inspired to perform better by creating a healthy competition among them.
- Further, such learners are motivated for higher seats of learning and top most career options. A number of motivational lectures are organized to channelize their potential towards accomplishing higher goals in their lives.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyse and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economical weaker sections etc.)?

India, being a land of diversity has big gaps in the structure of its society. A large section of the society is under privileged. For contributing to National Development it is indeed imperative to conduct academic audit to identify the students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged students and slow learners and take initiatives to redress their issues to bring them in the main stream of education.

- The college has a very efficient evaluation and examination system.
- Dropouts and slow learners are identified after the mid semester exams.
- Regular track of their attendance is kept to identify the dropout cases.
- For each programme there is a committee to keep check on absenteism.
- Shortage of attendance is regularly reported in the office and timely action is taken.

Measures

Slow Learners:

- Parents /Guardians are given intimation about the results and shortage of lectures of their wards and they are requested to meet the concerned faculty who suggest methods of improvisation. Feedback from the parents is given due importance.
- The morale of the slow learners is boosted by counselling and continuous interaction. They are also given extra learning materials and solved question papers so as to improve themselves.

- Special periodic tests for slow learners are conducted to enable them to perform better in final examination.
- Peer learning is encouraged by creating groups in the class. This creates an atmosphere of healthy competition among them.
- Daily assignments are given to them and are checked thoroughly by the concerned lecturer.
- These students are given simpler books and study material to improve their understanding.
- Special tests are conducted for weak students.

Disadvantaged / Economically Weaker Sections:

- There is a provision of Punjab Government Scholarship for them.
- Financial assistance and need cum merit based fee concession is also given.
- Free books are arranged for such students.

Dropout Cases

Special attention is provided to the dropout cases. Efforts are made to diagnose the reasons behind every case. Psychological, socio-psychological, financial or all other issues are redressed accordingly.

2.3 TEACHING -LEARNING EXPERIENCE

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organise the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic, Calendar, Teaching plan, Evaluation, blue print etc.)

The planning of teaching, learning and evaluation Schedules is done in the beginning of the session. Meetings of Advisory Council and Planning Forum are conducted to discuss the schedule and a blueprint of the same is prepared.

Teaching Plan

• As the college is affiliated to GNDU, Amritsar, it has to adhere to the academic calendar issued by the university. The calendar notifies the admission dates, examination schedule and schedule of holidays. The calendar is published in the Prospectus and students' Identity card. A reminder of details of this information is also given in the classes and morning assembly from time to time.

- Workloads of the departments are prepared and classes are allocated to the faculty members as per their areas of expertise.
- Time table committee prepares the timetable. Syllabus for the current semester is downloaded from the university website and demand for books is given to the librarian.
- Teachers prepare their teaching plan keeping in mind abilities and learning needs of their students. Proper division of the syllabus is done. The implementation of this teaching plan is ensured and departmental meetings are held regularly to monitor the progress of the departments.
- The teaching plan is constantly revised as the lecturers identify slow and advanced learners and adjust their pace accordingly.
- Extra classes are also held during Autumn/Winter Break and on Sundays for conducting tests or to help weak students. Sufficient time period is allocated for revision of the syllabus.

Evaluation Plan

- Class tests and Mid semester exams are conducted. Date sheet is displayed on the Notice board well in time.
- Announcement regarding examinations, methods of examinations and other general information is also given in the Morning Assembly and in classes.
- Students are given checked answer sheets of mid semester examinations which helps them identify their weak points and they are guided to improve their performance.
- Re-exam of participants of Youth Club and Sports with proper date sheet is conducted.
- Students who excel academically are awarded annually in the Prize Distribution Function, before their final exams to motivate them to work harder.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve teaching learning process?

IQAC constantly works to improve teaching learning process by taking the following initiatives.

- Providing the development and application of quality benchmarks/parameters for the various academic and administrative activities of the institution.
- Monitoring promotion, implementation and continuous improvement of the curriculum of various classes.

- Bringing new and innovative co-curricular and extra-curricular activities to improve the overall personality of the students.
- Working towards enhancement of the learners' knowledge and capacity.
- Introducing new job oriented courses as per changing trends in education. Organizing lectures, seminars and workshops on various cross cutting issues.
- Modernizing and upgrading infrastructure and equipments and organizing training for the same.
- Introducing advanced teaching aids to facilitate the teaching learning process, thereby enhancing students' understanding and participation level.
- Improving the procedure of teacher's evaluation to elevate the institutional quality at academic level.
- Facilitating research activities and organising various faculty development programmes.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student- centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students.

The college has made conscious efforts to make the learning process more students centric. Various support structures and systems are in place for the teachers to inculcate skill based learning in the students.

- Lecture method of teaching is supplemented with Guest lectures, Seminars, Audio and Video Aids such as Slides, Overhead projectors, Video CDs, Audio CDs, Models, Charts, etc.
- The teachers use interactive boards with interactive panels, Visualizers, Projectors and Mimeo-Pad in Smart Class Rooms. PowerPoint Presentation transparencies are used with the help of Multi-Media Projectors. All these methods promote interactive learning.
- Industrial Visits and Educational Tours to different places are arranged by different departments to enhance the learner's knowledge. Students are also given exposure to actual workplaces such as banks, Public and private concerns and various institutions and establishments.
- Students are encouraged to consult journals and competition magazines.
- Along with theory portion, due emphasis is given to practical training. Students of professional courses are given hands on training and they attend workshops. Students undertake internship as per the requirement of their course.
- E-learning is also promoted among students. They are guided and motivated to download E-material related to their subjects.

- Debates, Declamations, Quiz Competitions, Paper Presentations are conducted to promote independent learning and imbibe competitive skills.
- Students participate in exhibitions, fashion shows and fairs. It helps to inculcate an innovative outlook and enhances their skill base.
- Group Discussions are organised to encourage collaborative learning. Students are assigned projects and assignments where they need to acquire skills to work with other fellow students.
- Various societies and clubs conduct activities to develop the spirit of collaborative efforts towards contemporary issues.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, Creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into Life-long learners and innovators?

The college arranges academic discourses, sports and extra curricular activities to foster critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students. Efforts are made by the faculty to inculcate in them the qualities, values and skills that would last a life time.

Critical Thinking: In order to promote critical thinking among the students a very vital role is played by the **Central Association.** It is an Apex body of the students. Two elected members from each class are enrolled as members of this body. The main aim of the Central Association is to promote critical thinking, values of responsibility and commitment. Students execute, control and manage various student related and other activities of the college. It gives them an opportunity to use their judgement and human resource. The college has about a dozen other subject societies also where students holding executive posts get an opportunity to conduct various events.

Creativity: The College makes concerted efforts to promote creativity among the students. College Youth Welfare Club conducts various competitions to bring out the latent talent of the students and provides exposure to them to display their creativity. Students participate in various Inter College Competitions and Youth Festival organized by Guru Nanak Dev University. Bundles of prizes won by our students bear a testimony to their creativity.

Go Green Club and Department of Fine Arts took to reviving the great grand art of 70's, i.e., Graffiti. The students painted the outer wall of the department and displayed their creativity. Students also prepare

PowerPoint presentations on social issues and charts and other material related to special events and display them on key points in the college

College Magazine 'Govind' is published every year. It provides a platform to the students to pour out their creativity via writing and editing. Students contribute their creative writings to different sections of the magazine.

Wall magazine is maintained by various departments and is again a useful platform for students to showcase their creativity.

Activities organized by various clubs and subject societies include **celebration of special days** like Teej, Lohri, Independence Day, Teachers Day, Diwali, Basant Panchmi etc. Such activities give exposure to students and promote their creativity.

Scientific Temper: To develop scientific temper among the students, the faculty engages them in practical sessions, hands on training and workshops. Students are encouraged to make optimal use of ICT. Preparing PowerPoint presentations is a routine with students from professional courses. Probing questions are asked in the classes and brain storming sessions are a means of inculcating scientific temper in the students.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the Faculty for effective teaching? e.g. –Virtual Laboratories, e-learning –resources from National Programmes on Technology Enhanced learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through information and communication technology (NME-ICT), Open Educational Resources, Mobile education etc?

The institute promotes the optimal use of ICT with its modern tools and innovations for enhancement of its teaching learning process. Faculty members use various ICT facilities and technologies to make their teaching methods effective.

- The faculty makes use of ICT and audio visual aids in the classrooms. It helps the students understand the concepts in a better way.
- The institution has provided five smart class rooms with ultra modern techniques of teaching which makes teaching and learning more effective.

- Computers with internet facility are made available to all major departments to facilitate the faculty to include ICT in its pedagogical tools. The teaching departments have well equipped laboratories with 162 computers, latest softwares, printers and scanners. Students are encouraged to make projects and PowerPoint presentations to enrich their learning experience. Slides and transparencies are prepared by both faculty and the students.
- Department of English uses audio visual aids available in the language laboratory while teaching phonetics. For courses in communication skills the faculty makes use of the ICT to teach the students right pronunciation and fluency in spoken English. Students are made to watch the plays prescribed in their curriculum on the projectors to have a better understanding.
- Access to learning is facilitated to the students through ICT, E-learning resources and downloaded study material. It is indeed very effective in enriching teaching learning process.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended Learning, Expert Lectures, Seminars, Workshops etc ?

In order to expose the students to advanced level of knowledge and skills the college takes the following initiatives.

- The college conducts lectures and seminars by experts on various topics. The faculty members and students are encouraged to participate in these seminars.
- The institution encourages the teachers to attend Faculty Development Programmes organised by it from time to time.
- The faculty members attend Refresher courses and Orientation courses to refresh their knowledge and intellect.
- The College Library has subscribed to various Research Journals on different subjects. In addition to this the books and encyclopaedias purchased by library are a rich source of knowledge upgradation.
- Keeping in mind the advancements in ICT, the college has moved ahead of its peers by including it in its teaching tools. Students of Post graduate courses are encouraged to use these facilities and for that purpose computerised laboratories have been attached to these departments.
- Educational tours are also organised by the college every year.
- For effective blended learning the faculty does not limit itself to lectures on theory portion only. They engage the students in practical sessions, group discussions and inter class competitions.

2.3.7 Detail (Process and the Number of Students benefitted) on the academic, personal and psychosocial support and guidance services (Professional/Counselling /Mentoring /Academic Advise) provided to students.

Academic Support Services: The College supports the students by providing academic counselling at the time of admission. The counselling committee guides the students to make the choice of subjects/ streams as per their aptitude, and aspirations. The information about admission dates, eligibility conditions and other documentation is included in the prospectus and is also displayed on the notice boards to make the admission process hassle free.

- The students are informed about their timetable, syllabus, list of books and teaching plan in the beginning of the session. During the session advanced learners, slow learners and dropouts are identified well in time and they are provided study material and counselling services as per their requirement.
- Students are facilitated to use ICT and E-Learning material in the well equipped and computerized laboratories of their respective departments.
- Top scorers are given freeship and there is a provision for scholarship and financial aid. Book Bank Facility can be used by the students to get free books for the whole session.
- Students participating in the sports and extra curriculur activities are given extra coaching by the faculty to compensate for the loss of their learning and special tests are conducted to facilitate them.

Professional Counselling and Mentoring: To facilitate the students with professional counselling and mentoring, Personality Development Cell and Placement Cell remain active throughout the year. The cells also organise lectures, workshops, personality development programmes and campus interviews. The detail of these activities has already been included earlier.

Guidance Services: A student friendly and healthy atmosphere prevalent in the college encourages the students to share their problems with the teachers. Incharges of Central Association also attend to the problems of the students and redress the issues Students can even share their problems with their mentors, Head girl, Vice head girl and other executive members of Central Association. Department of Psychology also gives personal counselling to the students and helps them in finding a solution to their social, psychological and personal problems. It also conducts seminars and workshops on handling examination stress.

2.3.8 Provide details of Innovative teaching approach /methods adopted by the faculty during last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

Innovative teaching approaches and methods are adopted by the faculty to make the teaching learning more effective. The institution makes constant efforts to encourage faculty to adopt the innovative approaches by conducting faculty development programmes.

- The faculty uses ICT including computer, internet and audio visual aids for enrichment of knowledge and learning experience. Various softwares are being used by the departments for effective curriculum delivery.
- The faculty makes optimal use of Smart Class Rooms which are equipped with digital Interactive boards, Interactive panels, visualisers, projectors and mimeopads. The faculty also uses Power Point Presentation transparencies while delivering lectures.
- The faculty makes efforts to complement the academic system with practical skills. Due weightage is given to the practical portion of the syllabi and students are engaged in practical sessions.
- Hands on work experience are integrated into academic agenda in almost all practical subjects. Students of Home Science, Fashion Designing, Commerce, Fine Arts and many more departments are given hands on training and are given exposure to workshops and on field training. To mention a few cases, the students of commerce are given training in Tally; Computer aided Accountancy, filing income tax and wealth tax returns. Students of Fashion Designing visit Industrial Houses to get first hand experience of the manufacturing and designing process.
- Students are given assignments on case studies, small projects, preparing slides and transparencies and preparing project reports. These activities give them a comprehensive understanding of the topics.
- E-Collage presentation, Extempore, Ad-mad shows and many more competitions are organised for students to enhance their knowledge on latest issues.
- Guest lectures by subject experts and eminent scholars are arranged and students are taken out for educational tours. Such initiatives prove effective for knowledge upgradation.
- Departments of languages provide the learners with the facility to watch enactments of various plays before reading the text. This helps them have a better understanding of the text.

- To supplement the classroom knowledge students are taken for visits to places of historical and cultural importance like Anandpur Sahib, Jalianwala Bagh, Viras-te-Khalsa, Rangla Punjab etc. to get a better overview of their rich culture and historical events.
- Students are involved in group discussions, inter- class quiz competitions, essay writing contests, paper presentation and mock vivas. It enriches their learning experience and they exploit their knowledge reservoir.

2.3.9 How are the Library resources used to augment the teaching learning process?

The institution has a centralised library which caters to the needs of the students and the staff. The Library staff is student and teacher friendly and helps them to make the best use of the resources. It keeps the faculty and the students updated regarding its latest acquisitions. The library provides the following services:

- The library has a rich collection of **36741books** on various subjects such as languages, social sciences, commerce, computer science, life sciences, general knowledge and other relevant areas. The library has also subscribed to **90 journals** and magazines and **23 newspapers**. The range of subjects and books reflects our institution's ever-growing zest for newer areas of study and research.
- Students are encouraged to make use of the library card provided to them. This enables them to get the books issued from the library. Regular Readers in the library are awarded shields and certificates at the Annual Prize Distribution Function.
- Internet Connection in the Library also provides opportunity for students and faculty to make use of materials and information available on different sites. It broadens the resource for their study materials.
- The college library has subscribed to the N-list scheme of INFLIBNET. Under this programme, members login for accessing the E-resources.
- A Book Bank functions in the college and provides books to the underprivileged students. The Book Bank is managed by a committee of teachers and library volunteers.
- Old question papers of final exams in all the subjects are made available to the students.Both advanced learners and slow learners can use these papers for revising their course content and get an overview of the style of question paper.
- Regular upgradation of software and other ICT facilities is also ensured.

- The Library provides Xerox facility to its readers. This enables them to get the required and nonissuable reading material xeroxed at very nominal rates.
- The browsing centre in the library facilitates the students to access e-learning content and download study material by using search engines.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes' elaborate on the Challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

- The college follows the Semester system.
- At the end of each session, Heads of the Departments submit workload for their respective faculty. At the beginning of the session, the syllabus for the semester is suitably divided. Planning for completing it within the planned time frame and calendar is done well in time.
- The institute takes care that the college activities and functions are planned in such a way that they do not hamper the classes.
- Heads of Departments monitor periodic review of the syllabus to keep pace with the University Calendar and examination schedules.
- The teachers manage to deliver their responsibilities successfully by engaging special classes as per requirement.
- Inter departmental adjustments are made in the time table. If a teacher finds it difficult to complete the syllabus in a particular subject for certain reasons, other subjects' teachers can be requested to pool in some teaching time for that particular subject.
- Using their initiative the faculty makes adjustments in teaching time devoted to particular topic in a subject. Lengthy topics can be summed up or written notes can be passed on to speed up the process. This gives them more time for revision of important topics.
- Provision is kept for discussion on other related topics, extra material, university papers and revision work. Care is taken that syllabi is covered and revised thoroughly in each term.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

Quality of teaching learning is monitored and evaluated thoroughly by the institution by adopting the following mechanism:

- Departmental meeting are held to monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning.
- Regular tests are conducted in classes to identify advanced and slow learners. They are then guided as per their needs. Advanced learners are advised to consult extra-study material while weaker ones are asked to consult simpler books. Their performance is regularly discussed in departmental meetings and remedial steps are taken well in time.
- Every effort is made by the teachers to finish the syllabus within stipulated timeframe. Extra classes are held on Sundays, Autumn/Winter Vacations, etc. so that appropriate time is devoted to revision.
- Lists of lecture shortages are also prepared. Students and their parents are then informed of the same.
 It is compulsory to attend 75% of the lectures. Strict action is taken against irregular students and fines and penalties are imposed on them to improve their attendance in the class.
- Two Mid-Semester examinations are also conducted so that the students and teachers get aware of the performance and plan necessary improvements before the final exams. Teachers collect answer sheets on the day of the exam and discuss performance of the students on the very first day the class is held after the examinations are over.
- Results are prepared by the faculty at the end of each term and are submitted in the office. These are then discussed with the Principal. Co-ordination is made between various departments and if a student is found weak in a particular subject, the concerned lecturers are told to pay individual attention to improve the same.
- Self Appraisal performas are filled by the faculty members at the end of each session.

This extra effort on the part of the Principal, teachers and students proves very effective. Students secure top positions in University and a large number of merit positions are won in University examinations. It also improves the over all pass percentage of the college.

2.4 TEACHER QUALITY

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in Planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resources (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum. Yes, the college has a sanction facthe required number of qualified and competent teachers to handle all the programmes. The college has sanctioned faculty strength of 38 full time and 3 part time teachers but due to the ban of recruitment imposed by the State Government only 22 posts have been filled. There are 11 permanent (Unaided) and 8 contracutcal faculty members and 40 teachers have been appointed on adhoc basis. The college has 81 teachers on rolls at present.

Faculty Profile of the College

The college always strives to recruit and retain teachers who are competent, experienced and experts in their respective fields of study. The need for faculty recruitment is continuously assessed well in advance before the commencement of the semester. Subject wise and faculty wise workload is prepared by Heads of all Departments at the end of session. A systematic process of recruitment fills the gap.

Recruitment Process of Regular/Contractual Faculty

Regular teachers are appointed through a duly constituted Selection Committee as per DPI (C) Chandigarh /GNDU /U.G.C. norms.

The selection process is as follows:

- The vacancy is advertised in the leading newspapers as per norms laid down by DPI(C) Chandigarh /GNDU /UGC.
- Candidates apply on prescribed forms available in the office.
- Merit list is prepared according to prescribed norms.
- Interview is conducted by the Selection Committee and selections are made on the basis of merit. The eligible and most competent candidates are selected.
- After giving them the appointment letters, their approval is sought from the University and DPI (C) Chandigarh.
- New teaching posts are created when new courses /subjects are introduced in the college. In recent years, new teaching posts have been created in Departments of Computer Science, Economics, Chemistry and Commerce Departments. Guru Nanak Dev University has granted permission to appoint these lecturers on contractual basis and new faculty for these courses has been appointed.

Recruitment process of Adhoc Faculty

Recruitment of Adhoc Faculty is done by Selection Committee consisting of Chairperson of the Governing Body or his /her nominee, the Principal of the College, and the Head of Department as Subject Expert.

Interviews are generally conducted in the last week of May or the first week of June so that the best candidates are available for selection.

Retention of the Faculty

- To retain the faculty, they are paid salaries according to the grades specified by GNDU/UGC. Those who are employed on adhoc basis or contractual basis are offered competitive pay scales and assurance of job.
- The faculty is also provided other facilities like Medical Leave, Casual Leave, etc.

- They are also granted study leave if they wish to upgrade their qualification by pursuing M.Phil. Or Ph.D.
- Above all, the congenial work culture of the institution is a strong factor for the retention of the faculty. It is worth mentioning that faculty is paid their salary on the first day of every month.
- 2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand /scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new Programmes /Modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

With the growing needs and requirements of effective and efficient working personnel, like any other institution, our institution also feels the need to recruit such professionals to teach new/ innovative programmes. Required number of posts is duly advertised in leading and local newspapers and the eligible candidates are called for interviews. Very judicious and practical approach is followed while recruiting professionals as it is a matter of the future of the young learners and the college takes it as a huge responsibility over its shoulders to impartially select nothing less than meritorious and highly qualified professionals as lecturers. However, the institution has never faced any problem in finding suitable candidates for recruitment. Perhaps it is due to the work culture and better pay scales that candidates are keen to get a job in this premier institute.

2.4.3 Providing details on staff development programmes during the last four years elaborate on the strategies adopted by the institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

The college administration believes that one word with contribution of faculty members towards institution, faculty's initiatives for self growth should also be prioritised. The institution never fails to provide unflinching support and co-operation to every faculty member and also provides congenial and flexible atmosphere for unrestrained individualistic growth.

To encourage the staff to participate in Refresher courses and Workshops, teachers are given duty leave and other benefits to upgrade their knowledge. During last three years, many of our teachers have participated in a number of State level, National and International Level Seminars and Workshops. All these teacher centric facilities attract the best faculty from adjoining areas.

- The College also provides facility of study leave for pursuing M.Phil and Ph.D in various subjects. Adjustments are made in their time table and they are also exempted from other extension activities of the college.
- Faculty members are motivated to apply for minor/major research projects. They are guided to avail the grant for the same. Seed money is provided for the research projects. Teachers also attend training courses in connection with NCC, NSS and Youth Leadership Camps.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

It is very wisely said that the biggest room is the room for improvement and teachers also need constructive criticism. It helps them to remove their misgivings and find a scope for improving their efficiency and

performance. As such there is no formal mechanism to evaluate the performance of the teachers but the institution indirectly recognizes the erudition, methodology, teaching style, interaction level and pedagogic skills of the teachers in various ways.

Evaluation of teachers by the students

- The class representatives discuss the problem faced by students in learning process with the faculty member. The Heads of Departments make required efforts to redress the issues.
- Students are asked to drop their complaints if any, in the suggestion box and suitable corrective measures are taken for the redressal of their grievances at the earliest.
- Students convey their feeling of gratitude and respect for their respected teachers on Teachers Day, Valedictory function and other suitable occasions.

Evaluation of teachers by external peers

- Organizational qualities of the teachers are evaluated informally by the external peers in the form of dignitaries and guest faculty who visit the college during seminars, workshops, conferences. They convey their observations to the institutional head after interacting with the teachers.
- Academic skills of the teachers are recognized by external peers at the time of their participation as paper presenters, resource persons in national and international conferences and seminars.
- Inspirational and motivational traits of the teachers are given acknowledgement not only within the walls of the classroom but have a lasting impact that affects the students throughout their lives. They remain in touch with their teachers after achieving their targeted goals. They pay respects to the teachers on all occasions through social media and website of the college.

2.5 EVALUATION PROCESS AND REFORMS

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation process?

The institution takes multiple measures to ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation process:

- Detailed information regarding evaluation process is communicated to the students at the beginning of the academic session through College Prospectus, Student's Identity Card and reminders of details of this information is given in classes from time to time.
- Announcements regarding Mid Semester Examinations and other general information are also made in the Morning Assembly and in classes.
- Notices regarding such information are regularly posted on the notice boards.
- Meetings of planning forum are convened by the Principal to inform the heads of various departments to plan and allocate their semester wise work load.
- Students are shown checked answer sheets of internal examinations which makes everything clear to them regarding their performance.
- Parents/Guardians are informed about the performance of their wards.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution?

In order to keep pace with the dynamic changing scenario, the necessary modifications must be initiated and implemented in the evaluation system.

Evaluation Reforms Initiated by the university

Major constructive steps have been taken by the university to modify the evaluation system.

- Semester System has been introduced at all levels for all courses and streams in place of Annual System from session 2012-2013. It has already been initiated in all PG classes.
- The menace of copying has been curbed with the swapping of Invigilation Staff in Semester Examination.
- Answer sheets are marked in evaluation centres set up by the University.
- Transparency is ensured by displaying the results of all programmes on University Website.
- Earlier a student was required to get at least 25% marks in aggregate in one house examination and 75% attendance was compulsory to qualify for the final examination according to University norms. But in semester system, condition to get 25% marks has been relaxed while the condition of 75% attendance is still applicable.
- From the session 2012-13, OMR answer sheets have been introduced.

Evaluation Reforms initiated by the institution

The college has developed a well framed internal System of teaching, higher learning and evaluation. Constructive steps are being taken to modify the evaluation system after taking stock of its effectiveness in the previous years.

Following reforms have been initiated recently in the evaluation system

- Two semester examinations of three hours duration in each subject along with the practical examination and Viva Voce are conducted in the month of October and April respectively.
- Previously there used to be two sessions, Viz, Morning and Evening in each Terminal Examination, but since 2010-11, the examinations are being conducted in a single session to avoid the wastage of time and resources.
- Academic standing of the students is monitored and assessed through these examinations. Top, average and below average students are categorized on the basis of their performance by their teachers.
- Special attention, extra coaching and guidance is given to the top and meritorious students and efforts are made to improve the performance of the students lagging behind.
- Weak students are identified and teachers keep full track of such students. This improves their overall performance in the examination. Special class tests and assignments help them improve their performance.
- Flexibility in examination schedule is provided to students participating in sports, extra curricular activities and in cases of emergency.
- Parents/Guardians are given intimation about the performance of their wards. Parents-teacher meeting is organized in cases where parents can also give their input for improving the performance of their wards.
- The collective and strenuous efforts made by the Principal and members of the faculty result in improvement of learning skills of the students. It enables them to perform better in university examinations and to bring laurels for their institution.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The institution ensures effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own. The examination committee works efficiently under the guidance of the Principal.

- All the instructions issued by the university via email or website are notified well in time to the stakeholders. Eligibility rules, Examination schedule and other instructions given by the university are adhered to.
- The Faculty members perform duties as suprintedent and supervisors according to the duties allotted to them. They also contribute in marking the answersheets at the evaluation centres set up by the university.
- The examination committee prepares its calendar for conducting mid semester exams and class tests, prepares the date sheet and ensures smooth conduct of these exams by allocating duties to the faculty. Question papers for these exams are also set on university pattern.
- The examination committee further ensures that the award lists and lists for lecture shortage are submitted in time so that the information to the guardians can be sent well in time.
- The internal assessment is dispatched to the university in time and care is taken that all the rules and regulations are followed properly.
- Departmental meetings are conducted to ensure and co-ordinate the identification of advanced learners and slow leaners.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Students' achievements on the academic front are measured through both formative and summative evaluation approaches.

Formative Evaluation approach: Formative approach involves measuring the students' learning through verbal skills, group discussions, seminars and power-point presentations. Special class tests are held for the top students and slow learners. For Internal Assessment, class tests and home assignments are given due weightage.

Summative Evaluation approach: Summative evaluation is done during mid-semester exams held in the month of October and April.

- The University Semester Examination is the final summative assessment. The results of the summative assessment are analysed in the meetings so that remedial steps can be taken.
- Students appear in competitive examinations conducted by various agencies at district, state and national level.
- Assessment of the students is also made on basis of projects and seminars conducted in the class

Positive impact on the system

- The college is known for its Academic Excellence in Northern India.
- The college bags a good number of top positions and many merit positions in University examinations every year.
- The college pass percentage in all the classes always exceeds that of the University and in a majority of programmes it is 100%.
- 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.).

The parameters such as academic performance, class attendance, participation in co-curricular activities, behavioural aspects etc. are fixed and are followed by the teachers to evaluate and give the assessment. To ensure rigor and transparency in the internal assessment, the college keeps record of projects assessed internally for two years for any re-evaluation if ever sought. Students participating in certain co-curricular activities or sports are given special chance to appear in mid semester exams so as to give them their due weightage in internal assessment.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The core values specified by NAAC have been adopted as graduate attributes. The institute envisions building a class of intellectually, morally and globally competent skilled human resource well equipped to

face the challenges of the dynamic environment. Keeping in mind the changes and consequent shift in value system, the institution strives to inculcate five core values specified by NAAC.

• Contributing to National Development:

The college is playing an integral role in human resource development and capacity building of students, to cater to the needs of the economy, society and the country as a whole, thereby contributing to the development of the nation. By serving the cause of social justice, ensuring equity and increasing access to higher education, the college is contributing to National Development. Independence Day, Voters Day, Republic Day and other festivals are celebrated with great enthusiasm by various Departments and Clubs to foster the spirit of patriotism in the students. Many community development programmes are organized by NCC, NSS, Youth Red Cross and other subject societies with an aim to inculcate the spirit of performing civic duties and to sensitize the young learners about their duties towards the society and nation.

• Fostering Global Competencies among students:

With liberalization and globalization of economic activities the need to develop skilled human resource is imperative. The college always strives to prepare its students to achieve core competencies, to face the global requirements successfully. The college adopts innovative, creative and entrepreneurial approach to ensure skill development amongst the students. Youth welfare club of the college aims at bringing out the latent talent of the budding artists and provides exposure to the students for all round development of their personalities. Placement Cell provides career counseling and helps in the placement of the students. It organizes job-fairs/ campus interviews in collaboration with various industries and companies. It also organizes workshops, mock interviews, training programmes and visits by professionals to prepare the students for the selection process.

• Inculcating a Value System among students:

The college shoulders the responsibility of inculcating a strong value system amongst the students. The college ensures that the students imbibe appropriate values commensurate with social, cultural, economic and environmental realities.

• Promoting the use of technology:

Young learners must be well prepared to face the challenges of the dynamic environment. The institution is making its best efforts to create competitive academic environment by continuous enrichment of teaching

and learning, through the medium of information and communication technology (ICT) and other technological advancemens. In academics whole emphasis has shifted from the traditional concept of writing and learning to building up a strong human resource that can cater to the changing needs of the modern world. The college has five smart class rooms. Students are taught through multimedia content related to their syllabus. IT infrastructure is augmented on a regular basis. Departments have their laboratories with computers, internet facility and required software.

• Quest for excellence:

The institution envisions the pursuit of the academic advancement and quest for excellence in the field of higher education. The college motto **"Do your job well"** helps us to excel and transform our learning and knowledge into skills in the service of women empowerment and humanity. Transversing the path of excellence, the institution has displayed significant milestones in achievement of its goals and mission. Whether it is academic front or extra-curricular front, the college is excelling in all the fields. The College is known for its academic excellence. A good number of student's bag top positions and many students are placed in university merit list every year. Competitive spirit is inculcated among the students through quiz competitions, group discussions, debates, essay writing competitions, PowerPoint presentations, and class seminars. Students bag prizes in various items in Youth Festival every year.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

Evaluation Grievance Redressal Mechanism in the College

The college ensures full transparency in the process of evaluation. Marked Answer sheets are shown to the students so that they can analyse their mistakes and weaknesses and improve upon their performance in annual examination. If students have any complaint regarding the evaluation method, discrepancy in totaling of marks, unmarked questions, there is provision for re-evaluation and re- totaling. Unmarked questions are checked on the spot.

University Evaluation Grievance Redressal Mechanism in the University

At university level also if the students are not satisfied with their score they can apply for re-evaluation of their answer sheets within 15 days of the declaration of the final results. The university sends these answer

sheets to some other examiners for rechecking. The university takes strict action against the examiner if it finds any lapse in the evaluation process. Students are given a chance to re-appear if their score is below 35% but above 20% in any subject. The University also gives special chance for examination to the candidate who missed their papers due to some emergency.

2.6 STUDENT PERFORMANCE AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes, the college has clearly stated learning outcomes mentioned in Vision, Mission and Objectives statement of the college, i.e., Empowerment and Enlightenment of Women through quality and value-based education aimed at fostering informed global minds. The institution envisions the pursuit of the academic advancement and the excellence in the field of Higher Education. Embodying a macro vision on a micro base, the institute envisions building a class of intellectually, morally and globally competent skilled human resource well equipped to face the challenges of the dynamic environment. The college motto '**Do Your Job Well'** helps us to excel and transform learning and knowledge into skills in the service of women empowerment and humanity. Inculcation of the five core values specified by NAAC is fully ensured.

Students are made aware of these learning outcomes with the help of resources like College Prospectus, College Magazine 'Govind', Bi- Annual Newsletter Sunshine SD, Institutional website, Annual Report of the college, Educational fairs and Alumni Meet.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/ programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/ achievements (Programme / course wise for last four year) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/ courses offered.

(a) Mode of Monitoring and Communication of Performance and Progress of Students

• The college monitors overall performance of students through Mid-Semester Examinations. Result statement and shortages of lectures are sent to Parents/ Guardians so that they remain in touch with the performance of their wards. Whenever necessary, Guardians are also asked to meet the Principal and the concerned teachers personally.

- Results pro forma are prepared after the declaration of the results of Semester Examinations. Comparison of pass percentages of the college subject wise and program wise with that of university is indicated.
- Monitoring in class is done through oral and written tests and group discussions. Difficulties of the students are removed so that comprehensive preparation is assured.
- Students are encouraged to excel academically and in extra curricular activities with incentives like medals, certificates, book prizes and shields at Annual Prize Distribution Function. Good academic record is also one of the main considerations for selection of office-bearers of different associations.
- The Principal convenes meetings of various departments to identify top students on the basis of Class Performance and Semester Examination. If a student shows excellent performance in most of the subjects but lags behind in a particular subject, efforts are made by individual teachers for their improvement. Students are given extra material and home assignments according to their capabilities. These extra efforts on the part of Principal, Teachers and Students are very effective and help students in securing top and merit positions in the University.

(b) Analysis of Results of Students

The college has got a distinct position in Guru Nanak Dev University and also a name in Northern India for its academic excellence which is the result of extreme duty consciousness and sincere hard work of the faculty and students of college. Due to effective teaching, learning and evaluation methods, the college has been winning top positions in various university examinations. 2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

Various strategies are adopted and structured in order to achieve the desired learning outcomes.

• Teachers plan their unitized syllabi in each semester. Care is taken that syllabi is covered and revised thoroughly in each term.

- Lecture method of teaching is supplemented with Guest Lectures, Seminars, Group discussions, Power Point Presentations, Quiz Competitions, Debates, and Declamations etc.
- Resource Persons of repute give lectures to students to update their knowledge and help them comprehend various concepts.
- Various departments arrange industrial visits and educational tours to different places to educate students and to enhance their knowledge. Students are also given exposure to actual workplaces such as banks, government and private offices and various institutions and establishments.
- Exhibitions and fairs are arranged to enable students to display their work and to explore innovative ideas.
- Internet and INFLIBNET connections in the library also provide opportunity for students and faculty to make use of materials and information available on different sites. It supplements the resources for their study materials.
- The Performance of the students in their respective subjects is ascertained on the basis of their marks, scored in mid- Semester Examinations.

All these approaches help to create a supportive and a positive learning environment in the college.

2.6.4 What are the measures/ initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

The institution ensures that new and innovative courses being offered are in compliance with the current requirements of the globalized world by introducing various interdisciplinary courses of study. Multiple measures have been adopted to enhance social and economic relevance of the courses.

- NCC, NSS, Red Cross unit and other subject societies are actively involved in conducting Community Orientation Programmes with an aim to inculcate the spirit of performing civic duties and to sensitise the young learners about their duties towards the society.
- Awareness and education about Human Rights has always been our major concern. A step in this direction has been taken by the Department of Political Science. It has started a Foundation Course

in Human Rights from the session 2011-12. The department keeps organizing students' activities to accelerate the awareness campaign for Human Rights.

- Guru Nanak Studies Centre and Vivekanand Studies Centre have also been established recently. These centres strive to provide insight into the contemporary Socio- Economic Scenario.
- For improving the employable and life skills and to give better career options, the college keeps introducing new courses based on the feedback collected from different sources and as per the demands of the dynamic market. In the last five years **14 New Courses** have been introduced. Most of these courses are Job Oriented and give better career options to the students.
- Placement cell of the college makes endeavours to get students placed in reputed Multinationals, Government jobs, NGO's and Private sector. Personality development and grooming Courses are organised for the students.
- The Institution has embedded many innovative steps and strategies to enrich curriculum courses and pedagogical skills. Observing the need of the market and changing global scenario and to meet the latest requirements of the trade, industry and business, a new innovative course Masters in Business Economics and Information Technology was designed and introduced in 2014-15. Eleven Add-on Courses covering various vocational subjects are being offered to the learners to hone their skills and enrich their knowledge.
- Today, Fashion Designing has evolved as a full-fledged industry engaged in creating innovative garments. B.Sc in Fashion Designing, M.Sc in Fashion Designing and Merchandising and P.G. Diplomas and Diplomas in Textile Designing, Fashion Designing, Dress Designing and tailoring have been introduced to provide extensive knowledge and skills in designing and merchandising.
- Courses in TV and Video Production, Cosmetology and Leather Processing Technology having practical utility, have been introduced to increase the potential for employability for the students.
- The College Faculty instils research aptitude in the students by giving them minor projects. Students of Commerce and Computer Science departments are assigned such projects. Students of Post graduate courses also contribute research papers in journals.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Examination Committee regulates and collects the data of the two mid semester examinations. After every mid semester examination, staff meetings and departmental meetings are held to analyze the students'

performance. After that, Students are divided into different categories according to their performance in examination and their attendance in the class. Generally students are categorized as slow, average and advanced learners. In order to improve the performance of the students of different categories, efforts are made by the faculty in different ways;

- Holding special coaching classes for the average students and slow learners.
- Providing question banks and discussion of university question papers for advanced learners.
- Advanced learners are encouraged and motivated to read reference books and journals to know the latest developments.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The college is a premiere institution in the field of education and aims to increase the employability quotient of the students. It strives to make its students creative, strategic and critical thinkers with highly developed problem solving skills. Students are trained to communicate effectively and exhibit a positive work attitude in order to achieve successful outcomes. The college monitors and ensure the attainment of learning outcome through the following initiatives:

- Academic standing of the students is monitored and ensured through class performance, internal tests and semester examination. Regularity and Punctuality are checked and the students are advised to improve by way of corrective and reformative actions.
- The college is not only known for its academic excellence but also for its highly competent, hardworking and meritorious faculty. The Faculty is best suited to determine the educational outcomes of their academic program and activities. The institution and faculty use evaluation/ assessment as an indicator for monitoring student performance. The Faculty members duly motivate the students and give them personalized attention.
- In order to expose the students to advanced level of knowledge and skills, seminars, guest lectures, workshops, industrial visits and educational trips are organised by different departments regularly. The college also arranges different awareness programmes on women literacy, environment, health, save water, spiritual development and yoga, disaster management through NSS, NCC, Red Cross Unit and Go Green Club.

CRITERION – III RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

3.1 **PROMOTION OF RESEARCH**

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research centers of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

The college runs two research centres. It has Guru Nanak Studies Centre allotted by UGC under Epoch Making Social Thinkers of India Scheme to promote research on teachings of Guru Nanak Dev Ji. In Session 2012-13, UGC also allotted Vivekananda Studies Centre to the college under the same scheme. The faculty members are actively engaged in pursuing research activities.

3.1.2 Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

To monitor and address the issues of research, the Principal holds regular meetings with members of IQAC and various heads of the departments. The objective of such meetings is to inspire and guide the faculty for research and to update their knowledge regarding various fellowships and facilitate them in applying for the same.

Recommendations

- To encourage Faculty Members to apply for Minor and Major Research Projects.
- To motivate faculty members to pursue higher studies like M-Phil, Ph.D.
- To motivate the departments to conduct national level seminars, workshops, inter-departmental seminars on current and vibrant issues and publish research journals.
- To inspire faculty members and the students of Post Graduate classes to participate in Seminars, Conferences, and Workshops and to publish research work.
- To add more research Journals in the Library and to seek collaborations with industries and signing MOU with them so as to give good exposure to the students.

CRITERION-III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

Impact of Recommendations of Research Committee.

- Members of faculty are motivated to take up research projects. At present 2 minor research projects are going on and 9 faculty members have applied to UGC for Minor Research Projects.
- 6 faculty members have applied to UGC for Major research projects.
- The faculty members actively participate in national and international seminars and conferences.

Department of Computer Science have entered in to collaboration with industries/ Professional Institutions/Training Institutes. Students keep visiting industries from time to time to have practical exposure of the critical concepts taught.
- During service 14 faculty members completed their M.Phil and 7 faculty members completed their Ph.D. Two faculty members from Department of Chemistry and 1 faculty member from the Department of Punjabi are persuing Ph.D.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

To facilitate smooth progress and implementation of Research Schemes, the college provides full support to researchers in -

- Availing grants and funds from UGC
- Providing monetary help to faculty till grant is not released by UGC
- Reducing teaching load and flexible time table
- Granting duty leave for going in field to collect data

- Sanctioning purchase of books in concerned areas
- Providing support in terms of technology and information need such as internet facility, computer printer facility, library facility and INFLIBNET facility.
- Providing appropriate support in the form of time, space, equipment in a timely and prompt fashion.
- Establishing linkage with industry and corporate sector.
- Facilitating timely auditing and submission of utilization certificates to the funding authorities.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

To develop scientific temper and research aptitude among students, the following efforts have been made by the college.

- Students are motivated to take up research projects which help in creating mindset for inquiry and also inculcate an analytical aptitude and scientific temperament. Students of M.Com analyze data by using SPSS software. Students of PGDCA and BCA Part II take up short projects which they can complete in one month and students of BCA III take up major projects of 300 marks.
- 2. As a part of developing the aptitude for research, students are always encouraged to participate in various seminars and workshops organized by college as well as by other institutions and present their research papers.
- 3. Various departments of the college also organize seminars, workshops and training programmes to create awareness among students as well as to get an opportunity to meet with the expertise of guest faculty.
- 4. To create the zeal among students, the college has procured latest equipments, updated the library facility and subscribed to journals and INFLIBNET facility.
- 5. In the modern hi-tech and cyber world, computer and internet access is a necessity. Keeping this in mind, a leased line internet connection has been provided in the campus. Internet facility through two towers of Dreamtel, one Airtel connection, one BSNL connection and data cards is also provided. Free access has been provided to students to cater to their information need.
- 6. 5 new Smart Class Rooms have been added in the infrastructure to train the students to work in challenging environment, where everyone requires instant information. These rooms are equipped with various facilities like interactive boards, projectors, PC's (Dell), mimeopads, interactive penals and visualizers.

CRITERION-III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

- 7. Library is equipped with PCs and internet facility so that students can search their notes. All the books in the library are updated by library software. Photocopy machine is also provided in the library to facilitate the students.
- 8. Journals, Magazines and Books of National and International level are available in the college library for the use of students.
- 9. PG students have Research Methodology as a subject in their curriculum. For their guidance, distinguished persons of related area are invited regularly.
- Softwares required for various professional courses are available in departments of Commerce, Computer science and Fashion Designing. The detailed list has been given in criterion IV under IT Infrastructure.

3.1.8 Enumerate the efforts of the institution in attracting researchers of eminence to visit the campus and interact with teachers and students?

National Seminars, Workshops and Lectures are conducted with an aim to invite eminent personalities to the college for motivating faculty and students to imbibe and enhance their knowledge. The departments keep on inviting academicians, industry experts and researchers from reputed institutions to interact with the students of both UG and PG level. The resource persons are provided TA/DA and honorarium for visiting the campus.

3.1.9 What percentage of the faculty has utilized Sabbatical Leave for research activities? How has the provision contributed to improve the quality of research and imbibe research culture on the campus?

The Institution grants duty leave to faculty for participating and presenting papers at National and International conferences. Faculty members who are pursuing research work are permitted to take leave as per UGC norms. The institution provides them help in research work in the form of flexible time table, reduced work load and sharing of their work load with other faculty members of the department, internet facility and INFLIBNET facility. During non-teaching days, relaxation is given to them from examination duties and other responsibilities. The active involvement in research during their leave revamps the academic strength of the faculty members and it directly improves the academic quality of students in the campus on their return.

3.1.10 Provide details of the initiatives taken up by the institution in creating awareness / advocating / transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community (lab to land)

The institution always encourages the departments to conduct seminars, workshops and training programmes for creating awareness among students about latest research. The awareness about latest research available at institution level and university level is shared with the faculty, students and persons from all walks of life by conducting National Seminars, Publication of Research Journals. During post accreditation period **19 Research Journals** have been published. **3 Peer Reviewed Journals** are in pipeline. To promote development in learning and research the college has organized as many as 22 national seminars in post accreditation period. One UGC Sponsored National Seminar is going to be held in the month of August. The students and faculty attend seminars and workshops to upgrade their knowledge.

3.2 **RESOURCE MOBILIZATION FOR RESEARCH**

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

The college receives grant from UGC exclusively for Research, Seminars, Workshops, and Minor Research Projects. Over and above the grant, the expenditure is borne by the college from its own resources for infrastructure, learning resources, expenses on inviting eminent scholars, INFLIBNET and internet facility to faculty and students and publication of Research Journals. The college has spent following amount on research publication and purchase of laptops for faculty.

Yes the college has provision to provide seed money to the faculty for research activities. The faculty undertaking Minor Research Projects has been sanctioned a handsome grant by UGC and the same has been well utilized.

3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

Small Research projects are undertaken by students of Computer, Commerce and Management, and Fashion Designing as part of their curriculum. There is no need to provide any financial support to the students for such research projects. However the college provides full support to the students doing project work through library service, INFLIBNET, printing, scanning and internet facilities and required softwares.

3.2.4 How do the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking interdisciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavors and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

The institute has been conducting basic degree program and in these degree programme there is no provision for research work. However for the inculcation of research aptitude in the students, institute takes several initiatives like organizing inter-disciplinary seminars on current and burning issues. The institution has published 19 research journals and faculty members from all departments have contributed articles in these journals. Recently an Inter-disciplinary Post Graduate Course 'Master of Business, Economics and Information Technology (MBEIT) has been introduced. The syllabi of this course has been jointly designed by PG Department of Commerce and Management, Department of Economics and PG Department of Computer Science.

3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

To create zeal among the students and faculty towards research, the college has procured latest equipments, updated the library facilities and subscribed to journals. The available research facilities such as general library, INFLIBNET, internet connectivity, Softwares like SPSS, Tally ERP 9, computing facilities and electronic equipments are used on a shared basis by the students and faculty members. Each department has required infrastructure and instruments for basic research work. Internet connectivity has also been provided in many departments to help them review their academic and research programmes. The institution makes every possible effort to ensure that the students should be facilitated to use the equipments, books, journals and magazines beyond the college timings and also during summer/winter vacations.

• Besides this Periodic updating and upgradation of the scientific equipment is made. Training is provided to lab attendants and students in the efficient handling of laboratory equipment in science labs.

3.2.6 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facility? If 'yes' give details.

The institution has received following grants from UGC for setting up laboratories

3.3 RESEARCH FACILITIES

3.3.1 What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

As mentioned earlier, each department has relevant infrastructure and instruments for basic research work. All the main departments are provided with a computer and internet facility. Major facilities available in the campus for students and research scholars are: -

- a) 5 smart class rooms with various facilities like Interactive Boards, Projectors, PC's (DELL), Mimiopad, Integrative Penals.
- b) College library has a **browsing centre** with desktop computers, printers, and reprography and internet facility for students as well as faculty members.
- c) College library has also introduced **INFLIBNET** facility to get information on recent development from all over the world.

- Well equipped laboratories of Science courses like Physics, Chemistry, Biology and Computer Sciences, B.Sc. (Fashion Designing) etc.
- e) Accounting lab in Commerce Department with necessary softwares for research like SPSS.
- f) Digital **language lab** in English Department to improve Communication Skills.
- g) 7 **Computer labs** with internet facility and a Computer Center. Spacious computer lab for MBEIT course is under construction and likely to completed in the month of May.
- h) 8 Fashion Designing Labs with Softwares for project work like Garment CAD System (TNG Technologies), Rich Peace Garment CAD Software and Garment CAD System (Fashion CAD).
- i) The library is kept open from 9 am to 4 pm on all working days and summer vacations.
- Books, Journals & Magazines of National and International repute are available in the college library for the use of students and researchers.
- k) One conference room (With AC) and a spacious AC auditorium are available in the college to organize national seminars/workshops. The auditorium is equipped with multimedia projectors and other facilities for conducting successful events.

3.3.2 What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers especially in the new and emerging areas of research?

The Management takes active interest in the infrastructural needs of the college and offers liberal funds whenever the needs arise. The Management procures new equipments as per requirement i.e as and when the student strength increases or a new course is added. Moreover the strategy of the institution is to encourage more faculty members to pursue Ph.D. work, to apply for financial assistance to UGC and other funding agencies in the form of major and minor research projects in emerging areas which would help to improve the existing knowledge and infrastructure.

3.3.3 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities? If 'yes', what are the instruments/ facilities created during the last four years

We have received a grant from UGC for Rs. 10, 00,000, Rs. 5, 00,000 and Rs.10, 00,000 for setting up of a web designing lab, computer aided accounting lab and leather processing technology respectively.

Infrastructure available in these labs in used by the staff and Post Graduate students for undertaking their projects. We have also received Rs. 3, 00,000 from Councellor Development Fund for the purchase of computers.

3.3.4 What are the research facilities made available to the students and research scholars outside the campus / other research laboratories?

The institute has entered into collaborations with some Companies, Industries and Professional Bodies to train students from Commerce and Fashion Designing departments and various other departments. Students visit these industrial houses and companies on a regular basis.

3.3.5 Provide details on the library/ information resource centre or any other facilities available specifically for the researchers?

Facilities available in library specifically beneficial for researchers are as follows:-

- 1. College library is fully computerized and the process is updated regularly.
- 2. The library has a rich collection of 36,741 books. It has also subscribed to 90 journals/ magazines and 23 newspapers.
- The College has joined the National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content (INFLIBNET N-LIST) programmes. It facilitates desktop access to high quality e-resources to students and researchers.
- 4. The library is equipped with computers, Internet facility, Leased line connection, Reprography, Computer and CD Writing facility.
- 5. College library also has a browsing centre with desktop computers and internet facility for students as well as faculty members.
- Various services are provided in the library namely, Cataloguing, Periodicals Content pages delivery, publisher's catalogues, clippings from Newspapers and Journals, special reference section, display material and display of notices and other invitations.

Efforts are being made to have collaborative research facilities in the college campus as per the curriculum of GNDU. The following infrastructure exists in the college which is utilized effectively by the faculty and students from time to time:

Laboratories for Physics, Chemistry and Biology, 7 Computer Labs, Accounting Lab, English Language Lab, 8 specialised laboratories for Department of Fashion Designing, Home Science Labs, 1 lab for MBEIT, Digital library, 5 Smart Class Rooms, Fully Air Conditioned Auditorium and Conference room.

Mrs. Sudesh Sehgal, Head Department of Home Science has completed minor research project granted by UGC on the topic "Changing Food Patterns- Fast Food/ Junk Food/ Processed Food and their effect on Nutritional Status of Adolescent Girls". This study was undertaken to investigate changes in the food consumption pattern and its effect on nutritional profile of adolescent girls. The basic purpose of this study was to find out what efforts should be made to promote healthy practices during adolescence and to protect this age group from nutritional deficiency diseases. It is essential to teach children and adolescents to make wise food choices.

There are regular industrial visits and internship training for students of M.Sc. (FD), M.Sc. (IT). Experts from industry and corporate sectors are invited as resource persons in seminars, workshops and conferences for establishing institute industry interface.

3.5.2 What is the stated policy of the institution to promote consultancy? How is the available expertise advocated and publicized?

The institution always motivates the staff to provide consultancy services as per their intellect and expertise in different areas. For this the institution provides full support to faculty members by permitting them to use infrastructure and other facilities of the college for rendering such services. Faculty members from departments like Commerce, Psychology, Home Science, Fashion Designing, Computer Science and IT, Mathematics, and Economics have been prompted to extend consultancy services in their field. The expertise available in the college is publicized through the college website, prospectus, college magazine 'Govind', students of the institution, parents and by word of mouth, by organizing exhibitions, workshops, demonstrations and extensive lectures from time to time.

3.5.3 How does the institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services?

As mentioned earlier, the institution encourages the staff to provide consultancy by allowing the staff to use the infrastructure and other facilities of the institution free of cost. The college gives recognition and appreciation to staff members engaged in rendering consultancy services.

3.5.4 List the broad areas and major consultancy services provided by the institution and the revenue generated during the last four years.

- Faculty members are frequently consulted by GNDU for framing and upgrading the curriculum. The syllabi of various Add On courses, Post Graduate Diploma in Office Management, Master of Business Economics and Information Technology have been designed by our faculty.
- Our faculty members very frequently act as paper setters for theory exams as well as external examiners for practical subjects not only in GNDU, but also in Punjab University and Punjab Technical University.
- Many members of faculty are invited as subject experts on the interview boards.
- Faculty member of Fine Arts Department, Fashion Designing, Home Science, Dance and Music Departments are often called upon to act as judges in various events organized by colleges of GNDU and other universities.
- At the time of admission, Guidance and Counseling Cell guides the students in selecting the appropriate stream on the basis of their aptitude, interest and future potential.
- Placement Cell of the college in collaboration with the Guidance and Counseling cell gives career guidance to the students and gives them information about the scope and job avenues offered by the various subjects.
- The Department of Home Science provides consultancy services on areas like Nutrition and Dietetics, Food Preservation, Baking, Interior Decoration, Meal Planning, Diet counseling, Household Preservation of locally grown fruits and vegetables, Aesthetics in Clothing, Child Care,

Dress Designing. Hygiene and sanitation. The Department also organizes exhibitions and workshops to teach making of Soft Toys, Printing, Tie and Dye etc.

- The Department of English provides consultancy to the students in improving their language proficiency, speaking skills, personality development and also gives consultancy to the students for participating in various activities, especially, debate, declamation, poetical recitation, quiz and fancy dress competitions.
- Departments of Commerce, Economics, Mathematics, Computer Science, and Fashion Designing provide free pre-coaching classes for the new entrants so that they get a peep into the streams offered before opting for them.
- Department of Commerce provides following consultancy services
 - Coaching to CA students pursuing IPCC Programme.
 - Coaching to CS students undergoing CS Executive and Professional Programme
 - Guidance to Post Graduate students for UGC-NET Exam
 - Career counseling to outgoing students
- Department of Psychology gives personal counselling to the students and helps them in finding a solution to their emotional and personal problems.
- Grievance Redressal Cell provides prompt and adequate redressal of grievances.

All these services have been rendered voluntarily and on philanthropic basis.

3.6 EXTENSION ACTIVITIES AND INSTITUTIONAL SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY (ISR)

3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighbourhood-community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

The college aims at providing quality and value-based education. The college motto 'Do Your Job well' highlights its noble mission. Apart from the usual academic curriculum, the college promotes the inculcation of moral values, the spirit of self-reliance, self control and discipline in the students. Emphasis is laid on the all round healthy development of the girls. To make them responsible and law-abiding citizens, the NSS and NCC units play an active role. Blood donation camps, Pulse polio-camps, Tree plantation, Traffic awareness programmes, celebration of special days like World Peace Day, Human Rights Day, World Aids Day are some of the activities aimed at promoting social awareness and nationalism. The Central Association and Youth Club of the college give a fillip to discipline, self reliance and self control. Regular Lectures and discourses are organized by the college to instill and strengthen moral values among the students. To inculcate civic responsibilities and a strict sense of discipline among the students and to make them good citizens, the college encourages students to participate in Yoga and Meditation classes and camps, Medical camps, Youth Welfare camps, Youth Leadership Camps, NSS Camps and NCC Camps. Students are encouraged to participate in patriotic functions held at Desh Bhagat Yadgar Hall, Jalandhar and to participate in all the National functions like Independence Day Celebrations and Republic Day Celebrations and functions organized in the memory of great martyrs and patriots of our Motherland. In order to bring smiles on the faces of deprived people, NSS and NCC volunteers go to Old Age Homes/Pinglaghar/Orphanage houses and spend quality time with the inmates and distribute gifts etc. Staff and students make liberal contributions in the form of money and clothes in case of natural calamities like floods, famines, earthquakes and Tsunami. All these activities lead to the holistic development of the students.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

The college has deputed senior faculty members for community network and to convince and attract students to get involved in various social programs/activities which promote citizenship roles. At the time of admission, students are motivated by Counselling Cell to join various extension activities like NCC, NSS, Youth Club, Red Cross unit. Proper enrollment is done in NCC units. Before enrollment, motivational lectures are arranged so as to motivate maximum number of students to join these activities. Whenever students are involved in any social programmes or activities, the incharges of the respective units track the involvement of the students. The attendance of the students in these activities is taken without failure. The students, who actively participate in these extension activities throughout the year, are awarded certificates and medals at the Annual Prize Distribution Function so as to encourage other students to come forward and participate in community network programmes.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

Feedback from stakeholders is of great importance for the college as it propels the institution on the path of development, growth and success. The institution always solicits the views of the stakeholders like students, parents, and alumni, faculty members on the overall performance and quality of the institution. The feedback received from them on different programmes undertaken by the college provides adequate input for the assessment of performance and quality of the institution.

Students

- The Central Association is an apex body of students. Each year elections are held. One student from each class is nominated as representative. She interacts with the students regarding their needs/grievances and reports the same to the respective teacher. Further the class teacher takes initiative in discussing the same with the Principal and concerned HOD.
- Suggestions given by the students through the suggestion boxes are properly attended to and action is taken as per requirement.
- Students have the freedom to approach the Principal during working hours without prior appointment.

Parents

- Parents are well informed about the performance and attendance of their ward.
- Parent teacher meeting is organized in whatever cases it is necessary and suitable measures are adopted for improving of performance of students.
- Parents are cordially invited to the college functions. They are encouraged to associate themselves with the development and social activities of the college.
- Suggestions from parents for improvement are always welcomed.
- Parents are allowed to meet the Principal and the teachers on any working day during the college timings to make any enquiry about their ward.

Staff

- Regular staff meetings are conducted to discuss important issues regarding academics / administration / cultural events & sports issues.
- Decisions for smooth working of the institution are taken after discussions in various meetings.

Alumni

- Healthy and informal relations are maintained with the members of the Alumni Association. They visit the college and extend their help, support and cooperation. Their suggestions for further improvement are always welcome.
- They meet regularly and also participate in various functions of the college.
- Members of Alumni Association also contribute articles to college magazine 'Govind' and Alumanac through this platform they express their views about their Alma-mater.

Members of the Managing Committee always welcome the suggestions that are put forward by the stakeholders.

3.6.4 How does the institution plan and organize its extension and outreach programmes? Providing the budgetary details for last four years, list the major extension and outreach programmes and their impact on the overall development of students.

Every academic year the schedule of extension and outreach programmes is planned and executed by the incharges of different cells like NSS, NCC, Youth Club, Red Cross Unit and Go-Green Club. The college

3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/ International agencies?

The college is aware of the fact that extension activities are essential for all round development of the personality of the students. At the time of admission, the incharges of NCC, NSS, Red Cross Unit and Youth Club apprise students of the benefits and scope of the extension activities. The information regarding all the clubs and committees and extension activities is disseminated through prospectus so as to facilitate students in their choice of activity. To promote the participation of students in extension activities like NCC/NSS/Red Cross Unit, students are enrolled in these units in the beginning of year and their records are maintained by the incharges.

To motivate students to participate in extension activities the following measures are taken:

- Students are given extra facilities and incentives in the form of medals, certificates, scholarships and fee concessions.
- The students are also informed about the additional marks/credit given to them for their service in NSS and marks in clearing 'B' and 'C' certificate exams in NCC for getting admission to several courses.
- The college fully supports the cadets who go for camps. They are not levied any fine and their lectures are condoned. Extra classes are arranged for them to help them complete their syllabus.
- College transport is made available to the cadets whenever required.

Faculty members are encouraged to attend Seminars/Refresher/Orientation/Training Courses/Conferences and Workshops. Faculty who show significant contribution in extension activities are felicitated in the annual functions of the college. College administration grants duty leave to the faculty to participate in these activities. This encourages them to participate enthusiastically in extension activities.

The achievements of faculty and students are acclaimed and highlighted in the assembly, college publications and local newspapers, thus promoting their participation. Special incentives and concessions are given to the outstanding performers.

The college takes sincere initiatives to support students of ST, SC, Minorities and OBC Sections of the society.

- State Social affirmative schemes introduced by the government for the upliftment of higher education to under privileged communities, are sincerely implemented by the institution.
- Students belonging to lower income group are given liberal fee concessions and free book bank facility.
- Scholarships are given to children of riot-affected families and needy families.
- Extra care and facilities are given to differently abled students.
- NCC and NSS units organize visits to Pinglaghar, Orphanage, Old Age Homes so as to create spirit of selfless service among the students through works of charity. By celebrating festivals like Diwali and New Year, by raising funds for the inmates of these homes, distributing clothes, sweets and eatables on special days, our students bring a ray of light in the lives of the disadvantaged.
- NCC cadets and NSS volunteers regularly assist the government organizations in various activities like Pulse Polio Drive and Traffic Rules awareness etc.
- College NCC, NSS and Red Cross Unit regularly organize Blood Donation Camps and other community orientation programmes. The details have already been included in extension activities conducted by these units in pt. (3.6.4).

Emphasis is laid on all round healthy development of the girls by inculcating in them confidence, independence and leadership qualities.

Outcomes

- The Motto of NSS 'Not Me But You' inculcates the feelings of service in the hearts of students. Projects of Social Welfare undertaken by NSS Volunteers make them aware of social problems. Working honestly and sincerely for a noble cause is their motto.
- The values of co-operation, humility, tolerance and sacrifice are instilled in the young hearts by making them participate in the Community Orientation Programmes.
- The spirit of selfless service is inculcated through works of charity like visits of NSS and NCC students to Pingalwaras to distribute food and clothing and giving monetary help to the inmates of Pingalawaraand and old age homes.
- To make the students responsible and law abiding citizens, the NSS and NCC play an active role. Blood Donation Camps, Pulse Polio Camps, Tree Plantations and social awareness about AIDS, Cancer are some of the activities organized by NSS and NCC units of our college.
- To instill love and concern for environment, the college has established a 'Go Green Club- Prakriti'.
- The Central Association of the college emphasizes the values of discipline, self reliance and control.

Besides this, the college takes care of moral aspects of students and inculcates love for simple living and high thinking. On every Monday Morning Assembly is held. Inspiring thoughts are delivered by a lecturer and a student during each morning assembly. Extension programmes organised by the institution make the students competent to face social problems and also to become good citizens. Students participating in such activities are better equipped to understand social problems and they would become more confident in life.

3.6.8 How does the institution ensure the involvement of the community in its reach out activities and contribute to the community development? Give detail on the initiatives of the institution that encourage community participation in its activities.

The institution ensures the involvement of the community in various activities like Blood donation camp, Tree plantation, Health related programmes like Yoga, AIDS Awareness, through NCC and NSS progammes. When the NSS unit organizes its activities in nearby villages like Partappur, Kalyanpur or Gakhlan local villagers are initially consulted and the youth of the villages gets involved in all the NSS activities.Blood Donation Camp is held in collaboration with Red Cross Society and Civil Hospital, Jalandhar and Road Safety Programmes are organised in association with the Traffic Police. The institution maintains a good rapport with political and social activisits and organizations, and assures their involvement in the programme undertaken by the college. Intellectuals and Representatives from Local bodies are invited to attend the college functions and to give lectures on social issues and personality development.

The college has maintained healthy relationship with other institutions of the locality for working on extension activities. Extension activities are arranged in association with organizations like PAHAL, Red Cross Unit, Lion's Club, Rotary Club, Traffic Police, and Civil Hospital etc. NSS Unit organizes Tree Plantation; seminars on AIDS Awareness, Traffic Rules and Disaster Management in Collaboration with an NGO PAHAL.Blood Donation Camps are organized in collaboration with Civil Hospital and Red Cross unit. Besides this, activities are arranged in collaboration with NGOs like Lions Club, Rotary Club, Manav Sahyog, Punjab Kesari, and Dainik Bhaskar. These social organizations also give scholarships, books and monetary assistance to the meritorious and needy students. Our students also assist the Government organizations in various activities like Pulse Polio Drive, Traffic Rule awareness and helping the voters to get their voter cards made.

Students of B.Sc. Fashion Designing and M.Sc. Fashion Designing do their internship of 1¹/₂ month in the linked industries. Many get job offers in these industries after successfully completing their training.

c) On the job training

Students of Commerce and Economics are absorbed by banks and Insurance companies.

d) Faculty exchange and development

The institution invites reputed speakers for addressing various issues of relevance. This collaboration helps the faculty in their overall development and to upgrade themselves as per the changing needs of the society and Nation.

e) Research

The institution encourages the faculty members to apply for Major and Minor Research Projects and ensures their participation in International and National Conferences and Publications. The college allows the faculty members to utilize the infrastructure available. INFLIBNET facility, Internet facility has been provided to faculty and students to help them in their research work.

f) Extension

The linkage between NGO's, Red Cross Society, Civil Hospital, Local Bodies and other such organizations facilitates the diversification of extension activities for the betterment of the society. Extension activities develop sense of responsibility amongst students. Through the vast range of extension activities provided by it the college has been able to inculcate a spirit of service in the faculty as well as the students

g) Student Placement

Due to linkages with the industries and various companies, students get maximum placement opportunities in their final year. Many students have been placed through campus interviews over the last five years in various I.T Companies like IBM Daksh, Infosys, HDFC Bank, WIPRO, Banks, Media Houses and Industries.

h) Introduction of new courses

Keeping in mind the changing requirements of the modern scenario, innovative cell of the college encourages innovation in curriculum design. In the last few years 14 new courses have been introduced. An innovative and multifacutly course MBEIT was introduced in the session 2014-15.

The college has also introduced 11 UGC granted job oriented Add on courses.

h) Publication

The college faculty has published a number of books single authored or in collaboration with their colleagues in other colleges.

The college has always been striving to keep pace with the ever changing global scenario and the best possible facilities are made available to the students in order to make them successful professionals, intelligent executives and perfect human beings. Luminaries from across the country are invited to share their views on issues of global significance. Industry academia interface is promoted through industrial visits, interactions with business experts and training programmes.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 PHYSICAL FACILITIES

Situated right in the heart of the city, only a few yards away from Jalandhar Railway Station, PCM S.D. College for Women, a multi faculty institution was founded in 1973. The college has made rapid progress and developed into a big educational centre of higher learning. The college which started with a very humble building has been regularly augmenting its building and infrastructure. The college has **three blocks** - Main Block, IT Block and Collegiate School Block and Brahamkund Playground.

The infrastructural details of the campus include Principal's Office, Administrative Block, Examination Branch, Reception Counter, 3 Libraries, Auditorium with state of the Art facilities, 5 Smart class rooms, 67 class rooms, Music and Dance block, Commerce Block, IT Block, Multi-purpose Yoga Hall, 2 Fine Arts Studios, 3 Home Science Laboratories, 8 Fashion Designing Laboratories, Language Laboratory, Cosmetology Laboratory, Laboratories for Psychology and Office Management and Secretarial Practices, 7 laboratories for Computer courses,1 laboratory for the course MBEIT,1 Computer Centre, T.V and Video Production Studio, Gymnasium, Health Care Centre, 3 Separate Cafeterias, Common rooms, special places for Personality Development Cell, Placement Cell, IQAC, NSS, NCC, Youth Club, Central Association and Youth Red Cross, 2 Book Shops, Store rooms, a fleet of buses, Underground parking place, 3 Generators, Electricity Panel and residential quarters for peons.

4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

- It is a constant practice of the college to keep augmenting its infrastructure in order to enhance the effectiveness of teaching learning process and to provide maximum learning opportunities to the students.
- In the previous years post accreditation 14 new courses have been introduced. Keeping in mind the requirements of these courses and departments, the policies are framed to make strategic and cost effective additions/modifications to the existing infrastructure. The proposal for the new projects is first discussed in the college Advisory Committee headed by the Principal and then it is forwarded to

the Managing Committee. After getting approval of the Managing Committee, various committees are constituted to execute the task.

 The institution applies to UGC for various grants and even seeks funds from MP and MLA quota. We are indeed thankful to UGC for giving sanctioning liberal grants for starting new innovative and inter-disciplinary courses and setting up laboratories for these courses. There is also provision of getting general grant from the UGC. These grants enable the institution to augment its infrastructure. The Managing Committee has also been very supportive in initiating and executing enhancement of infrastructure.

4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

a) Curricular and co-curricular activities- classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.

(i) Spaces for curriculum Transaction

For conducting effective curriculum transaction, the college has **separate blocks** for different faculties-Arts, Commerce and IT. **67 spacious class rooms** with proper ventilation and comfortable furniture are available in the campus.

- 2 Seminar Halls and an Auditorium with state of art facilities for organizing guest lectures and seminars, 3 well stocked Libraries and one browsing centre are also available in the college.
- (ii) Technology enabled learning facilities are provided in the college to enhance the effectiveness of teaching learning process.
- The college has **34 laboratories** for various departments.

(iii) Specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research

- All the laboratories listed above are fully equipped with latest specialized facilities as per the demands of the particular subjects to enhance the teaching learning process.
- **Computer labs** have modern computing methods and access to electronic marvels that serve as invaluable teaching aids. The college has **162 computers** in various departments. Free access to computers and internet is offered to the students.
- **Fashion Designing labs** have a sufficient number of gadgets like Fashion makers, dummies, stitching tables, printing tables, photographic screening tables, knitting machines, looms, computers, printers and latest softwares used for fashion designing and pattern making.
- **Music rooms and Dance studio** have an array of musical instruments and other accessories required to chisel the talent of the students.
- Air conditioned **T.V. and Video production studio** has dark blue curtains to be used as cyclorama behind the sets and also used for the chrome keying. It has two T.V sets, two programme sets, two computers, one Handicam (Sony), one Production Panel Table, one Sun gun light (1000 wats) and two Reflectors.
- All other laboratories for various subjects have also been provided the required equipment, gadgets and tools.
- **5 smart class rooms** have been set up in the college campus. Interactive learning resources available in these smart class rooms can be used by all departments to enhance the effectiveness of teaching learning activities.

b) Extra- curricular activities- sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.

Extra-curricular activities impart meaningful dimensions to student's personality and help in fulfilling the desired purpose of education and learning. The institution not only encourages the students to actively participate in such activities, but also takes care to provide all physical facilities and infrastructure required to undertake these activities.

Sports: Department of Physical Education maintains and runs Physical Education Centre efficiently and provides facilities to students to participate in both indoor and outdoor games. There is a separate section for indoor games in the Sports centre. It also houses a gymnasium with modern equipments for upkeep of health of sportspersons. A spacious multi-purpose Yoga Hall has been constructed recently for yoga sessions, gymnastics, aerobics and table tennis. Health Care Centre is also housed in the Sports department. Players use Brahamkund Playgrounds for practice of outdoor games. Players even go to stadiums provided by the district authorities and practice under the guidance of expert coaches. Transport facility is also provided by the college.

Auditorium: A Hi-tech, centrally airconditioned, acoustically treated auditorium fitted with the latest audiovisual facilities has been set up to conduct intellectual pursuits and quests, celebrations, seminars, guest lectures, spectacular shows and events. It has a capacity of about 200 seats and can be used by various associations, societies and clubs to conduct co-curricular activities and extension activities.

NSS Centre: 4 NSS units actively operating under the banner 'Not Me But You' have been provided a working space in the NSS centre. The infrastructure of this centre includes, a meeting room, a store room for utensils and other material. The volunteers are given transport facility by the college. For boarding and lodging during camp days the college campus is used. Blood donation camps and other activities are conducted in the auditorium.

NCC Centre: NCC unit of the college has enrolled 55 cadets, NCC centre has a spacious room with an indoor firing range in it. The centre has a stacking area for uniforms and other materials.

Cultural activities Centre: Youth club of the college operates from its self contained space provided to it. This room has storage units for material and equipments required for various cultural events. For conducting

cultural activities, seminar halls, auditorium and the open stage can be used. Reherarsals for various items can be carried out in the college campus after the study hours.

Communication Skills Development Centres: For developing and polishing the communication skills of the students, the College has a well equipped Language Lab and Personality Development Centre.

Yoga: The College has a spacious yoga hall with a good number of mats and audio video system for practicing yoga and conducting other activities like yoga camps and faculty development programmes in yoga.

Health and Hygiene: The College takes special care of health and hygiene of the students. Health care centre is housed in the Department of Physical Education. A sick room with the first-aid facilities is available for the students. The library staff also helps the sick students by giving required medicine, first-aid services and other required material. For other serious problems, the services of two neighbourhood doctors, Dr. D.V. Arora and Dr. Raghubir Singh are readiy available.

Toilets and Safe Drinking Water:

- Toilets are provided to the students on all three floors and efforts are made to keep them neat and clean.
- Health care camps and lectures on health related issues are regularly conducted.
- There is provision of R.O. purified drinking water at various palces on all three floors.
- Cleanliness committee has been constituted which makes a regular audit of the cleanliness in the campus and takes remedial steps.
- 4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed / augmented and the amount spent during the last four years (Enclose the Master Plan of the Institution/campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansions if any).

Since its establishment in 1974, the College has been making efforts to augment its infrastructure to keep pace with its academic growth and achievements. Strategic efforts are made for the augmentation of the available infrastructure to ensure that it is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized. Apart

from undertaking the renovation of the existing infrastructure, the college has upgraded the laboratories and added additional instruments and equipments in the laboratories. IT infrastructure has been augmented with the addition of computers, CCTV cameras, LCDs, Biometric Attendance System and improved internet connectivity. The details of the initiatives taken for augmentation and the amount spent for it are given below:

Optimum Utilization of Infrastructure

The newly built physical infrastructure as well as existing infrastructure is furnished with furniture and required equipments to facilitate teaching and research and efforts are made for its optimal utilization.

- The college provides its campus/premises for social activities like, Art of Living Camps, Yoga Camps and other local tournaments and for conducting exams of Banks, Insurance Companies, University and Staff Selection Commission on Sundays and other holidays.
- The District Administration also uses the college premises during M.P/ M.L.A/ Local Bodies elections also and for preparing voter cards, setting up voting booths and preparing aadhar cards.
- The College premises are also used for holding NTT and CTT classes in the evening. The infrastructure is also used for conducting hobby classes during holidays and summer vacations.
- Some short term computer courses, personality development programmes, coaching classes for the various entrance exams and some job oriented programs are also conducted by various departments.
- To ensure optimum utilization of its infrastructural facilities, the library remains open from 9 am to 4 pm.
- 5 smart classrooms, auditorium, seminar halls and learning resources are shared by all departments to ensure their optimum utilization.

Future Plan for expansion of physical infrastructure:

In the near future, the college plans to make the following additions to the existing facilities:

- Hostel Facility
- Placement and Counseling Cell in IT-Block
- One computer lab for MBEIT
- Faculty Study Room in IT-Block
- Wi-Fi Campus for all three blocks
- Biometric Attendance System in all blocks of the campus
- Public Address System
- Automated admission, Fee and Payroll System
- E- Notice Boards
- Online Attendance System of students
- 2 LEDs for common room and the third block
- More computers and smart rooms

4.1.4 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructural facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

The institute ensures that infrastructural facilities meet the requirements of the students with physical disabilities. For differently-abled students, it is ensured that they don't have any physical obstruction. The institution is committed to accommodate them on the ground-floor. Library facility is provided to them. The needs of the physically challenged students are fulfilled by the supporting staff. The college is also planning to construct a ramp in the near future.

4.1.5 Give details on the residential facility and various provisions available within them.

Hostel Facility: The College plans to provide this facility in the near future. The managing committee is making sincere efforts to procure land for constructing the hostel building. Meanwhile the students from outside areas reside in paying guest accomodations available in the neighbourhood of the institution. Since the college is situated in the heart of the city, such accommodations are easily available in the houses adjoining the college campus.

4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

Health care services are provided by the Department of Physical Education in the medical room attached to it. First aid facility is available to all students. The library staff also helps the students in case of emergency and provides first aid. For other serious problems two neighbourhood doctors visit the institution and provide their services.

4.1.7 Give details of the Common Facilities available on the campus –spaces for special units like IQAC, Grievance Redressal unit, Women's Cell, Counseling and Career Guidance, Placement Unit, Health Centre, Canteen, recreational spaces for staff and students, safe drinking water facility, auditorium, etc.

Common Facilities:

• **IQAC**: IQAC room remains the hub of the activity. The infrastructure in the IQAC includes a computer, a printer, and copier cum scanner and storage units to maintain the records.

- **Grievance Redressal Unit**: This unit works in coordination with Central Association of the college and it has its own self contained spaces in the respective departments.
- Placement Cell and Personality Development Cell: Both these cells operate from the room marked for Personality Development Cell. The room is equipped with a projector and computer system to facilitate personality development programmes. Placement cell uses the auditorium for conducting on campus interviews and for organizing lectures and workshops.
- Recreational facilities for staff and students: The College takes care to provide recreational facilities to the students. Infrastructural provisions for this cause include a fully equipped gymnasium, common rooms, and facilities for indoor games, tennis, and a yoga hall, Cosmetology lab to provide beauty treatment and services and arranging educational trips.
- Internet connection, laptops, LCDs: Internet connection is readily available in all blocks. The details of these services are included in IT infrastructure. Computers have been provided to all major departments. Laptops are also issued to various departments and cells as per their requirement. LCDs have been installed in the visitor's room and corridors. All college activities and documentaries on social issues are displayed regularly.
- **CCTV Cameras**: 44 CCTV Cameras have been installed at key positions in the college to ensure security of students and staff and to monitor day to day working in various laboratories and offices.
- Fire extinguishers, generators and water coolers with purifiers have been made available in the campus. The college has three generators in all three blocks.
- **Canteen**: Separate canteens are functioning in all blocks of the college and a strict watch is kept on the quality control and hygiene by the Canteen Committees.
- **Book bank:** The college library provides this service to facilitate the needy and deserving students.
- Auditorium: There is provision of a hi-tech, air conditioned and well equipped auditorium. It is used by all departments to hold functions, seminars, workshops and other activities.
- **Toilets and Safe drinking water**: The institute takes care that all students have an access to neat and clean toilets. This provision is available on all three floors. Regular supply of safe drinking water is ensured. Any complaint regarding these issues is redressed at the earliest.

Last but not the least the above mentioned facilities available in the college are accessible to all. It is said that joint responsibility is no man's responsibility. Hence concerted efforts are made for maintenance of these common facilities.

4.2 LIBRARY AS A LEARNING RESOURCE

The institution has separate libraries for all three blocks. The library has a rich collection of 36741 books on various subjects such as Languages, Social sciences, Commerce, Computer science, Life sciences, General knowledge and other related areas. The library has also subscribed to 90 journals and magazines and 23 newspapers.

The library has an Advisory committee comprising the following members:

The committee takes following initiatives to make the library, student / user friendly:

- Proper allocation of the budget is ensured and new titles are added every year in consultation with the concerned departments.
- The information regarding new arrivals is also given through the college notice board.
- The new titles are displayed on the display boards at the entrance of the library.
- The library staff keeps the faculty and the students updated regarding its latest acquisitions.
- A Book Bank has been functioning in the college. It provides books to the needy and deserving students. The Book Bank is managed by a committee of teachers and library volunteers. Text books are issued to the students for the whole session. The faculty and students are encouraged to donate books to the Book Bank.
- Old question papers of final exams in all the subjects are made available to the students.
- It ensures the availability of latest syllabi in the library.
- The browsing centre provides access to e-learning resources.
- Regular upgradation of softwares and other ICT facilities is ensured.

- The library staff is student and teacher friendly and helps them to make the best use of the resources.
- It takes remedial actions towards grievances expressed by the faculty and students.

The college has a very efficient and well devised mechanism to ensure the purchase of text books. The Principal of the college issues a notice and requisitions for books are invited from all the heads of departments. Book bank: It provides books to the needy and deserving students. The Book Bank is managed by a committee of teachers and library volunteers. Books are issued to the needy students for the whole session. Both the faculty and students donate books to the book bank.

The library staff provides the following support services to the faculty and the students.

CRITERION-IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.3.2 Detail on the computer and internet facility made available to the faculty and students on the campus and off-campus?

The Institution has computer and internet facility for both the faculty and the students in the following offices and laboratories:

- **10 computer laboratories** equipped with PCs of latest configuration in departments of Computer Science, Fashion Designing and Commerce.
- There are total **177 computers** in the college and **170** computers have high speed Internet facility.
- The Principal's office, the Administrative Block and many other departments of the college have the facility of internet.
- To provide wireless connectivity, the college provides facility of **WIFI**, **laptops as well as Tablets**.
- The college has 3 **Computerized Libraries**. The browsing centre in the library gives access to elearning material.
- 2 Data cards (Tata Photon) are provided for off campus internet connectivity.
- All labs are inter connected using latest D-Link CAT 6 wires, and latest switches.

Internet Connection:

Students and faculty members can enrich their knowledge and can get the latest information of the whole world by using high speed Internet leased line connection. The details are given below:-

- Dreamtel (Leased Line, 2 Mbps), (2:1 dedicated) in IT block for all computer Labs.
- Dreamtel (Leased Line, 1Mbps), (1:1 dedicated) in Main block Computer Labs of various departments (Video production, Fashion designing, Commerce, Computers, Office Management) and office use.
- Airtel (1 Mbps, Broadband,) in Main block for office use and high speed Internet Leased Line Connection of 3Mbps is available in the college for faculty and students.
- BSNL (512 Kbps, Broadband) in collegiate school for computer lab and office use.
- 8 Static IP addresses, MRTG Graph and Unlimited data usage.

4.3.3 What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

The institute makes dedicated efforts for infrastructural upgradation. Every year, the college ensures that IT facilities are augmented and upgraded as per the requirements, by purchasing new hardware as well as software for different departments/offices/cells. The institution plans to upgrade the IT infrastructure and associate facilities to fulfill the requirements of the students either due to increase in strength or modification in the syllabi and to resolve the compatibility issues due to rapid changes in the IT sector within a short period of time, PG Department of Computer Science and IT keeps replacing the non functional parts with new parts from time to time.

4.3.4 Provide details on the provision made in the annual budget for procurement, upgradation, deployment and maintenance of the computers and their accessories in the institution (Year wise for last four years)

There is flexibility in annual budget allocation for procurement, upgradation and maintenance of the computers and their accessories. Due to increase in strength of students studying Computer science, frequent changes in the curriculum and rapid development in the field of IT sector, the college has added **104 new computers** with latest configuration, **5 printers**, **12 projectors**, **3 projector screens**, **5 LCDs**, **7 Laptops**, **44 CCTV Cameras**, **2 scanners**, **1 Biometric machine**, **3 Photostate machines**, **1 Server (IBMX3300M4)** with latest configuration. Latest **networking in computer labs**, High speed **leased line internet connection and** Smart class room equipments (such as **5** Interactive Boards, **5** Interactive panels, **5** visualizers, **5** Stylus, **2** Memio Pads)have also been provided. For maintenance and upkeep of the computers and other IT infrastructure, the institution has fulltime lab attendants, who manage the whole campus area networking and handle the troubleshooting of computer systems and other accessories. When the warranty period of the items is over, the college maintains the equipments on its own. In case of major hardware problems, the college takes the services of hardware engineers from the market.

4.3.5 How does the institution facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/ learning materials by its staff and students?

The institution facilitates extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/ learning materials to its staff and students.

CRITERION-IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

- Many departments of the institution have Smart class rooms having various ICT facilities. There is provision of adequate computer facility for the faculty. Faculty members are also provided with **internet browsing facility** on each computer for preparation of teaching/learning materials in their respective departments.
- Well equipped computer Labs with latest computers, projectors and printers in the college are accessible to both the faculty and the students.
- The college also has **seminar halls equipped with latest equipments**.
- Internet facility and e-library is thrown open to the faculty members for accessing learning resources.
- Internet connectivity is available in the entire institution through wired and wireless connectivity. For internet, the college is using **3 Mbps leased line facility** in all the computers installed in various labs and departments as well as in offices and the library.
- Use of technology has become very vital in imparting quality based education. For encouraging ICT based teaching and learning, the college also organizes training sessions on the use of Smart class rooms.
- The computer faculty is always available for any need based assistance in the use of ICT.

In addition to the above mentioned facilities, the college also provides the following facilities:

CCTV: College labs and all key points are under CCTV surveillance. Online monitoring of campus is also supported through static IP addresses.

Website: pcmsdcollegeonline.com: Dynamic website gives information about the college, various departments, their achievements and events. It has been developed in PHP technology and is maintained by the faculty members.

Bulk SMS Service: This service is used to provide important information about results, admissions and college events to the management, faculty and parents of students. (URL: http:/103.27.87.89.Profile Id: 1177)

Every department has its own e-mail id for departmental purposes and research.

Biometric Machine: A Biometric Machine is installed in the main block. It helps in automation of attendance of the employees and can help in tracking the in and out time of employees and total work duration.

4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching - learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms / learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.

Thrust is given to ICT (Information and Communication Technology) enabled teaching-learning process to make it effective and more student centric. Various ICT enabled facilities and smart class rooms are provided. All major departments have been provided computers of latest configuration with High speed 24 hours leased line internet facility. The college has been conducting Workshops for the faculty on the use of computers. Training sessions on the use of Internet as a learning resource are also organized. Well-equipped computer Labs, Smart class rooms, LCDs, Projectors, printers, scanners are available to facilitate computer aided teaching and to enrich the teaching learning experience. The students and faculty members have also been provided with WIFI connection as well as wired connectivity so that they can access online material for teaching/learning. OPAC (Online Public Access of the library catalogue) is available on college intranet. The college library subscribes to the N-list scheme of INFLIBNET. There is participation of library in INFLIBNET which enables the students and staff to access valuable e-resources and download study material from websites falling under UGC-INFLIBNET digital library consortium.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

For maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college various committees have been constituted. Some of the committees formed for this purpose are:

- General Cleanliness Committee
- Canteen Committee
- Bus Service Committee
- Campus Beautification Committee
- Maintenance Committees for all laboratories

The College also uses the expertise of the architects and interior decorators for the campus upkeep.

The heads of various departments maintain property and stock register. Annual stock taking is conducted at departmental level and the report is submitted to the Principal.

• The college has appointed security guards to keep a constant vigil on the college infrastructure. CCTV cameras have been installed at all key positions. Residential facility is also provided to the security guards and other class IV employees to ensure safety, security and cleanliness of the campus at all hours.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

Annual maintenance and repair of the infrastructure is undertaken by the college in a systematic manner. Day to day maintenance is carried out by the staff appointed for cleaning and maintenance of the laboratories. The computers, electronic devices and other equipment are maintained and repaired through the funds available in the institution. We have a team of qualified technical staff for maintaining computers and networking facilities. The college has tie ups with the service providers who make periodic visits for the upkeep of instruments.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

The college has specified places for the sensitive equipments like electricity generators, water purifiers, chemicals and scientific instruments. The college have set up its Electricity Panel with proper arrangements for handling voltage fluctuations and efficient handling of electricity supply. There is overhead water tank with submersible water pump for regular supply of water. The laboratory staff keeps a strict vigil regarding the maintenance and upkeep of the scientific instruments and Chemicals. Their repair, replacement and upkeep is fully undertaken by them. Similarly, the college electrician and the supporting staff are available for the upkeep of electrical equipments and their maintenance. The institution has a tie up with the company from which the RO purifiers were bought and the institution pays AMC to the firm for the regular and routine check up and upkeep of the purifiers.

Any other relevant information regarding infrastructure and learning resources with the college would like to include.

Transport

The college has four buses that ferry the students on all working days. Transport facility is also provided to students for participating in co-curricular activities, extension activities and sports activities.

Public Address System

The college has its public address system for conducting Morning Assembly. It is also used for making important announcements.

Rest Rooms

There are separate rest rooms for the staff and students in the campus. These are cleaned and maintained by the attendants in charge of this area. Toilets are available for students on all floors and their cleanliness is ensured. The washrooms for the faculty have been renovated recently.

Vehicle Parking

The institute has parking facility in every block for students and staff. It comprises four wheeler parking, two wheeler parking, college bus parking and open parking for visitors also.

Telephone

Telephone facility is also available for students inside the campus at the reception. Students can make use of it in case of emergency.

Water Harvesting System

Rain Water Harvesting Technique is successfully implemented in the college. It has been done to lift the depleting underground water level of the earth. We have three water tanks to store water. One is attached to the Corporation well and the other two are attached to our own tube wells. Sensors are installed to check the overflow of water tanks. Regular cleaning of all the water tanks is undertaken by the experts. The plumber regularly checks all the pipes and thus there is no possibility of leakage. All water coolers are equipped with water purifying Aqua Guards

5.1 STUDENT MENTORING AND SUPPORT

The list of faculty members is updated annually. Information about student support services conducive to student's progression like Library, Health Care Centre, Youth Club, Central Association, NSS, NCC, College Bus Service, Alumni Association, Placement Cell etc is available in the Prospectus. The prospectus is made available to the students at the beginning of the academic year during the time of admission.
- The college website www.pcmsdcollegeonline.com has all the relevant information/guidelines to provide necessary assistance to the students.
- The Newsletter 'SD SUNSHINE' disseminates information regarding infrastructural additions, positions in the university and achievements of Sports, NCC, Red Cross and Youth Welfare Department. Activities of the various clubs, committees and different departments are also highlighted. Various Annual Events of the College are also covered. Placements of the outgoing students are also focused on.
- The college also publishes its magazine 'GOVIND' annually which provides information on the highlights of the session.
- Brochures for announcing new courses, hobby classes and short term courses are also circulated.

The college since its inception has the practice of providing liberal fee concessions based on both merit and socio-economic status of the students. Overseas students receive full support for orientation in the college environment. They are provided special counseling to help them overcome all barriers of language and other disparities. Teachers are generally more considerate to overseas students and give special assistance to accommodate them.

✓ Students to participate in various competitions/National and International

The college nurtures a healthy competitive spirit among the students by encouraging them to participate in sports, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities at both National and International level. This is done through incentives by way of adequate facilities, financial aid, prizes, shields and awards to students winning distinction at University, State and National Level in sports and cultural activities. For polishing and honing their innate talent, the incharges of various items guide them and professional coaches are also arranged as and when required. Such students also qualify for financial assistance and extra coaching to compensate them for the loss in learning process caused by their absence in the regular classes. The college provides sports uniform, sports kit and special diet to players during practice and actual matches.

✓ Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.

Health care centre is housed in the indoor sports complex of the college. Medical aid is immediately provided to all needy students. There is also arrangement for giving first aid to the students. All students are covered under a health insurance scheme. Dr. D.V. Arora and Dr. Raghubir Singh, neighborhood doctors are easily available on call to attend to emergency cases.

✓ Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

The College holds coaching classes for students to facilitate their entry into services. The institution has linkages with NIIT (Jalandhar) and IBS (Institute of Banking Service) that help the students of all streams to compete in various examinations of 'B' and 'C' category of All India Central and State jobs.

✓ Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,)

The institution has the required infrastructure to promote skill development of the learners. Classes in spoken English and Communication Skills are held regularly to hone the speaking skills of the students. The Language Laboratory cum Personality Development Cell gives exposure to students to develop their competencies. The college promotes the use of technology in teaching and learning. Almost all the faculty members and about sixty percent of the students are computer literate. The habit of internet surfing by an increasing number of students is an indication of good computer savvy environment of the college. Add on courses in Web-Designing, Internet Application and Computer Applications (data care management) give practical knowledge to the students. Computers with internet connectivity have been provided to various

departments of the college. The college library provides free internet facility to all the students. All departments lay stress on practical training and foster skill development of the students.

✓ Support for "slow learners"

Identifying slow learners and providing them special support and mentoring is among the good practices of this institution. Special and concerted efforts are made at departmental level to tailor and mentor slow learners through extra coaching, special tests and notes to enable them to overcome their difficulties and develop their learning ability. Youth Club instills confidence and perseverance among students to achieve their goals.

✓ Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning/ corporate/business house etc.

- The Post Graduate students of Commerce, Computer Science and Fashion Designing keep visiting Industry from time to time to have practical exposure of the critical concepts taught to them as per the demand of the curriculum. The students are required to undergo practical training of four weeks and prepare a project report which is submitted to the university as a part of their syllabi.
- Students of undergraduate classes are also taken for industrial visits as and when required. Students of TV and Video Production are taken for visits to Doordarshan Kendra, other T.V Channels, and private production houses for providing useful consultancy and guidance to the students about T.V and Video production, video editing, news reading and news writing.
- Students also undertake projects and assignments related to industry. Students of B.Com (Professional) and Office Management and Secretarial Practices undertake summer training of 6-8 weeks in different organizations and prepare reports every year. Students of PGDCA and BCA II take up short projects related to industry.
- The institution has linkages with NIIT (Jalandhar) and IBS, Institute of Banking Services that help the students of all streams to compete in various examinations of 'B' and 'C' category of All India, Central and State Jobs.
- Placement Cell of the college keeps in touch with the representatives of the industry and facilitates the students in undertaking projects, assignments and training. Placement cell also invites companies for conducting on campus interviews. A large number of students are placed every year with several companies like IBM Daksh, WIPRO, HDFC Bank, Poise Tech and CRYO Bank.

• Department of Cosmetology organizes workshops in collaboration with other companies of beauty industry like Avon and Oriflame to provide knowledge about the latest products used for makeup. The department organised seminars and lectures in collaboration with Orane and VLCC on skin and hair related problems. Visits to beauty salons provide knowledge about the subject. Such visits give exposure to students regarding manufacturing process and help our students to develop entrepreneurial skills.

✓ Publication of student magazines

- The college magazine 'Govind' is published annually. Members of Staff and students contribute articles in English, Punjabi, Hindi and Sanskrit. The magazine also has a Home-Science, a Fine Arts, a Commerce and a Technology section. There is a Student Editor for each section. The magazine provides opportunity to the students to showcase their creativity and literary talent. It also advocates students to be participants in editing and publishing of articles/reports. Students are awarded prizes for the best contribution to the magazine.
- Wall magazine is also a good platform for students to display their creativity.
- The college also plans to take out an e-journal.
- Students of Post Graduate Courses contribute research papers to research journals.

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

Innovations in curriculum design help to meet the changing requirements of the modern dynamic scenario. Introduction of new, innovative and job-oriented courses at both UG and PG level is the first step to facilitate entrepreneurial skills among the students. Vocational Certificate Courses in various fields are introduced. They equip the students with vocational skills that help them in setting up their own units.

The institute has a Placement Cell of its own. Over the years, scores of students have been successful in securing good jobs, and Workshops are organised for career development, personality development, communication skills and Interview techniques. MIE (Making India Employable) of Gurgaon in association with Placement Cell conducts such workshops and seminars.

Skill based training programmes at departmental level are conducive to the growth of entrepreneurial skills. The training modules are designed to equip the outgoing students with necessary skills. The focus is on following skills- leadership skills, communication skills, management skills, marketing skills, public speaking and team building skills.

Hands on experience are provided to the learners in various fields. Students of Commerce are given training to file Income Tax Returns and other Tax returns online. Students of Home Science and Computer Science are also given practical training in workshops and training sessions.

The college encourages and develops entrepreneurship skills among the students by organizing exhibitions, arranging fashion shows in collaborations with export houses, organizing industrial trainings for students and event management of various functions in the college.

IMPACT

Impact of the efforts put in by the institution for developing entrepreneurial skills of the learners is visible in the success story of our alumni. Our students have been employed in both private and public sector. Among well placed alumni of our college are College Principals, School Principals, Officers in Indian Revenue Services, Chartered Accountants, Journalists, etc. Our students have also set up their boutiques and schools. A good number of students are placed in multi-national companies in campus selection. Students have even got admission in prestigious institutions in India and abroad.

- 5.1.6 Enumerate the policies and strategies of the institution which promote participation of students in extracurricular and co-curricular activities such as sports, games, Quiz competitions, debate and discussions, cultural activities etc.
- Additional academic support, flexibility in examinations
- Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and /materials
- Any other

The institution provides motivation and encouragement to students to participate in sports and co-curricular activities through its student friendly environment.

The following incentives are given to students to promote participation in sports:

- Fee concession.
- Stipends to University, National and International players.
- Refreshment and sports kit to all players. Students participating in different games are given-special coaching and guidance for their exams to compensate them for their loss due to absence from classes during their training schedule and matches.
- Sports incharge acts as a mentor, counsellor and guide for the students.

To promote participation of students in extra-curricular activities, following steps are taken by the institution:

- Special incentives are given to promote students participation in extra-curricular activities such as Quiz Competition, Mime, Fancy Dress, Debate, Declamation, Music and Dance, Painting and various other items.
- Professional Experts are arranged to give them special coaching for the preparation of items especially during Youth Festivals.
- Students are also guided by expert teachers to prepare for various items.
- Students in collaboration with various NGOs like Rotary Club, Jaycees, PAHAL and Media Houses organize events like tree plantation, blood donation, traffic awareness, and seminars on female foeticide and awareness rallies for cross cutting issues.
- Students also celebrate important days of National and International importance to get exposure to cultural consciousness Organizing Talent Hunt at the beginning of every academic session is an annual feature. It is a platform for the new entrants to showcase their talent in various items. Winners in various items are given awards. These talented artists are then polished and guided to give their best performance in inter college competitions and youth festivals.
- All departments promote extra-curricular activities. Departmental societies/associations remain active throughout the year in providing opportunities to the students to showcase and develop their hidden talents.
- Fee Concession and financial aid is provided to the deserving and distinguished artists

Additional Academic Support

- The participants are assured of extra coaching by the teachers concerned to compensate the loss in learning process by their absence in regular classes.
- Shortage of lectures is also condoned by the authorities.

Flexibility in Examinations

Besides this academic support, there is provision for flexibility of examination in mid semester tests. Special Tests for students participating in extra-curricular activities and sports are conducted.

5.1.7 Enumerating on the support and guidance provided to the students in preparing for the competitive exams, give details on the number of students appeared and qualified in various competitive exams such as UGC-CSIR- NET, UGC-NET, SLET, ATE / CAT / GRE / TOFEL / GMAT / Central /State services, Defense, Civil Services, etc.

For giving support to the learners in preparing for various competitive exams, the institution has developed linkages with certain organizations. The institution has linkages with NIIT (Jalandhar) and IBS (Institute of Banking Services) that help the students of all streams to compete in various examinations of 'B' and 'C' category of All India and Central Government Jobs.

- Placement Cell of the College signed an MOU with MIE (Make India Employable). MIE conducted PDP and Aptitude Test of the students.
- PG Department of the Commerce and Management conduced a training programme to train the students in using Tally, a very effective and popular software of accounting.
- Placement cell of the college makes efforts to give timely guidance and information to the students and gives them counseling for employment and even for self employment. Visiting companies are provided necessary infrastructure and the cell facilitates them in conducting aptitude tests and campus interviews.
- Students who are planning to appear in various competitive examinations are helped by teachers in matters of study material and they can access the library for books related to entrance tests.
- The seminars and workshops organized by Placement Cell are a great support for the pass outs.
- The college website is regularly updated to give latest information to the students.

5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

Counselling services are made available to the students by the Guidance and Counselling Cell of the College. Students are given timely and valuable counselling for their academic, personal, career related and psycho-social issues.

- At the time of admission, the students are guided to choose the stream of their choice. They are also guided to make right choice of subjects during admission. The doubts and queries of the students are attended to very carefully and patiently. They are informed about the scope and nature of various subjects. The right kind of counselling given to them helps them shape their career.
- Students are also offered personal and psycho social counselling. In case the students have problems related to their academics, they can share it with their teachers who give them supportive guidance in resolving their issues. The student friendly and healthy atmosphere prevalent in the college encourages them to share their problems with their mentors.

- Department of Psychology also gives personal counselling to the students and helps in finding a solution to their emotional and personal problems. They are also guided for handling examination stress.
- Incharges of Central Association also provide grievance redressal services to the students.
- Guidance is provided to students for entry to services like Banks, Railways, Income Tax, Insurance, B.Ed etc. The College has signed MOUs with IBS and NIIT. Placement cell conducted personality grooming and career counselling sessions in collaboration with MIE (Make India Employable), Career Launchers and Aspiring Minds.
- 5.1.9 Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? For rendering career guidance and placement services to the students, Placement Cell has been established in the college. The cell remains active throughout the year and makes whole hearted efforts to give efficacious service to the students.

- Students are given information about the job opportunities and the procedure involved in it. They are also trained to improve their potential for employment. For this purpose the Placement Cell conducts seminars, workshops and personality development courses. They are also trained to write effective CV (resume) by using various techniques.
- For enhancing their soft skills, the Placement Cell conducts soft skill development programmes. They are also trained to make effective power point presentations. The college organizes sessions of Group Discussions and mock interviews.
- The Placement Cell invites reputed multinational companies to hold On Campus Interviews. Every year a good number of students are placed in various companies.

5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? If yes, list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed during the last four years.

Yes, the Grievance Redressal Cell has been working efficiently in the college. The cell directly interacts with the students and facilitates them in sharing their grievances without any hesitation. Students can register their grievances or suggestions by dropping them in suggestion boxes. These suggestions or grievances are forwarded to the concerned departments for timely redressals. Students do not hesitate in sharing their grievances with their class teachers and with Madam Principal too. Central Association also contributes in every possible way in redressing the grievances of the students Two and Three Students representatives from each class are members of this body with a Head Girl and Two Executive Committee of students and Class Representatives work as the steering committee of Central Association. In the previous years many grievances of the students have been timely and satisfactorily redressed. Some of these grievances redressed were concerning bus routes, time table, fee concession, canteen etc.

5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

Sexual Harassment of women is a very serious issue threatening our society. The institution is a women college so there is no threat of sexual harassment on the campus and no case has been reported. The college takes utmost care to avoid any cases of sexual harassment. The efforts are made to give moral courage to the students to fight sexual harassment in any form and at any level. Seminars and guest lectures to spread awareness are organized by NSS, NCC and Youth Club. Debates, Declamations on such crucial issues are organized during the Talent Hunt and Social functions. The college authorities do not hesitate in taking the help of police and civil authorities to provide security to the girl students. Police authorities have organised seminars and workshops in College to guide the students about self-defence, other safety measures and a website related to women safety. CCTV cameras have been installed at various key positions in the campus for surveillance and security of the girls.

To curb the menace of ragging, the institution has taken some constructive steps. Central Association of the college has been given the responsibility to handle this issue. Central Association is a student body having student representatives from all classes. It works under the guidance of a team of teachers working as their mentors. Students are guided and motivated to create a healthy, friendly and congenial atmosphere in the college. Senior Students are guided to help their juniors. However till date no incident of ragging of any kind has been reported in the college.

The institution is committed towards ensuring social justice through implementation of welfare schemes to support students. The college prospectus has the relevant information about these welfare schemes.

Scholarships and fee Concessions

The college has the practice of providing liberal fee-concession based on merit and socio-economic status of the students. A detail about the scholarships, fee concession and other financial aid given to the students is already enclosed in pt.5.1.3.

Counseling and Placement Service

The placement cell of the college in collaboration with guidance and counselling cell gives career guidance to the students, organizes lectures/workshops in career planning and invites companies for on campus recruitment.

Health Services

To provide health services to the students, a health care centre is housed in the department of Physical Education. Dr. D.V. Arora and Dr. Raghubir Singh, neighborhood doctors, are available on call to attend emergencies. A health club with modern equipment is functioning in the Department of Physical Education. Health awareness and fitness programmes are held regularly during the session.

Bank Service

In collaboration with the bank, the institution facilitates the students in opening an account with a zero deposit. It empowers students to operate their financial transactions, mobilizes savings and is helpful in availing educational loans, scholarship and government stipends.

Subsidized Canteen

The college canteen provides wholesome food to the students at subsidized rates. The canteen committee monitors the quality and rates of the food items and the cleanliness and upkeep of the canteen.

Library

The library of the institution is fully computerized for the benefit of students and the process is updated regularly. The central library is linked with the library in IT Block. Various services provided in the library include Cataloguing, Periodicals, Content pages delivery, Publishers Catalogs, Clippings from newspapers and journals, special reference section and display material. Book exhibitions are organized on various occasions. The College Library also has a browsing centre with desktop computers and internet facility for students as well as faculty members.

Book Bank Facility

The book bank facility caters to the needs of the needy and deserving students. Text books are issued to the needy and bright students for the whole session. Students are encouraged to donate books for the book bank at the end of academic session.

Grievance Redressal Cell

Grievance Redressal Cell headed by senior faculty actively interacts with students to help them sort out their grievances.

Transport Facility

The college plies four buses for the convenience of the students. A large number of girls, including those from nearby villages avail this facility.

Red Cross Society, NCCunit and NSS units involve students in social welfare programmes

Safety insurance scheme is also available for students

Educational trips are organized by different subject societies.

There is no formal mechanism for maintaining records of the students who get admission in further courses after completing their graduation. However through oral communication, informal sources, alumni association and visit of the students for convocation we get information about students progression. It is observed that a good number of students prefer to stay back in the same institution and join post graduate courses (M.Com, Msc IT, M Sc Computer Science, MBEIT and MSc. FD) and other Post graduate diplomas offered in the institution. B.Ed is also a very popular option. About 10% students go to other institutes for pursuing their higher studies. Campus selections are also facilitated every year. Students of Vocational and skill oriented courses like Fashion Designing either start their own centers or seek employment. Some students are absorbed in front desk, teaching and IT jobs.

6 students from collegiate school have got admissions in MBBS in reputed medical colleges and a good number of students get admissions in engineering in reputed colleges every year.

5.2.3 How does the *institution* facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

To facilitate the student progression to higher level of education, the institution makes strategic efforts. Academic counselling is given at the time of admission and students are guided about the scope of subjects they want to choose. They are informed about the prospects of the course they have selected and the next postgraduate course to which they can proceed after completing the selected course.

- The Institution is running five post-graduate courses and three post graduate diplomas in vocational subjects. Students, completing their graduation prefer to stay back and get admission in these Post-Graduate Courses
- The Institute makes arrangements for organizing various guest lectures to give information to the students about the latest trends in higher education. Eminent personalities from diverse fields of education are invited by the Placement Cell to interact with the students.
- Personality development progarmmes are also organized regularly to facilitate student progression to higher education and employment.
- To facilitate student progression towards employment, Placement Cell has been established in the college. The cell remains active throughout the year in providing Career guidance and placement services to the students pursuing graduate and post graduate courses. To improve their potential for employment the Placement Cell conducts seminars, workshops for soft skill development and personality development. Reputed companies, banks and private companies are invited to hold on campus interviews. Every year a good number of students are placed during campus interviews.
- Eleven Skill oriented Add-On courses are being offered to the students pursuing graduation to increase their potential for employability.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

Academic excellence is the hallmark of our institution. We feel proud of the students who win top positions in the university examinations. On the other hand the institution is equally and deeply concerned about the drop out and also the students who are at risk of failure.

- To bring down the dropout rate the Counselling Cell and the concerned departments interact with the students and make an effort to find out the reasons, and the needful is done to address the issues. Financial aid is provided by the institution. Some teachers even help them personally. They are given a psychological boost to continue with their studies. If need be their parents are also contacted and counseled and efforts are made to resolve the issues.
- Special support is provided to the students who are at the risk of failure. The institution has a well devised teaching learning and examination system. exams the Students who are at the risk of failure are identified after the mid semester tests. The concerned teachers put in extra efforts to guide these students and motivate them to put in their maximum input. Parent teacher meetings are conducted if it is necessary. Parents are informed about the performance of weak students so that parents may also give timely support to their ward and help her improve her performance. Such students are even helped by their own class fellows. The college has a friendly, conducive and student friendly atmosphere that gives a big support to the needy students.

5.3 STUDENT PARTICIPATION AND ACTIVITIES

5.3.1 List the range of sports, games, cultural and other extracurricular activities available to students. Provide details of participation and program calendar.

The college gives due importance to sports, games, culture and other extra cultural activities and motivates and facilitates the students to take part in all these activities.

Sports and Games

Ample opportunities are given to the sportspersons to take part in various games, both indoor and outdoor. Students can participate in various sports and games like Gymnastics, Chess, Karate, Ball Badminton, Table Soccer, Rope Skipping and many more games. Interclass competitions are organized to give practice and healthy competition to players. Students participate in the above mentioned games at various levels, namely, district level, university level, state level, national level and international level. The college is indeed proud of their achievements and performance. The programme chart for all these competitions is fixed by the concerned authorities, like university and other sports bodies. The college makes its own calendar for inter class competitions.

Cultural and Extra Curricular Activities

The college has a Youth Welfare Club, affiliated to the Directorate of Youth Services, Government of Punjab. Under the guidance of Youth Co-ordinator and other members, the students are guided to take part in a wide range of activities.

To encourage the students to take part in such activities, Talent Hunt is organized in the beginning of the session. New talent is gauged and facilitated to take part in inter class competitions, inter college competitions and even youth festivals at university level. The talented performers are polished by the teachers and coaches so that they give their best in inter college/zonal and inter zonal competitions.

Besides these competitions, students get involved in other cultural activities at the college level. Students of Youth Club and Central Association actively participate in celebration of special days and events of cultural importance. On Teachers Day the students greet their teachers with a flower or badge at the entrance. Similarly on Independence day and Republic day they greet their teachers by pinning a flag. Students also celebrate Teej, Diwali, Lohri, Rakhi, Basant and many more festivals in the college. Activities relating to these events are organized by different departments.

- Students of Department of Dance present Group Dance at district level Independence Day celebration. It is an annual feature.
- Students of Department of Fine Arts have painted a graffiti on the outerwall of the department. This collective efforts of the students is worth appreciation.
- Such little gestures indeed go a long way in bringing cultural consciousness among young learners.
- Arranging educational trips to places of cultural and historical importance is a routine with the departments. Students of Department of Maths, Fine Arts, History, Punjabi and many more have visited Virasat-e-Khalsa, Virsa Vihar, Golden Temple, Rangla Punjab and Sh. Anandpur.

The suggestions and inputs of the feedback of students are analysed and suggestions to improve overall competency of the students for employability are implemented.

- 5.3.4 How does the college involve and encourage students to publish materials like catalogues, wall magazines, college magazine, and other material? List the publications/ materials brought out by the students during the previous four academic sessions.
- The college involves and encourages its students to publish material for college magazine and wall magazine. The students are also motivated to express their views through articles, paintings, reports and poetry. The wall magazine features the creative output of the learners regularly. The college magazine 'Govind' is an annual publication comprising of seven sections- English, Hindi, Punjabi,

Sanskrit, Commerce and Technology, Home Science and Fine Arts. It provides a platform to the students to showcase their creativity and art. The Editorial Board with the Principal as patron in the beginning of the session meets and decides the lay out plan for the rolling out of the latest issue of the college magazine. Student Editors for each session are selected. The teachers motivate the students to bring out the creative genius in them. Best contributors to the magazine are awarded certificates and prizes in the Annul Prize Distribution Function.

- The college is planning to take out an e-journal to give the students another platform to showcase their creativity.
- Students of post graduate courses also contribute research papers to research journals published by their respective departments.
- Students also prepare charts and other material related to special events and displays them on key points in the college. Powerpoint presentations on social issues and other important topics are also prepared by students of Department of T.V. & Video Production and they are displayed on LEDs installed in the college. Recently Go Green Club and Department of Fine Arts took to reviving the great grand art of 70's, i.e., **Graffiti**. The graffiti craze overpowered the artistic skill of the artists of the college. The result was a wall painted creatively by the students of Department of Fine Arts. It was indeed a matter of great honour and pride for the institution when our students painted a wall outside Virsa Vihar also. These graffitis have been appreciated by all.

Student council is working in the college under the aegis of the Central Association. It is the apex body of the college. PCM S.D. College for Women, Jalandhar is run by Devi Sahai S.D. Education Board (a duly registered body). The Board pursues the expansion programmes in the field of education. To run the affairs of the

college, Devi Sahai S.D. Education Board has constituted Governing Body of the college. The Governing Body includes President, Secretary and Principal of the college who is ex-officio member. Two members of the teaching staff are also members of the Governing Body. All matters pertaining to finance, academics and development are discussed in the meetings of the Governing Body.

With the Principal at the helm of affairs, there is an efficient internal coordinating and monitoring mechanism. The Principal maintains a proactive role in encouraging and motivating all faculty members for over all academic growth and development of the college. Staff Bodies and Committees are constituted every year by the Principal, meetings are held from time to time, healthy discussions are encouraged and suggestions are noted for follow up action. Similarly, Planning Forum headed by the Principal as the Chairperson and all Heads of the departments play an active role in management of college affairs.

- The Non teaching staff is headed by the office superintendent. Specific departments are allotted specific duties like administration, admission, fee collection, examination and accounting etc. To regulate their affairs, a Bursar and an internal auditor are also appointed. The I.T. and Commerce Block has an independent office to coordinate administration and monitor management.
- The coordination between the students and the teaching and non teaching staff is promoted through various student bodies like Central Association, Youth Club, NSS, NCC and different departmental associations/societies/Clubs.
- There is a centralized public address system which connects all the class rooms to the Principal's office. Telephone extension system connects clerical office to the Principal's office. General monitoring and coordination is conducted through general inspections and holding meetings of different departments.

The Managing Committee of the college guides the Principal who in turn leads the college towards the fulfillment of the stated missions and objectives.

a) The Policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission.

- The Managing Committee meets twice a year. The members of the committee and the Principal discuss matters like fee structure, proposals on infrastructural facilities and future development plans. The funds received and the expenditures incurred are presented in detail in the Managing Committee meetings by the Principal and the Bursar. The audited profit & loss A/C and Balance Sheet is also presented in the meeting. The annual development plan of the institution, various academic matters and administrative matters are discussed and finalized in the meeting. The members of the Managing Committee are easily accessible for any kind of guidance and support required by the institution.
- The Principal, the Head of the institution meets the faculty in the beginning of the academic session and gives instructions regarding the new programmes and projects in line with the quality policy of the institution. She bears ultimate responsibility for the smooth functioning of the college. She is a unifying force and coordinating link between various internal and external agencies and holds meetings from time to time for the better working of the college. It is she who communicates the vision and mission of the institution to the faculty, ensures transparency in the systems and maintains core human values.

b) Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same with institutional strategic plans

• While formulating the action plans, the institution looks into the thrust areas. The college plans its academic terms, teaching process and examination schedule. Sports and cultural programmes are planned and executed as per university rules and regulations. The College Calendar, giving a tentative date of various events and activities to be held during the session is prepared in advance by the departments as well as by the institution.

- The Principal is available for discussions regarding academics, new plans of the departments and any difficulty or challenge faced by the Heads of the Department or individual faculty members.
- The Bursar monitors the expenditure in the light of the provisions made in the budget. She works in close association with the Principal of the institution to expedite the follow up on developmental plans and welfare schemes for both the teaching as well as the non teaching staff.

Principal and Vice Principal for matters pertaining to their attendance (lecture shortage) and even for
eligibility to appear for formative and summative exams.

• ALMUNAE

The annual Almunae Meet gives opportunity to the old students to contribute to the development of the institution by their rich experience and suggestions and feel themselves an important part of the institution.

• **PARENTS**

We believe that parents along with teachers are responsible for over all development of the students at PCM S.D. College for Women, Jalandhar. Parent -Teacher meets are organized after mid semester examination so as to make them aware of the performance of their wards. The institution welcomes constructive suggestions from the parents and makes sure that such suggestions are implemented for the benefit of the students and institution as a whole. Heads of Departments from time to time interact with the parents, whenever the situation arises, may be in terms of performance, absentee from the class, health issues or peer pressures. The grievances of the parents are also patiently listened to by the concerned teachers or the Administrative authorities for speedy and satisfying solutions.

• TEACHING AND NON TEACHING STAFF

Both the teaching and non teaching staff are the strong pillars of the institution. The teaching and non teaching staff jointly celebrates festivals, family functions and other joyous moments to bring in sense of belongingness amongst them. The grievances of the staff members are addressed by the college administration in the best possible way.

• INDUSTRY

The institution recognises the importance of industry linkages in the present scenario. So for blending theoretical inputs with practical insights, the institution has signed various MOU's with local industry in order to provide local employment to the girl students. The local industry informs their requirements in terms of qualification and curriculum they look for in the incumbents. It is on these lines that the institution could initiate a post graduate programme i.e. Masters in Business Economics and IT in the session 2014-15. This course has been specially designed to meet the requirements of the trade and industry.

• SOCIETY

The institution through its website flashes the events that are planned at the departmental level or at the institutional level. The college invites the media for highlighting its achievements. Our institution is located in the heart of the city. The Principal also attends the community functions and makes special efforts to reach out to the public, interacts with them and incorporates their valuable suggestions into the college system.

d) Proper Support for Policy and Planning Through Need Analysis, Research inputs and Consultations with Stakeholders.

A thorough analysis of the regional, national and international demands is made through interactive programmes with the experts. The research inputs are taken through workshops, conferences, seminars and net surfing. These inputs are incorporated in the policy of the institutional programmes in the form of Minor Research Projects or Major Research Projects or initiating a Research Journal and contributing research (empirical) papers in other refreed journals.

e) Reinforcing the Culture of Excellence

For reinforcing the culture of excellence various faculty development programmes, workshops, conferences and seminars are organized by the institution so that the faculty remains in touch with the latest trends in teaching, learning and evaluation. The faculty is also encouraged to attend Refresher courses and other short term courses in their respective disciplines organized by the Universities.

So, whether it is academics, co-curricular activities, sports or extension activities, the institution strives to achieve excellence.

f) Champion Organizational Change

The Head of the institution invites proposals for the introduction of new courses. She discusses the matter with the Heads of the departments at the end of each semester so that rightful decision may be taken at the year end and new programme be initiated in the new academic year. In light of the above, the institution could initiate fourteen new courses, two new subjects at under graduate level and two research centers. It speaks volumes about the involvement of leadership in meeting the new challenges of the changing times.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

- The institution works on the participative and democratic principle of management, i.e., it formulates all its plans and policies in consultation with members of Planning Forum, IQAC Advisory Board and various other committees.
- IQAC helps in self appraisal exercise for the departments of the institution and to highlight strengths and weaknesses of the departments as well as of the institution in other areas.
- The Principal of the College being at the helm of the affairs has complete autonomy to frame plans and policies within the ambit of rules framed by Punjab Govt., UGC and the GNDU. In the beginning of the year, academic calendar is prepared in accordance with the University Calendar and various duties are allotted to the faculty in the beginning of the session. Members of Planning Forum and Advisory Board help in finalizing academic calendar in line with University Calendar. The Head of the institution appoints Incharges for various committees like Examination Committee, Placement Cell, Alumni Association, Grievance Redressal Cell, Checking of Unfair Means Committee, Stipends and Concessions Committee, Youth Welfare Committee, Soft Skills and Personality Development Cell, Public Relation Committee, College Development Council, Advisory Committee, Red Cross Unit, Central Association and General Disicipline Committee.These committees prepare their action plans and submit the report of the work done to the Head of the institution. All these duties are evaluated by IQAC. The administrative staff is also given a roadmap for future along with their roles and responsibilities.
- Suggestion boxes have been installed at various points in the campus for the students. This valuable information helps in monitoring and evaluating the policies and plans of the institution. The suggestions given by the students are well taken care of, discussed and implemented.
- Record Book includes the experiences of eminent personalities who visit the institution as Chief Guest and Guest of Honour on annual functions. Their observations help us take decisions for future actions.
- Feed back forms are filled in by the outgoing classes every year and their suggestions help the institution a lot in maintaining overall development.

- The Alumni of the institution who are invited on the Annual Alumni Meet do share their rich experiences and give valuable suggestions.
- Parent –Teacher Meet organized after the Mid Semester examination provides an excellent opportunity for the faculty to interact with parents and get their valuable suggestions.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The Management of the college communicates with the Principal and the faculty frequently to discuss the problems and issues related to the college development, administration, academic growth and infrastructural needs. The Principal with the support of the management guides and motivates the faculty of the institution to achieve the institutional goals and objectives. The Management and the Principal are supportive and are easily accessible and their presence at all the important functions of the college encourages and supports the staff and the students. The role and responsibilities of the staff are communicated to the staff for effective functioning of the college. Bi-annual meetings of the management are held in the months of September and March.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The management is supportive. The Principal along with the staff works cohesively for the development of the college. The staff is involved through formation of various committees such as Examination Committee, Planning Forum, Alumni Association Committee, New Admission Canvassing Committee etc.

To instill confidence and leadership among students, Central Association and General Discipline Committee has been constituted. It has Head Girl, Vice Head Girl, Secretary and Joint Secretary and other office bearers. Central Association monitors discipline, performs hospitality duties and actively helps in the management of all important college functions like Prize Distribution, Convocation, College Fete, Felicitation, Talent Hunt, Saraswati Pujan and Valedictory Function. Active involvement and participation of students in various Clubs/Committees, Seminars, Workshops, Competitions, Cultural programmes organized by the college also helps them develop their leadership competencies.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The administration is decentralized to a large extent. The Head of the institution with the support of Deans, Heads of Departments and various committees participates in the decision making process and it promotes a culture of participative management. All important duties like Budget, Academics, Sports, and Extracurricular activities, Placements, Concessions and Stipends etc. have been assigned to different committees who are responsible and answerable within the given framework. The responsibilities are delegated to the faculty on the basis of their capability, aptitude and commitment. Within the departments, clubs and societies, the teachers and the students work in a cooperative spirit, helping and motivating each other and encouraging every individual to grow.

The senior faculty is given the task of organizing Prize Distribution function and Convocation function, College Fete, Alumni Meet, Saraswati Pujan, Valedictory and Talent Finding function. The Dean, Central Association (C.A.) guides the students to maintain discipline in the institution and guides the students for active participation in all important functions of the college. Dean C.A also conducts the elections for the student council who are class representatives. The coordinator, Youth Club attends all the meetings held in other colleges/G.N.D University in connection with Youth Festival activities and for preparing the students for Zonal, Inter Zonal and Inter University competitions. The Registrar, Examination Committee manages the smooth conduct of mid semester examinations as well as semester examinations. The incharge of fee concession, stipends and scholarships conducts the process of giving concessions on the basis of need as well as merit. The Bursar of the College is assigned the responsibility of checking the bills and invoices and mathematical accuracy of books of accounts.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

The college is governed by a participative management which is actively involved in the administrative, academic and co-academic activities of the institution. The perspective institutional plan is developed through consultations of the Management with Principal and faculty. The principal constitutes committees for the various developmental initiatives it proposes to undertake. Teachers play a significant role in the planning and implementation of development of the college. Students Council is involved wherever necessary. Infrastructural developments are planned by the management in close consultations with the

faculty who give their infrastructural requirements to the Principal. The planning and decision making in financial matters rests with the Management and Principal. Appropriate financial allocations on priority basis are made for various schemes. Participatory leadership and team work culture emblematic of the values and ethos of the college enable the college community to internalize these and in turn creates institutional loyalty.

The college has a formally stated quality policy. Various activities to be held in the college are screened and implemented upon.


- The Management holds formal and informal talks with the staff to redress any grievances. Meetings are held twice a year.

- Last but not the least, the college tries to exemplify its motto "Do Your Job Well" in its organization and management.


6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

Structure and functioning of various academic and administrative bodies of the institutions

The college has various committees and administrative societies that promote the decision making process:-

• Innovation Cell

The Innovation Cell explores every area of expansion and development. Meetings are held frequently to consider new avenues in higher education, their utility and promotion. This cell functions efficiently under the auspices of highly experienced and dynamic teachers. Many innovations have been suggested and approved for consideration.

• Grievance Redressal Cell

The Grievance Redressal Cell serves as a helpful link between the students, teachers and the Principal. Suggestions for improvement, grievances of students and employees are brought to the notice of administration. Suggestion boxes are easily accessible to students. The Principal lends a sympathetic ear to the problems and grievances of the students which are redressed speedily and satisfactorily.

• Academic Calendar Committee

- Members of Planning Forum and Advisory Board help to prepare academic calendar.
- > University calendar is strictly followed.
- Monitoring of activities of different departments and extension activities is ensured.
- Members of teaching staff maintain a record of attendance of students. Inter checking of attendance registers ensures accuracy.

• Cleanliness and Campus Beautification Committee

- > To provide students with clean and hygienic environment.
- A number of aquaguards are fitted with water coolers to provide clean water to students.
- > To keep campus pollution free with plantation of various trees and plants.
- > In the morning assembly students are advised and encouraged to keep the campus clean.
- To keep the campus neat & clean, dust-bins are placed in the corridors, classes, ground and canteen.
- General cleanliness like routine work of sweepers, cleanliness of rooms and labs etc. is also monitored.

• Central Association

- This apex body of the students instills among the students the value of discipline, team spirit, honesty, humanity, responsibility, duty consciousness and commitment.
- 'Betti Bachao' mission regarding gender equality with the slogan 'Girls are Great, Don't Destroy their Fate, is among one of the important social issues taken up out by the Central Association.
 Important days and Festivals are celebrated by the members of Central Association.

• Youth Club

The College Youth Club provides a fantastic platform for the budding artists to blossom. Along with disseminating wholesome education, the youth club encourages students to associate themselves with various other clubs of the college and participate in extension activities.

• Time Table Committee

- Tabulation of student/teacher friendly time table for smooth functioning of academic session is done before the beginning of the session.
- Centralized Time Table is prepared to avoid clashes in time table and change of rooms as per the number of students is facilitated.
- Zero period is created for remedial/extra classes or for extra curricular activities and for Add on Courses.

• Examination Committee

- Registrar is supported by other staff members to conduct examinations of all the streams.
- Mid semester tests and semester exams are properly coordinated.
- > Proper record of examinations conducted and the results is maintained.
- Preparation of date sheet is done in consultation with teachers of various faculties and students are informed well in advance.

• Examination Office

Monitoring student support activities like admissions, execution of time-table, examination work and result analysis.

- Preparation of teacher-wise university results to facilitate the institution for assessment of the performance of each faculty member.
- Maintenance of up-to-date student record from admission time, their attendance, result and marks in mid semester as well as university exams.

• General and Accounts Office

The college general office efficiently contributes to internal co-ordination among various constituents of the college.

- The office looks after various student support activities like disbursement of scholarship to students, realization of fee, transport facility, arrangement of educational tours and cultural activities and welfare schemes of students.
- The office takes care of all correspondence with the DPI Punjab, GNDU Amritsar, UGC, Punjab Government and local administration regarding grants, staff appointments and other issues.

Teaching and Learning

- Learner's progress is reviewed thoroughly. Awards and Fee Concessions are given to those performing well to keep the spirit of healthy competition alive.

- State of the art infrastructure is provided to promote intellectual growth and personality development.
- The students are informed about their deficiencies. Special tutorial classes are provided to take care of those who lag behind and to further enhance their learning.
- Other than lecture method of teaching various other methods like field studies, debates, seminars and group discussions etc are undertaken for better understanding of the subjects.
- The Faculty enrich their knowledge through National and International Seminars, Refresher Courses and Conferences. Smart class rooms with smart boards and projectors also assist in enhancing the efficiency of teaching learning process.

Research and Development

The spirit of innovation imbibed by the institution propels research and development. There is a rigorous effort towards promoting research aptitude among faculty and students.

- Majority of faculty is actively engaged in research activities.
- Four teachers have completed their Minor Research Projects in last five years.
- Two teachers are working on Minor Research Projects and two teachers are persuing Ph.d.
- National and International Seminars are organised for promoting research.
- Students are encouraged to do research work by presenting papers in National Seminars, make a survey and prepare PPTs.
- The Principal is a motivating source for the faculty to undertake research projects.
- As many as 23 Research Journals (including 3 Research Journals in press) have been published in the last five years. (Refer 3.4.2)
- Eminent speakers, researchers and professionals are invited for special sessions.
- The college through the facility of INFLIBNET is subscribing to online journals and promote research environment.
- Students are exposed to practical world through linkages with industry and export houses which further enhances their entrepreneurial skills.

Community Engagement

The college takes initiatives towards strengthening ties with the community be it parents, general public or less privileged people.

- The college has 3 units of NSS and a NCC unit of Army Wing. The students are encouraged to participate in NCC, NSS and other extension activities.
- The college is actively involved in various community betterment tasks through its Go Green Club, Red Cross unit and Rotary Club. These societies are actively involved in spreading social awareness.
- The college has ties with various NGOs for organising blood donation camps, free medical checkups, NSS camps etc.
- Important days like International Peace Day, International AIDS Day and International Environment Day are also observed.
- Programmes are also organised for spreading awareness on issues like Drug Addiction, Cancer, Female Foeticide, HIV/AIDS.
- Students are also encouraged to take part in Inter College competitions and Youth Festivals for over all personality development.
- NCC and NSS students visit different places like old age homes, schools for the blind, orphanages, Pinglaghar etc

Human Resource Management

There is effective human resource management under the able guidance of the Management and the contribution and co-operation of the Principal and staff members.

- Faculty is motivated to attend Orientation Courses, Refresher Courses and Research Workshops for their professional development.
- The Placement Cell of the college invites reputed companies to place the students of the institution in the corporate sector.
- There is effective human resource management as the staff and students jointly organise various functions.

The Head of the institution encourages the faculty to write research papers and books in their subjects.

Industry Interaction

- The placement cell along with the other departments is actively involved in developing ties with the industry at local, regional and national level.
- Seminars, workshops, conferences on various subjects are conducted in the college premises. Field tours to various industries are also organised.
- Linkages are established with local industry and manufacturing units to provide the students an insight into actual working of the organization and develop their entrepreneurial skills.

College publications like Newsletter, Prospectus, Information Brochures, E-mails, Newspaper Reports, Social media too give vital information.
- The Principal has regular formal and informal interactions with the students. She makes surprise visits to the classes in order to have true feedback from the students.

- Orientation programmes conducted by the Head of the institution give detailed instructions to the staff regarding new projects and programmes undertaken by the college.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

• The Institution has adopted a democratic approach as it values the feedback from the students. Various corrective measures are adopted and steps are taken to improve the performance after analyzing the feedback.

CRITERION-VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

- Performance auditing is done through performance appraisal. This exercise is carried out at regular intervals and informal feedback is given to the various departments regarding their progression and the scope for improvement.
- The feedback from the students and parents is also sought after so that various bodies at different levels can work towards better performance.
- Departments obtain inputs from its alumni, who are employed in various organizations to improvise the competency of students for employability in the future.

6.3 FACULTY EMPOWERMENT STRATEGIES

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

Our college believes that professional development of teaching and non-teaching staff follows the development of a college. So, to attain that level of development, the institute initiates the following professional development measures:

- Every year a good number of teachers attend general orientation and refresher courses conducted by various universities. The institution provides duty leave and other support whenever required to motivate the faculty to attend such programmes.
- The institution provides funds for professional development in the form of enabling the teaching departments to organize seminars, conferences and workshops.
- The institute promotes professional development of the faculty by motivating them to obtain their Ph.D. Degree and M.Phil. Degree.
- Members of non-teaching staff are given training in computer, communication skills, office management and secretarial skills and book keeping.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

• The institution adopts the strategies for faculty empowerment by motivating staff members to attend seminars, conferences and exchanging research activities.

- Besides this, the Heads of the departments motivate their staff to improve their educational qualification such as M.Phil., Ph.D. by creating a conducive environment and enabling the staff to make the best use of their capabilities. The need for faculty development is assessed, keeping in view the changes taking place in higher education and also institutional requirements.
- Various awareness programmes regarding legal rights, human rights and health related issues are conducted in the college for the benefit of the faculty.
- The college administration remains active to provide latest infrastructural inputs to the faculty. There are five smart class rooms to support faculty programme as well as to support students programmes.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

- The performance appraisal system includes the report of the faculty which is made by the concerned Head of the department on the basis of their achievements, discipline, quality etc. and is discussed in meetings at departmental level.
- The annual self appraisal is conducted by issuing a specific format provided by the Director Public Instructions (DPI, Punjab), based on which the Principal writes a report and the same is sent to the higher authorities.
- The management always plays an active role in the performance appraisal of the staff. Annual results of the teachers are forwarded to the management. Apart from that, the management keeps a keen vigil on the working behaviour of the members of the teaching as well as the non-teaching faculties/staff.
- There is also an efficient in-built mechanism to check the work efficiency of non-teaching staff. The non-teaching staff is headed by the Office Superintendent. He supervises the office staff and reports the progress to the Principal regularly. There is also an independent computerised accounts section. The record of their performance is maintained in their personal files.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

- Annual reports of the college are read out at the Annual Prize Distribution Function and Convocation to appraise the stake holders about the major research work and other remarkable achievements of various departments.
- The review of the performance appraisal facilitates the management to decide on the retention of the temporary faculty and upgrade their pay scales.
- Recognition and increments are given to the teachers who have completed their Ph.D or some other courses.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

Welfare schemes have positive impact on employees in an institution because satisfied employees can make the college a productive place. Various welfare activities are undertaken for the teaching as well as nonteaching staff.

- Medical facility is provided to the employees. There is a separate sick room and also a committee of two teachers, who act as the Dispensary in-charge
- Employees can avail PF loans through proper channel. The process is simple, impartial and transparent.
- The college has adopted Contributory Provident Fund for the employees.
- Lectures on medical and health awareness are organized for the staff in every session.
- Fee concession facility for employees' children is also provided.
- Duty leave is granted for attending workshops, seminars, orientation and refresher courses.
- Six months maternity leave for female staff is provided.
- There are twelve residential quarters for peons.
- Class four workers are sanctioned advance against their salaries.
- Every year two sets of uniform are given to class IV workers at the college expense.
- Grievance Redressal Cell has been formed which hears the problems and suggestions of the employees and takes required measures at the earliest.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

A lot of measures have been taken by the institute for attracting and retaining eminent faculty.

- A handsome and competitive salary is offered to the faculty according to their experience and qualification.
- Those who are employed on ad-hoc and contractual basis are offered better pay scale and assurance of job. Their services are continued in the nearest sessions and where necessary the faculty is offered permanent employment.
- We salute our Management for paying salary and wages very regularly and promptly on the first day of every month.
- Conducive work environment is provided for retaining the faculty. An increment in salary is given on due dates each year.
- Transparency in the systems is one of the measures that help in retaining eminent faculty.

6.4 FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT AND RESOURCE MOBILIZATION

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The financial resources are efficiently and effectively used in the institution. There is a Financial Committee in the College which consists of the Management, Principal, and Bursar. As per the institutional procedure, the Management and the Principal allocate funds according to the requirements. Proper procedure is adopted for any purchase and accordingly the tenders and quotations are called from various firms. The regular audit of the budget is also exercised to keep a check on the expenditure.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

An efficient internal audit mechanism has been developed. Planning for maintaining the accounts and their proper auditing at various stages is made. The accounts are prepared and regularly checked by the superintendent of accounts of the college.

• Internal checking of the accounts is done by the Bursar duly appointed by the Managing Committee.

- Final accounts of the college are properly audited periodically by the Chartered Accountant of the college. The accounts section of the college is fully computerized.
- The External Audit is conducted by the Accountant General (Punjab). The external audit is up to date. It has been completed in the last financial year.
- Last audit was conducted by the college on 31st October 2014 (2014-15).
- There were no significant objections raised by the auditors. Some minor mistakes were found, which were sorted out.
- 6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.
- Fees/dues from the students are the major source of institutional receipts.
- Grants are received from Punjab Govt. (Being a grant –in aid college)
- 95% of the deficit grant-in-aid scheme and various grants under UGC schemes are the other source of receipts.
- The deficit is managed under grant-in-aid scheme.

6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The college devises various ways and means to mobilize the resources it needs for the welfare of the students. Some of the methods used by the college towards achieving these goals are given below:

The college applies for grants for specific needs to UGC and HRD. The college seeks the contributions made by the M.L.As/M.Ps from the Public Developmental Fund. The Institution organizes seminars and conferences and the expenditure for these is met by the grants received from the Affiliating University, UGC and ICSSR. The college shares the needs of the college with alumnae and other beneficiaries of the college for scholarships and accepts donations from the faculty and NGOs.

6.5 INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE SYSTEM (IQAS)

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

a) Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

Yes, the institution has set up the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) which has been working since 2007. IQAC reflects quality management structure, strategies and processes which would enhance academic quality of the institution as perceived by the faculty, students, alumni and other stakeholders in line with the vision, mission and goals of the institution.

MISSION OF IQAC

To impart value based and quality education in the field of Commerce, Science, Arts, IT; to equip the students with knowledge, skills and attitude through traditional, modern and innovative methods.

FUNCTIONS OF IQAC

- To provide modern teaching aids to make lectures more informative, interesting and convenient to grasp.
- To inculcate values and ethics in students through seminars, expert talks, Yoga classes.
- Conduct regular Parent- Teacher and Student- Council meetings for the benefit of students and satisfaction of the parents.
- Welfare scheme for the students and staff including incentives and concessions.
- Introduction of news subjects and courses.
- Conduct periodic counselling of academically poor students to identify their weaknesses.
- Conduct faculty development programmes and short term courses for the teachers and to update them as per the latest research and to create an environment of excellence by imparting quality education and producing proficient professional development trends in their relative field.
- Ensure a well deserving placement for each and every student by establishing a placement cell.
- Provide friendly, supportive and conducive environment for the physical, emotional, intellectual, ethical and aesthetical growth of the personality of students.
- Conduct students' feedback analysis through continuous monitoring and internal rationalization techniques to identify the strengths and weakness of each and every student for further improvement.

b) How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management/ authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

The management has approved all the decisions. The following decisions were taken by the IQAC and approved by the management for implementation.

- To introduce new Professional Courses like MBEIT (M.A. Business Economics and Information Technology) in collaboration with the three streams- Commerce, Economics and Computer Science. This capsule course is meant for synergizing the knowledge and skills according to contemporary requirements of trade, industry and business.
- Career oriented foundation course in Human Rights Education is also introduced. Human Rights Education is acquiring great importance in the changing National and Global Scenario in the wake of globalization. It will open up new possibilities for realization of creative human potential and curb all forms of violence and violation of human rights.
- Another career oriented Add-On Course in Leather Processing Technology is also introduced. This course acquaints the students with the concept of leather, leather Processing and leather goods. In addition to the theoretical aspects, the practical training is also provided to the students. It helps them get job in Leather Processing Industries.
- The college has set up Smart Class rooms. They are enabled with audio visual aids including LCD screens and computerized overhead projection systems to add innovation and quality to teaching.

c) Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Mrs. P.P Sharma, former Principal of HMV College, Jalandhar is the external member of IQAC. She has contributed a lot to enhance quality of the performance of the college.

d) How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of IQAC.

Students and Alumnae both contribute to the effective functioning of IQAC.

• Students contribute in the functioning of IQAC by their representation as Head Girl, Vice Head Girl, Secretary and Office Bearers of various clubs and societies. There are suggestion boxes in the college. They make suggestions regarding improvement in infrastructure and day to day facilities like Library services, Canteen services, Bus service etc. • Alumnae of the institution also give suggestions regularly for the improvement of the college. They give suggestions regarding teaching-learning process, examination system etc.

e) How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The IQAC conducts three meetings in a year for the planning and implementation of quality enhancement measures with the staff. It takes suggestions from the staff and includes them in its Annual Plan.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.

Yes, the institution has a well established mechanism for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. There is a better association and correlation between academic and administrative activities.

- Meetings regarding top students, average and weak categories are held with the Principal after Mid Semester examination. The lists of these categories are also given to the administrative staff. They post letters to the parents whose wards are lagging behind in studies.
- Absentee record is regularly maintained. Lecture shortage of 10 and above is submitted in the office.
- Interaction with parents in the form of parent teacher meeting is organized by administrative staff. In these meetings, parents can easily track their wards performance and attendance in the class. If the students are irregular in class, the parents are informed about it.
- To maintain discipline, the administrative staff also helps the teaching staff.
- Closed circuits cameras are also installed to keep an eye on the movement of the staff and students.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

- Training to use Smart class rooms is provided to the staff members to motivate them for their wide usage in teaching process.
- Computer training is provided through short term courses to the staff.

- Various workshops on Oral Dental Care, Skin Care, Service Rules and new softwares like SPSS and Tally are organized for the staff. Yoga and meditation sessions are organized regularly for managing their stress level.
- 6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

The college organizes various Inter College competitions to reinforce the spirit of excellence among the students.

- The external experts in practical examinations, seminars and placements review college infrastructure, subject knowledge, behavior of students and facilities like Bus Service, Canteen, and Health Care etc.
- The university does its audit in terms of general inspection at the time of introduction of new courses. At that time they inspect infrastructure available, the library, books and journals and the number of faculty in the department concerned.
- The Principal evaluates the performance of faculty and students by analyzing results after mid semester exams and university semester examinations by arranging meetings of different departments.
- New additions are made in the infrastructure to improve the teaching learning process.
- Interaction is made with local industry during seminars and workshops and on their recommendations, the college was inspired to start interdisciplinary course MBEIT (M.A. Business Economics and Information Technology). This course fulfills all the demands of trade, industry and business.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

In case of the institution, the external regulating authority is the affiliating university, Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar. The college follows all university rules, UGC guidelines and instructions issued by DPI (Colleges). We work as per their guidelines and requirements.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The institution has a clearly defined and efficient mechanism to monitor the learning outcomes.

- The progress of the students is monitored through class tests, assignments, group discussions, seminars, project work and mid semester exams. Attendance is compulsory for every lecture. Lecture shortage of 10 and above is also submitted in the office.
- Letters regarding lecture shortage and marks scored are posted to every student's home. Parents of defaulters are called to meet respective faculty members, if required. During their interaction, the suggestions and reviews regarding teaching-learning process are taken.
- The feedback system works very well. There are suggestion boxes in the college. Every feedback is noted and every query or grievance is readdressed timely.
- The college organizes Alumni Meet every year. During this meet, the respective alumni share their viewpoints about the progress of the college. They give their significant suggestions for the betterment of the institution.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

- Instructions regarding the quality assurance are communicated to the faculty members, especially the newly appointed ones, in the beginning of the session through meetings with the Principal.
- The college communicates its policies through prospectus, college magazine, newsletter and advertisements in newspaper and TV channels.
- The college also provides its useful information to the information seekers through its website.
- Additional efforts are made by the faculty as they visit various schools, show albums and DVDs of the activities of the various departments of the college.
- Participation in educational fairs and job fairs is also ensured.

7.1 ENVIRONMENT CONSCIOUSNESS

Environment has become the most important subject since the last three decades. Environmentalists are playing a great role in resolving urgent environmental issues such as ozone depletion, green house effect, global warming, air pollution and the like. PCM S.D. College for Women has sincerely taken up these issues on the college campus. It is making dedicated efforts for reducing green house effect and air pollution.

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The College has constituted a Green Audit Committee. Faculty members and students as its members regularly undertake various tasks such as:

- a) Regular counselling of students to maintain the cleanliness and green cover of the Campus.
- b) Students are encouraged to use paper and jute bags instead of polythene bags. Use of polythene bags is discouraged. Green Audit Committee ensures that students maintain eco-friendly environment in the campus. Placards are displayed at various spots in the college regarding the same.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly ?

1. Energy Conservation

- The college has well-lit and well ventilated class rooms; hence we don't need any tube lights during teaching hours. The college building is cool because of high roofs. It helps us to conserve energy.
- Energy saving CFL tubes are used instead of conventional bulbs and tubes.
- Mass Transport is being facilitated to students to conserve fuel energy. Even the faculty members share the vehicles to save energy and avoid air pollution.
- Common Staff Room is provided to the faculty for the same purpose.
- Class Representatives take the responsibility of switching off lights and fans in the class rooms.

- The college has taken a big measure to save energy. All old windows ACs have been replaced by Hi-Tech Energy Saving Split ACs.
- Location of the college is beneficial to save fuel energy. The college is situated in the thickly populated residential area and a number of students come on foot from the neighbourhood localities.
- The college is going to install Solar Energy Storing Plants in the near future.

2. Use of renewable energy: N.A.

3. Water Harvesting

Rain Water Harvesting Technique is successfully implemented in the college. It has been done to lift the depleting underground water level of the earth. We have three water tanks to store water. One is attached to the Corporation well and the other two are attached to our own tube wells. Water Audit Team of the college regularly makes analysis of water consumption. It checks the leakage or overflow of water. Sensors are installed to check the overflow of water tanks. Regular cleaning of all the water tanks is undertaken by the experts. The plumber regularly checks all the pipes and thus there is no possibility of leakage. If there is any, an instant action is taken. For drinking purposes pure water is supplied. All water coolers are equipped with water purifying Aqua Guards.

4. Check Dam Construction : N.A

5. Efforts for Carbon Neutrality

- a) The college has not left any stone unturned to make the campus eco-friendly.
- b) The canteen contractor is strictly instructed to use only LPG Cylinder and not coal or any other fuel which emits carbon.
- c) The college has eco-friendly generators. They don't emit any carbon.
- d) We do not put dry waste garbage on fire.

6. Plantation

Go Green Club owns the responsibility of plantation in the college. The plantation drives are organized regularly to make the campus green. The volunteers with the help of the college N.S.S. Units and the Red Cross Unit celebrate Van Mahotsav Day by planting trees. The students plant ornamental and flowery plants

to beautify the campus. They adopt a plant each, look after it and nurture it to the best of their ability. This is how they learn the lesson of responsibility. The volunteers are also motivated to plant more trees in their localities.

7. Hazardous Waste Management

- Under Swachh Bharat Abhiyan undertaken by Prime Minister Sh. Narender Modi to make India clean, the students are tutored to keep the campus clean and throw all the waste material in the dustbins.
- We segregate the garbage collected on daily basis into biodegradable waste and non-biodegradable waste. We collect them in separate bins and dispose them off in the corporation bins.
- Broken furniture is collected and repaired if possible; otherwise it is disposed off properly in corporation bins.
- The waste from Department of Home Science and Department of Fashion Designing is collected and the students recycle it by using their innovative techniques. They make beautiful and decorative items out of the waste and put them on sale.

8. E-waste Management

The electronic waste is managed very well by the IT Department. The e-waste is identified and stored separately. The e-scrap which is piled due to upgradation of technology is sent to the labs meant for the junior classes of school. Sometimes old computers in working condition are donated to the needy students. The left over scrap which cannot be utilized is sold to the junk dealer.

We are trying our best to teach the learners about environmental issues and to preserve the environment. We have assumed the responsibility of educating them about environmental protection. Thus we are trying hard for a better life for future generations.

7.2. INNOVATIONS

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

Innovation is the prime factor behind growth and development. Innovation comes from a preparedness to deal with the uncertainty and challenges of the future. For taking innovative steps one needs to develop,

harness and utilize ones resources and technology to move ahead on the path of success and growth. Intellectual capital and modern software capabilities must be interwined to revolutionize the system. Keeping in mind the vision and missions of the college, it tries its best to introduce innovations in all spheres and at all levels. Realizing that innovation is an ongoing process the institution has embedded following innovative steps and strategies in its mechanism and resources.

(i) Innovations in enriching curriculum/courses and pedagogical tools.

- Masters in Business Economics and Information Technology (MBEIT) is the new innovative course that the college has designed and introduced in 2014-15. Observing the need of the market and changing global scenario the course is designed to meet the latest requirements of the trade, industry and business. Besides this the college also offers other Postgraduate Courses like M.Sc. (IT) and M.Sc. Fashion Designing and Merchandising to enhance the capacity building and potential for employability of the learners.
- Eleven Add on Courses covering various vocational skills are being offered to the learners to hone their skills and enrich their knowledge.
- Hands on Experience is provided to the learners in various fields. Students of Department of Commerce work in real time environment as they are trained how to file income tax returns and other tax returns online. Students of Fashion Designing, Home Science and Computer Science are also given practical training in workshops and training sessions.
- Separate Reading room with e-resources and internet connection is available for students.
- Holding Personality Development Classes is another innovative step taken by the institution. It helps in developing the personality of the students so that they can face the challenges of the world as they step out. The focus of these classes is on inculcating positive attitude, building confidence and improving their communication skills.

(ii) Innovations for augmenting and enhancing infrastructure:

- Five separate smart rooms have been set up with all ICT tools which include projectors, vizualizers and mimeo pads to make the teaching more effective for the students.
- **Internet connectivity** has been provided to all major teaching departments to enable internet browsing by the faculty members and the students.

- Labs have been equipped with the latest configuration computers and projectors.
- A Server with latest technology has been installed. **Networking of the labs** has been done.
- Computer labs for Commerce Department and Fashion Designing Department have been equipped with latest configuration computers and internet facility.
- Newly constructed Placement and Counseling cell facilitates the companies for conducting campus selections.
- **CCTV cameras** have been installed for the security of the campus.
- An **SMS service** for the staff members for immediate dissemination of information regarding meetings/activities/ emergent situations is provided by the administrative office.
- LCD units have been installed on which the activities of the college are displayed.
- **A Yoga hall** has been built to conduct yoga sessions and to provide the facility of indoor games.
- **Biometric attendance system** for the staff members to keep check on the punctuality.
- **Ro purifiers** have been installed with water coolers to provide safe drinking water. A well equipped lab for the course of **TV and Video Production** has been constructed.
- Separate laptops have been provided to certain departments and offices for better functioning. There is provison of data cards for off campus internet connectivity.
- A separate block for collegiate school with all the facilities of a well equipped computer lab, a science lab, a smart class room and a library has been built.
- Water harvesting system has been installed and eco- friendly measures are taken.
- Taking out an **e-journal** is in the pipeline.
- (iii) Innovations in Student Support Services
- **Book Bank**:- The College has created a Book Bank in the library where students from previous classes and the faculty itself contribute course related books and reference books which are then given to the poor and meritorious students of the college who cannot afford to buy text books. A good number of students have been benefitted with this practice.
- Encouragement for Promising Students:- In every session there are many students who work hard but do not get any position in the Class or University and are not honoured at any event in the college. But they still have the capability to get higher grades. So in order to motivate such students special prizes by different departments have been introduced.

- In House project development facility:- A collaboration with NIIT has been done for the facilitation of in-house project development for the students. This tie-up will provide proper practical and relevant knowledge, skills and competencies among students. Some other departments have also signed MOUs with industrial units.
- Scholarships: For the betterment of girls a 'Single Girl Child' scholarship has been introduced by UGC. Besides this several scholarship schemes funded by college and management are given to the students.
- A bi-yearly Newsletter is published and bringing out an e-journal is in the pipeline.
- Students painted **graffiti** on the outerwall of the Department of Fine Arts.
- The Go Green Club, Subject Societies, NSS, NCC and Red Cross Unit undertake projects to sensitize the young learners about **cross cutting issues**.

(iv) Innovations for Research and Extension

- National seminars are conducted and research journals are published to boost research activities.
- **Major/Minor Research projects are** undertaken by the faculty. The faculty members have contributed 309 research papers in Research journals.
- Two Research bodies **Guru Nanak Studies Centre** and **Vivekanand Studies Centre** are functioning effectively to promote research.
- Three peer reviewed journals in Social sciences, Languages and Commerce are in the pipeline.

Apart from the main campus, the college has also its Information and Technology block. Various graduate and post graduate courses in computer science are being run here by Department of computer science. The block has eight well equipped laboratories with about 131 computers, latest softwares, printers, scanners, a dedicated server, a leased line internet connection, a good number of laptops, a computer centre and a well stocked library with a rich collection of books on computer science. Teachers give lectures using digital interactive panels, visualizers, projectors and mimio-pad in smart classrooms. Teachers also use power-point presentation transparencies with the help of multimedia projectors. Department of computer science organizes 'Infotsav', every year to explore the talent of students to give them exposure to various competitions related to the world of technology.

All the major departments of the college IT, Commerce, Fashion Designing, Economics, English, Fine Arts have also this facility, we can boast of **5 smart classrooms**. Students are taught through multi-media content related to their syllabus. Department of Commerce has a computerized laboratory for conducting courses in Computer Aided Accountancy and Tally. Students of Fashion Designing also use latest softwares for garment designing and pattern making in their laboratory having about a dozen computers with internet facility. The college offers a number of computer related courses like M.Sc. (Information Technology), M.Sc. (Fashion Designing and Merchandising), M.Com, Post Graduate One Year Diploma in Computer Application (PGDCA), B.Sc. (Computer Science), B.Sc. (Non-Med), B.Sc. (Fashion Designing) and BCA. The college offers UGC granted career oriented Add on Courses in Internet Application, Computer Applications, Computer Aided Accountancy. The course in Leather Processing Technology provides practical training to students.The course in Web Designing acquaints the students with the concepts of Web Designing.

• Recently the college has introduced a course in T.V & Video Production. UGC has sanctioned grant for setting up a studio with latest equipment. Students get hands on training in this studio and practice their skills by doing video recording of various events organized in the college. Such

courses having practical utility are indeed very helpful to the students and increase their potential for employability.

- The college has a virtual library. The students draw full advantage of it. Students can use the browsing centre in the library and download e-material related to their curriculum. INFLIBNET system is operative in the library. We are using e-learning Resources optimally.
- SPSS software has been provided in the multiple computers to enable the M.Com and MBEIT students to solve the data-rich problems, data processing and analysis for marketing research projects. CDs of SPSS are made available to the students for practice at home. Students of other departments also use softwares provided to them in their respective departmental laboratories.
- Access to Learning is facilitated through ICT laced laboratories. With the help of ICT, students can now browse through e-books, sample examination papers and previous papers. They also have an easy access to resource persons, mentors, experts, researchers, professionals and peers from all over the world. This just-in-time learning has encouraged a numbers of learners who were previously deprived of this facility. We have quite a good number of CDs and DVDs, computers, photocopier and E-Journals in the library.
- In the Smart classrooms we have interactive boards, Mimio Pads, Mimio Pad Pens, Projectors and Computer Systems. In other Laboratories we have as many as 162 computers. All have latest configuration of good brands.
- Other infrastructural facilities in Hardware and Softwares are advantageous to students. Dynamic Website is used to give information of the college, various departments and their achievements and events. It has been developed in PHP technology.
- Biometric Machine is installed that helps in automation of attendance of the employees and can help in tracking the in and out time of the employees and total work duration.
- Bulk SMS Service is used to provide important information like results, admission and college events to the management, the faculty and parents of students.

Evidence of Success:





It provided us an opportunity to review, analyse and plan the institutional progress and take constructive steps for quality enhancement and its sustenance. The college has introduced a **multi-faculty innovative course MBEIT** (Masters in Business Economics and Information Technology). Professional and vocational courses have also been started. **13 Interdisciplinary courses** are being offered to the students. At present the college offers **15 UG and 5 PG programmes**, **3 PG Diploma Courses**, **2 UG Diploma Courses**, **11 Vocational Add on Courses**(Certificate, Diploma and Advanced Diploma) and one foundation course in Human Rights. Learner centric techniques and innovative teaching methods are being adopted to make the learning process effective. Use of ICT is encouraged in both teaching and administration. IT infrastructure has been augmented in a planned and strategic way to promote the use of technology. The list of IT infrastructure includes 162 computers with internet facility in laboratories and teaching departments and 15 computers are installed in administrative offices. Latest softwares, 8 printers, 2 scanners, 12 projectors, 5 smart class rooms with interactive boards, interactive panels, visualizers, Projectors, Mimeopads, Stylus and mimeo pad pen, 7 laptops, 1 online UPS,131 offline UPS, 44 CCTV Cameras, 5 LCDs are being used effectively in the campus. Internet facility is made available via 2 towers of Dreamtel, a high speed leased line connection of 3 Mbps, 1 Airtel Connection (1 Mbps), 1 BSNL connection (512 Kbps) and 2data cards for off campus internet connectivity.

2. **Augmenting the physical infrastructure** has been an ongoing activity. The college campus has been augmented with the addition of collegiate school block. At present the college has 67 spacious classrooms, two seminar halls and an auditorium with State of Art facilities, well stocked libraries in all three blocks, a browsing centre and one computer centre. Among technology enabled learning facilities, the college has 5 smart class rooms and 34 laboratories. A multi-purpose yoga hall has been added to the Sports section. Library facilities have been strengthened. The library has 36741 books and has subscribed to 90 magazine and Journals and 23 newspapers. There is provision of safe drinking water, neat and clean wash rooms and three generators.

3. For **promotion of research** the college has made concerted efforts for encouraging the faculty and students to participate in research activities. As indicator of this initiative, 21 faculty members completed M.Phil/Ph.D degree during service. **Two research centres** Guru Nanak Studies Centre and Vivekanand Studies Centre have been established under the Epoch Making Social Thinkers of India Scheme. 

NAAC REPORT OF PREM CHAND MARKANDA SD COLLEGE FOR WOMEN

SECTION 1: PREFACE

Prem Chand Markanda S.D. College for women, Jalandhar volunteered to be assessed by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) and submitted the Self Study Report in April 2005. A Peer Team was constituted by the NAAC to visit the institution to validate the Self Study Report. Peer Team consisted of Dr. Surendra Singh, Vice-Chancellor, Mahatma Gandhi Kashi Vidyapeeth, Varanasi, Dr. Yoginder S. Verma, Director, Academic Staff College, Himachal University, Shimla, Prof. R.L. Mathur, Principal, Lachoo Memorial College of Science and Technology, Jodhpur, Dr. Madura Nath, Advisor NAAC, Bangalore visited the institution for two days from 29th to 30th October 2005.

The Devi Sahai S.D. Education Board established Prem Chand Markanda S.D. College for Women, Jalandhar on 3rd Aug 1973. Initially it was purely an Arts College affiliated to G.N.D.U. Now it has grown into a full-fledged multi faculty Post Graduate institution imparting higher education of good quality for girls.

The Mission of the College is : Quality & Value Based Education aiming at Academic Excellence and Women Empowerment. The Motto of the College 'Do Your Job Well' clearly shows its commitment to promote excellence in education based on oriental values. The College has four faculties, namely, (a) Faculty of Arts with Dept. of English, Punjabi, Hindi, Sanskrit, Mathematics, Political Science, Economics, Fine Arts, Home Science, Geography, Psychology, Philosophy, Music, History, Office Management and Secretarial Practices, Computer Science, Dance and Physical Education (b) Faculty of Commerce (c) Faculty of Computer Science (d) Faculty of Science.

There are 46 permanent teachers, 31 temporary teachers and 3 part-time teachers. Majority of permanent teachers have research degrees of Ph. D or M. Phil. There are 1463 students at University level and 298 students at school level. The results of University Examination of 2004-05 indicate that the Pass Percentage has varied from 80.62 (B.A.-I) to 100% (in most of the classes). It is noteworthy here that 133 students have

secured merit positions in the University Examination of 2005 (93 students at UG level and 40 students at P.G. level).

In addition to classroom teaching varied kinds of co-curricular & extra-curricular activities are being organized by the College. Noteworthy among these are N.S.S, N.C.C. and Sports. As for N.S.S there are 4 units in the College. Various types of programmes are organized under normal N.S.S programmes as also under the special 10 day round the clock camps held at the adopted village Kalyanpur to promote its integrated development. In addition to organization of special awareness campaign on important issues relating to contemporary society including aids. N.S.S. volunteers have made significant contribution to Govt. sponsored Pulse Polio Camps and Aids Awareness Programmes. A few volunteers have also been selected for Pre Republic Day Camps organized by G.N.D.U. Under the N.C.C a few cadets have been selected for Independence Day Parade at Guru Gobind Singh Stadium, Jallandhar and also for Republic Day Parade at Delhi. Blood Donation Camps are also organized from time to time. A very special feature of N.C.C in the College is that of miniature indoor shooting range which provides an opportunity to the cadets to prepare themselves for defence. In sports the College has made significant strides in the area of Judo, yoga, Basket Ball and Badminton. Many students have won prizes in various National and regional level competitive events.

Infrastructural position of the College is very sound. It has a well furnished and elegant Principal's office, Administrative Block, Conference Hall, Two Libraries, Reading Halls CD Library, 62 Class Rooms, 15 Laboratories, Post-Graduate Block, I.T., Commerce and Science Block, Under Ground Parking , Brahmkund Playgrounds, Auditorium, 2 Cafetaria, Gymnasium/Health Club, 12 Peon Quarters, 2 Common rooms , Medical room and well equipped offices for support services. Student utility services like power Generating sets, Submersible Pumps, 6 Water Coolers with Acquaguards, Fire Extinguishers and Medical Facility are quite satisfactory.

There is an ultra modern Computer Centre consisting of 5 computer systems. There are 53 computers including a central server and other peripherals like printers, Scanners etc. The Computer Centre remains open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

The College has a computerized library with 32401 books, 90 periodicals and Journals, most of the Leading English, Hindi, Punjabi newspapers and a well-furnished reading hall. The library has DelNet connectivity and proposes to go in for INFLIBNET facility in future. It has also Bar-Coding facility which is rare. A

special feature of the library is book bank consisting of 2000 books from which the students are permitted to borrow. The library has on line Internet facility and reprography facility. The College has also CD library with a good collection of CDs in different subjects.

A wide variety of welfare activities are organized for the benefit of the students. Noteworthy among these are Health Care facility provided by the Health Club/Gym, the remedial classes for educationally backward students, Transport facility, bank loan facility, Safety Insurance Scheme for the students, educational tours, trips and excursions, liberal financial assistance for the needy, merit scholarships to academically bright students etc.. There is a Grievance Redressal Cell, which deals with various types of grievances and complaints of the students in an effective manner. There is a Placement Cell, which very effectively helps the students in getting right kind of jobs through active linkages with various types of organizations, industrial, business, governmental and non governmental etc. One of the peculiar and striking features of the College is the classes to prepare students for the competitive examinations. There is an Environment Club also which generates awareness necessary for protection of environment and promotion of sustainable development.

There is Central Association consisting of elected class representatives and some nominated members. This Association helps in maintaining general discipline in the College and organizes various types of constructive programmes and activities. It also conducts Morning Assembly on Monday in which lessons in plain living and high thinking and leading life with honesty and integrity are given to the students.

The College publishes a wide variety of documents including College Prospectus, College Magazine, Annual Report, Wall Magazines, Result Bulletins etc.. It also brings out three Journals with titles of (a) Literary Musings (b) Sahit Dhara (c) Log-in-SD.

Various kinds of functions are organized in the College on various occasions in order to promote a sense of pride and also to inculcate right kind of values as part and parcel of the personality structure of the students. The College encourages the participation of faculty members in their self improvement and development efforts by allowing them to pursue M. Phil and Ph.D programmes and to participate in seminars, workshops, symposia, etc. Special lectures are organized in different subjects by inviting eminent scholars from time to time. In addition to this, the College also organizes seminars, workshops etc. on significant themes.

Thus the College as per its commitment to the avowed mission and motto is making its sincerest and best efforts to promote multi-faceted but integrated development of both students and teachers by guaranting availability of suitable infrastructure and required facilities and amenities; and perhaps this is the reason why it has been able to create a good image for itself in society which has been clearly reflected in the opinion given by the parents, Alumni as well as students in course of the Peer Team's separate interactions with them. The College is fully conscious of its limitations relating to non availability of Hostel facility and a suitable field for games and sports and its future plans do incorporate the measures required to be undertaken in this regard. U.G.C. has already sanctioned grant worth Rs.25 lacs for the construction of the hostels. The College has already procured five acres land for this purpose.

SECTION II : CRITERION-WISE ANALYSIS

The Peer Team carefully perused and analyzed the Self Study Report submitted by the College. During the visit to the institution the team went through all the relevant documents and visited the various departments and observed the facilities -Academic, Co-Curricular, Extra-Curricular and extension activities. The Peer Team also interacted with the Governing Body, Principal of the institution, faculty, students, and parents and Alumni of the College. Based on the Self Study Report, on the spot observations and interactions with the different categories of persons associated with the College and keeping in mind the Seven criteria identified by NAAC, the Assessment of the College under various criteria has been done. The commendable features of the College as also the issues of concerns are being given in the following pages.

CRITERION - I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The College is a grant-in-aid College affiliated to Guru Nanak Dev University (GNDU) Amritsar. It follows the academic curriculum, syllabi and scheme of examination as designed and prescribed by the university for all programmes. The College offers 6 under graduate programmes in the faculty of Science, Arts, Commerce and Computer Science, 02 Post Graduate programmes in the faculty of Arts, Computer Science, four PG diploma programmes in Computer Applications, Cosmetology, Dress Designing and Tailoring, and Office Management and Secretarial Practices. The college offers three years degrees courses like B.Sc.(Eco), B.A., B. Com., B.C.A., B.Sc.(Computer Science), B.A.(Hons) n English, Hindi, and Political Science and two years master degrees course in Punjabi. Number of options is provided for the course in BA and option in Medical and Non-Medical combination is offered in B.Sc.

Fair flexibility is offered to the students to select combination of courses at under graduate level. The review and revision of the curricula is done at the university level. Several members of the staff of the college who are the members of Board of Studies, in the affiliating university, contribute in the curriculum design. To introduce a new programme within the regulations of the university system, the College takes about three to six months. The college has introduced two new subjects Geography and Psychology in B.A. in the last three years. From the session 2005-06, College has started M.Sc. (Computer Science) and B.Sc. (Computer Science). Six 'add-on' courses sanctioned by the UGC and approved by GNDU have also been started from this year. In addition to these courses, the College has started B.Com (Hons.), B.A.(Hons) in Punjabi.

The basic aims and objectives of the institution are to provide quality and value based education. The College Motto 'Do your job well' highlights its mission. The extra curricular activities are planned by the College including sports and cultural activities.

CRITERION - II: TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

Admission process is based on the academic record and it is in accordance with the rules and regulations of the State government of Punjab and Guru Nanak Dev University.

The College has 237 working days and 190 teaching days during the session. Total number of teaching faculty in the College is 80. Ratio of full time to part time teachers is 25 : 1. Percentage of classes taught by full time faculty is more than 95%. One teacher has attended international level seminar and 21 teachers have participated in national level seminars. Two teachers have acted as resource persons in national seminars during the last two years.

The College has been running Remedial courses for the last five years, and for this the financial assistance has been provided by the U G C. The College has also been running classes for competitive examinations and these are UGC sponsored. Advanced learners are encouraged to make projects and take up special assignments for a specific period in professional courses. Inter-College seminars and quiz programmes are organized to motivate the advanced learners.

The teachers prepare their term wise teaching plans in the beginning of the session. In the normal courses, lecture method is followed in the institution. It is supplemented with the use of models, charts and OHPs in a few departments. Though the facilities like visual aids and OHPs are used, there is a need to introduce the computer and ICT oriented teaching-learning method in the College.

The evaluation plan including tentative schedule of regular tests and terminal examination has been included in the prospectus. The concerned teachers communicate class test schedule at the beginning of the year.

Management Committee makes the regular recruitment of teachers. The posts are advertised in the leading newspapers. Applications are invited and candidates are interviewed by the Committee duly appointed by the Management. The recruitment is made strictly as per the norms of the University and UGC.

There is a no institutional mechanism for faculty appraisal. Self-appraisal Performa are filled by teachers at the end of each session. The Principal writes the Annual Confidential Report. Teacher taught ratio is appropriate. Past percentage of the College students in university examination is fairly good, generally above 95% and there have been 5 or more students in the first ten ranks of university in last two years examinations.

Efforts have been made to create good teaching-learning environment. The student's evaluation through house examination, class tests and practical assignments is done in an effective manner in the College. The organization of tutorials, quiz competitions, debates, educational tours, industrial visits etc. help the institution in its endeavourer to achieve avowed objectives.

One Lecturer of College has received National award given by Ministry of Human Resource Development. Initiatives are being taken to forge more national and international linkages.

CRITERION - III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

The institution has 10 teachers with Ph.D. and 24 with M.Phil. qualified teachers out of total of 46 permanent teachers. The College also has 01 M.Phil qualified teacher out of a total 20 temporary teachers. The faculty may be encouraged to submit research projects to UGC and other funding agencies. A Central research cell may be constituted in the College to develop research environment in the College. Competent teachers and departments should be encouraged to offer consultancy Services. This exposure will not only enrich the faculty but also be of immense help to the students.

No. of Research papers and articles published is 25. The books written by the teachers are also less. The College publishes academic calendar at the beginning of every session. The College also publishes regularly annual magazine " Govind". It recently started publishing three journals namely- Literary Musings, Sahit

Dhara and Log-in- SD. College also maintains wall magazine. Many efforts are required for encouraging teachers to write papers and get research assistance from national level agencies such as UGC, ICSSR, etc.

The College has been sanctioned four NSS units of one hundred students each. Four Programme Officers look after these units. The NSS with its motto "Not me but you' and 'service to humanity" organizes year long activities such as pulse polio immunization camps, adult education, community development and awareness programmes on AIDS and environment. There is a scope of further utilization of student potential for extension services and outreach programmes, especially in the field of women's empowerment.

The College has a NCC platoon. The NCC is active in the College, several cadets have participated in Republic day parades at New Delhi and other camps.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The College was established in 1974 with just 8 rooms. Now it has administrative block, 60 classrooms, 15 laboratories, P.G. Block, I.T. Block and Commerce & Science Block, underground parking, playground, gymnasium, common room and medical room. Besides, there are 2 bookshops, 2 Cafeterias and a reading hall. It does not have its own hostel. Shortly the College plans to start construction of hostel. Its total area is 6.4 acres after the inclusion 5 acres land the College has procured. The College meets the need for augmenting the infrastructure through funds generated by self-financing courses and donations by philanthropists and donors. The management of the College also provides adequate funds. The annual maintenance is done with the active participation of the teaching and non-teaching staff. The College has employed a carpenter, an electrician, gardeners, safai karamcharis, security staff and peons for proper upkeep of the campus. The College has constituted various committees namely; gardening committee, canteen committee, bus service committee, general cleanliness committee, maintenance of common room committee. A convener heads each committee. Annual stock checking is conducted at departmental level.

The College ensures optimum utilization of infrastructure facilities by conducting short term courses during summer break, coaching classes for home science and cosmetology, personality development programmes and holding evening classes of NTT. Various departments share audio-visual devices. The College also offers infrastructural help for holding competitive examinations by banks and railway. The College also allows external agencies to use its facilities such as Hero Mind Mine for running courses in communication

skills and personality development programmes, and NGOs/Institutes involved in social work organize programmes in the College. The College campus is kept pollution free and beautiful with the help of Gardening, Cleanliness and Campus Beautification Committees. Gardening Committee looks after the plantation. Cleanliness committee ensures general cleanliness such as sweeping, neatness of room and laboratory etc. Students also participate in campus beautification activity. With the help of advisory committee the College manages the library affairs. The library has 32,401 books and subscribes to 10 journals, 80 magazines and 20 newspapers. It also provides Book Bank facility to the needy and deserving students. The College is in the process of computerization of library. The library has the facility of reprography, computers, Internet and audio-visual cassettes. It also proposes to install networking and Teleconferencing on EDUSAT. The working days of the library are 271 per annum. It works from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm daily.

The Department of Computer Science has a separate Computer Centre with 5 computer systems. It works from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm. The main objective of this Computer Centre is to increase computer literacy among the students. The Computer Department of the College has a computer laboratory with 68 computers including a central server and other peripherals like printers, scanners, etc. The College has a laboratory attendant and a laboratory instructor for the maintenance of computers in the computer science department. The College provides health and medical services through qualified doctor who is available on call.

Department of Physical Education manages Physical Education Centre with the facility of gym, medical room and health club. The College has playgrounds for the games of basketball, kho-kho, ball badminton, volleyball, indoor games (judo, yoga and chess). The students are given incentives for taking part in sports activities. Main benefits/incentives are free-ships to outstanding sportspersons, scholarships and prizes, refreshment, sports kit, etc. During last year 8 students participated at state-3, regional-4 and national-1 level competitions. The College doesn't have its workshop/Centre for instrumentation. Number of books in the library in view of the requirements of the students should be increased.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

There are approximately 1761 students currently enrolled in the College. The percentage of students passing in different programmes and securing first class is very impressive both at UG and PG level. Approximately 20 percent students go for PG courses. It does not have any Ph.D. level programme. During previous 5 years approximately 20 students passed in UGC - CSIR(NET) examination and one in UGC - SLET. The College

claims to have gathered feedback from the students. The suggestions are implemented for bringing about desired modifications in curriculum. The College publishes its prospectus at the beginning of each academic session which contains information regarding admission criterion, detailed staff list, eligibility conditions, available subject combinations, fee structure, College calendar, scholarships/stipend offered to the SC/ST and Backward Classes students by the College, etc. Meritorious students are provided scholarships. In addition, scholarships are also available to the disadvantaged classes. During previous two years a number of students have availed financial aid under the merit scholarship and merit-cum-means scholarship; sponsored scholarships; scholarships from NGOs; and financial aid to the deserving students in sports, youth welfare activities, meritorious and financially poor students. There is an employment cell in the College headed by a Placement Officer which provides training and guidance to students for placement in different institutions. The placement cell committee organizes personality development programmes and also lectures for creating awareness about job opportunities. Teacher Incharge of guidance cell holds counseling sessions for academic and personal problems of the students. The placement cell motivates the students to open their enterprises like boutiques and beauty parlours. The College has an Alumni Association, which aims to involve themselves in the development of the College. The association should become more active. The College attracts prospective students through its advertisements in the newspapers. There are a number of recreational/leisure time facilities such as indoor games, students magazines, audiovideo facilities, essay writing, exhibitions, debate clubs, outdoor games, cultural programmes, dance and music competition, education tours and trips, etc.

Other facilities that assist students are Internet, transport, canteen, rotract club, Central Association, etc. The College should fully computerize the library.

CRITERION VI: ORGANIZATION AND MANAGEMENT

The College is governed by Devi Sahai S.D. Education Board, which is engaged in catering the emerging educational and societal needs. For the management of the College, the Board has constituted a governing body. The governing body extends necessary guidelines and directions for the efficient administration of the College. It also monitors the progress and prepares plan for the future. The College has well defined management structure. Principal is the chief executive who is assisted by staff bodies and committees constituted by her for undertaking routine tasks. The meetings of the different committees are regularly held. The College has a Planning Forum headed by the Principal and Heads of the Departments as the

members. The Forum plays active role in coordination and management of College affairs. The nonteaching staff works under the control of office Superintendent. A Bursar and an internal auditor regulate the financial affairs.

Through the Central Association, youth club, NCC, NSS and subject societies/ associations students are involved in various activities. The Principal monitors discipline in the College through CCTV installed in her chamber. The College has set up innovation cell, which gives suggestions for improving the efficiency in both academic and non-academic functions. The grievances of the students and employees are settled through Grievance Redressal Cell. The College has a suggestion box for inviting suggestions from different quarters.

The College has an in-built mechanism for improving the work efficiency of the non-teaching staff. The whole office work is divided into different departments such as administration, admission, fee concession, fee collection, examination, accounts, etc. There is a separate computerized accounts section. The non-teaching staff assist the teaching staff in handling the academic and administrative operations in the College. Principal monitors the overall functioning by verification of records and holding regular meetings. A committee of senior members prepares academic calendar of the College. The prospectus committee formulates the rules and regulations, which are published in the prospectus of the College. The members of the non-teaching staff are given training in computer applications, communication skills, office management and secretarial skills and bookkeeping. The College charges nominal fee except in case of professional and career oriented courses. There has been minor changes in the fee structure during previous two years. The College has surplus budget.

The College has an efficient internal audit system. Accounts are prepared and regularly checked by superintendent accounts, which are further checked by Bursar. The Chartered Accountant audits final accounts. The College has a number of welfare programmes. The students are given financial aids, scholarships and financial assistance. There is a safety insurance scheme for students. Needy and deserving students are issued books from the Book Bank. Limited medical facility is also provided to students and employees. Teaching and Non-teaching staff avail the facility of Group Insurance Scheme. The College runs its own buses for providing adequate transport facility to the students. The employees can avail PF loans and in case of Class-IV advance against their salaries. The College attempts to maintain flexibility of rules and employees.

CRITERION VII: HEALTHY PRACTICES

The Peer Team has identified a few unique features, which enhance the ambience of the institution. They are as follows:

Evolvement of an efficient system of internal quality checks in all administrative and academic activities.

Inculcation of civic responsibility among the students by involving them in various social welfare activities.

Collective and participative decision making by involving teachers in the management of the College.

Encouraging the students to participate in co-curricular and sports activities through subject associations and youth welfare club.

Special attention to the needs of advanced learners.

Non-existence of evil of ragging.

Well-received and defined mission and vision of the institution.

Regular publication of College magazine.

Overall discipline both in academic and non-academic activities.

Introduction of professional and add-on courses.

Providing IT oriented education.

Conduct of a personality development and career counselling programmes.

Linkages with NGOs such as Rotary Club.

Education with unique combination of modernity with cultural heritage.

Healthy academic competition, which resulted in securing of top positions by the College students at the university level.

The overall academic environment is peaceful.

III. OVERAL ANALYSIS

(a) Commendations

On the basis of above discussion the Peer Team comes to the conclusion that the College, right from the very beginning, has made planned and deliberate efforts to provide Value based education on modern lines which is instrumental in creating a unique blend of scientific temper and moral character and promoting multi dimensional development of the student's personality, particularly by motivating teachers to work as a sincere, committed and well-knit team of servants dedicated to the cause of optimum human resource development. It is worth mentioning here that during the period of about three decades the College has been able to gain social recognition as an institution of academic excellence and to create a very good image of its own in the eyes of people in the community who prefer to send their wards and relatives to this institution only. The College is continuing to pursue the path of progress incessantly.

The College has been doing commendable service to the community particularly from the point of view of women's empowerment. It has not only been inculcating the right kind of attitudes and values among young girls but also preparing them to take up career in various newly coming up disciplines along side equipping them with skills necessary for managing an ideal home. It is creating scientific outlook coupled with respect for the traditional healthy Indian values. Some of the departments like Commerce, Computer Science, Mathematics, Home Science and Sanskrit are really outstanding not only from the point of view of effective teaching but also from the stand point of developing the holistic personality of the students. The College has its own web site, pemsdcollege.com, prepared by the students themselves.

The Principal of the College, Ms. Kiran Arora is full of dynamism and foresight and makes her best and sincere efforts to ensure that the College is managed in proper manner. Personal needs and problems of students, teachers and employees are looked into timely and taken care of properly. She has a special knack for incessantly marching in direction of perfection in various spheres of management of the institutions.

(b) Recommendations: -

The College should strengthen science departments and start postgraduate level courses in Commerce, English and Hindi.

The campus of the College needs augmentation.

Hostel if constructed will enhance the academic achievements of the College.

The teachers of College are mainly busy with teaching, extension and corporate life management as per the old tradition of ensuring the attainment of high percentage of marks. They should also participate in National and International Seminars and Conferences, and publish research papers in standard journals.

The College, community and industry interaction should be encouraged for ensuring holistic development of students' personality.

The College should encourage teachers to take up research work, use modern educational gadgets in the classrooms and go for professional development.

Academic achievements of the College are worth mentioning but there is a need for the promotion of sports activities.


